

Falling Prices Will Hurt

The big, bad oil companies are going to get their just desserts, it seems, now that the price of oil is plummeting almost as fast as it rose a few years ago. The national news media and the consumer groups are rubbing their hands in glee at the predicament of those rich, fat cats who are going to lose a bundle

What few seem to realize is that the drop in oil prices will hurt the economy of the panhandle worse than anything that has happened for a long time. If oil prices drop to the bottom, oil companies will cut back on production, which will lead to a cut back on employees and a cut back on all the companies who depend on the oil field for a living.

When more people are out of work in the oil field, area businesses will sell fewer goods, builders will build fewer houses, real estate agencies will sell fewer properties, cattlemen will sell fewer cows, and farmers will sell less grain.

And, surely, when the oil companies begin losing millions of dollars, the government will revoke the unjust windfall profits tax (which was being used to plug some holes in the federal budget). When that tax is no longer collected, then someone else (you. the taxpayer?) will have to pay for the services once paid for by big oil.

Even though lower prices at the gasoline pump will benefit most of us, you should be aware that cheap oil may cost us all dearly before this economic slump is over.

Dear Editor:

I am writing to ask McLean area residents to do themselves and their neighbors a favor: check with the telephone company before digging near posted cable warning

Last year, Southwestern Bell telephone cable repair costs in Texas totalled almost \$5 million for more than 6,000 incidents of cable cuts and damage.

Sometimes, cable damage affects only a few people and can be repaired quickly. All too often, however, cable damage means loss of telephone service to major sections of cities or

even entire communities Cable cuts sometimes isolate hospitals, police and fire departments.

A large number of long distance transcontinental coaxial cables run through Texas. These cables daily carry vital long distance telephone messages and data communications to millions of businesses and people. When those cables are cut, long distance calls are routed in other ways if possible, but a jammed network can result, af-

fecting many callers. A suggestion for anyone planning digging activities: before plowing, building fences or terraces, installing sprinklers, landscaping or digging, please look for telephone company cable warning signs. Also, please watch out for aerial cable when working with tall equipment.

The cable warning signs display a telephone number that may be called to notify the telephone company of any work planned near cable routes.

When we receive a call, we will promptly send someone to pinpoint the exact cable location. We do bill for damage to our cables, and the repair bills can be quite costly.

Please call before work begins near telephone cable. In Texas, ask the operator for the Enterprise 9800 number to report planned digging activities. If a sign is posted for AT&T Long Lines cable, the number to use is COLLECT (214) 824-4400.

A&M expert says price scanners will benefit consumer

COLLEGE STATION Despite consumer complaints, price tags must be removed from grocery items if supermarne to realize the ful benefits of new scanner systems used at checkout stands, says a marketing expert.

Most of the 5,000 grocery stores in the United States that use scanners aren't getting their money's worth from the equipment and won't realize the full economic benefits until they eliminate costly and laborintensive item price-marking, says Dr. Valarie Zeithaml of Texas A&M's College of Business Administration.

"They haven't removed the price tags because of consume resistance," she said, "but with time, and by using proper strategies that recognize customer needs, stores should be able to successfully overcome the resistance.







New Area Code To Be Effective March 19 In Texas

A new area code will be effective March 19 for telephone customers in parts of East and Southeast Texas.

The new area code, 409, will replace the current 713 area code for about 180 cities and towns, including Beaumont and Galveston, said Gary Stevens, Community Rel. Mgr., for Southwestern Bell.

Houston and about 30 nearby towns will remain in the 713 area code. All other cities in the existing 713 area will switch to the new 409 area code

Record growth, especially in the Houston metropolitan area, created the need to split the existing 713 area code, said Stevens.

exhausted by early 1984. All customers in both the 713 and 409 areas will keep their same sevendigit local number. The change will have no effect on Long Distance calling

For three months after the conversion to the new code, calls made to the 713 area code instead of the correct 409 code will be automatically transferred. After the three month period, a recorded announcement will instruct the caller to dial

News From Your Gray County Extension Agent

As soon as our snow stops, it looks like spring will be here. The other day when the snow melted off, there were spring flowering bulbs showing up real well. A lot of plants grow under a warm blanket of snow. Anyway, spring is coming and gardeners are going to be hard at work on pretty days now getting caught up on seasonal work that needs

Texas Grape Day

learn the latest in grape growing.

Pruning Rules

Pruning season is here. This is the time of year that many fruit growers dread most. It's not that pruning is such a difficult or overly time-consuming task; it's just the thought of cutting these precious

The best time to prune your favorite fruit tree or grapevine is immediately before it breaks bud and begins to bloom or leaf. In Gray County, March and April is the best time. If you prune any earlier, buds and blooms are stimulated into early growth. Early growth plus a late freeze or frost equals loss of this season's fruit crop and possibly a damaged tree.

Pruning makes plants stronger. If strong branches are selected

which point in the right direction, then the whole tree is stronger. stronger tree produces and supports more and larger fruit. Nothing is more discouraging than planting and growing a fruit tree for several years only to have the first heavy load of fruit break it down and ruin its appearance. So prune to select and strengthen.

Secondly, pruning stimulates. Most fruit is produced on or from year-old wood. The peaches and grapes which you eat this spring were actually initiated and formed last year. So, if new growth is not stimulated each year by pruning, a fruitful plant can become a mass of old, non-productive wood. For each year a tree or vine is neglected, production is reduced.

The third reason for

pruning is to make sure you have not been too stimulatory as outlined above. If you prune every year and follow proper cultural techniques, the tree or vine will initiate many more buds than it can possibly support if all bloom buds turn to fruit. To prevent too much fruit set and subsequent limb breakage or small fruit, much of this over-productivity can be removed at pruning time. Thinning the fruit probably will still be

One of the most important factors in proper pruning is the pruner's attitude. The motto of dedicated pruners is: "When in doubt, cut it

recommended, but prun-

ing helps.

out." This may sound harsh, but most novice pruners remove less wood than they should.

Remove all dead and diseased wood first. Then correct all rubbing branches by removing one or the other. Cut out injured branches so that disease or insects cannot enter the tree. Next,

remove inconvenient branches. An inconvenient branch is one which bangs on the house during a windstorm, overhangs a walkway, or is in the way when you're mowing the lawn. Suckers and water-

sprouts are branches

which grow from below the ground or near the ground. They generally grow faster than the top of the tree. Generally, remove sucker growth as soon as it appears in the Gardeners summer. sometimes cut the main trunk to let the vigorous sucker grow. This causes a problem if the tree is grafted since the sucker

grows from the rootstock on which the desired fruit variety was grafted. If this is the case, the sucker will produce an undesirable fruit.

After removing dead and diseased wood, rubbing branches, injured branches, inconvenient branches and suckers, the next cuts are for height control. This is especially true when pruning peach trees which must be flat-

topped and bowl-shaped. From this point on, consider the proper shape and design for the

particular fruit tree being pruned.




