It was the year that a gunman broke into the prison at Pompano Beach, Florida and robbed two inmates of a stereo, a radio, and a television set.

John Hinckley, calling himself a "political prisoner," said there was a "growing movement" to have the U.S. government swap him for Russian dissident Andrei Sakharov.

It was a year the Tom Shales, TV critic for *The Washington Post*, said the idea that Christians want to convert others to Christianity is "chilling."

Darrell Evans of the Detroit Tigers said that sighting a UFO "helped my career, because it gave me something to think about besides myself."

Calvin Klein marketed men's underwear to be worn by women.

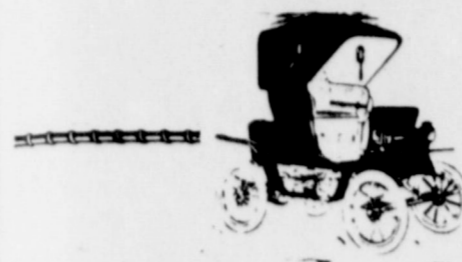

Cubs, Cubettes Lose Season Finals

Hopes for the district championship were crushed last week when the junior high Cubettes travelled to Phillips.

The Phillips Blackhawks, playing their best game yet, defeated McLean 20-17. The Cubettes, as a team, had their worst night as a team that night.

McLean led throughout most of the game, and were ahead of the Blackhawks by six points at the end of the first half.

Phillips narrowed McLean's lead to five points by the end of

the third quarter.

McLean was unable to make only six points in the final period of the game, and allowed Phillips to make 13 points.

Misty Magee led the scoring for the Cubettes with 10 points. Darla McAnear had five and Tiffany Lopez and Wendi Smith had one point each.

The Cubs also found Phillips a formidable opponent, and although McLean came 19 points in the final period of

play, Phillips handily won the game 37-30.

McLean trailed 32-11 at the end of the third quarter, but held Phillips to only five points in the fourth to come within seven, for exciting fourth-quarter action.

Led in scoring by Sid Brass, who had 18 points, the Cubs were almost able to pull off the major upset. Calle Holwick had four points in the game, and Johnny Mann, Dale Barker, Kyle Woods, and Jimmy Corely all had two points.

Trustees Discuss 4-H Absences; Reschedule Calendar

School trustees gathered for their monthly meeting February 11 in the school business office.

Members present were Joe Magee, James Hefley, Jake Hess II, John Holland, Thacker Haynes, Lloyd Hunt, and Darryel Herndon; superintendent Jim Rutherford; business manager Shirley Johnson; vo-ag teacher Jim Bob Webb; County Extension Agent Jeff Goodwin; and principals Ron Cummings and Dorman Thomas.

Trustees approved the January minutes, the January checks, the January financial statement, the tax-assessor's report, and the cafeteria report. They also discussed delinquent taxes.

County extension agent Goodwin discussed school absences for 4-H with the board and informed them that Pampa currently handles all 4-H absences as extra-curricular and asked that McLean hold the same policy.

High school principal Ron

Cummings said they were waiting for the state recommendations before making any policies. Superintendent Jim Rutherford presented the board with possible changes in the school calendar.

Because school was dismissed for two days, due to illness and inclement weather, the days must be made up. The board decided to schedule school for March 18, which had previously been scheduled as a teacher inservice day.

School will also be in session April 5, the Friday before Easter. However, Monday, April 8 will remain a holiday.

SB 263, the bill proposing consolidation of school districts, was discussed, and a resolution was drafted opposing SB263 and supporting HJR 33.

Senator Haley has proposed an amendment to prohibit consolidation without the local school board's approval.

Trustees then agreed to do a feasibility study for heating

systems in the elementary building.

They agreed to hire Charles Williams as junior high math teacher for the remainder of the year on the salary schedule.

Also hired with Doris Guyton, who was hired as an aide for the handicap program for the remainder of the year at \$35 per day.

Trustees received a letter from coach Joe Ray Riley, who resigned his position as head football coach, asking for re-assignment.

His resignation was accepted, contingent on re-assignment.

Trustees then went into executive session at 6:46 to discuss personal. The meeting was re-opened at 8:18, and trustees decided to employ elementary principal Dorman Thomas for 1985-1986 school year at the present salary.

No action was taken on high school principal Ron Cummings. The meeting was dismissed at 8:24 p.m.

A little over three years ago — January 8, 1982, to be exact — we were stunned by the announcement that AT&T would divest itself of 22 operating companies, including Southwestern Bell in exchange for the federal government dropping its 8-year-old anti-trust suit.

Most of us remember that moment: where we were when we heard the news, the looks on the faces around us, the feeling in the pit of the stomach as it slowly dawned on us what it was going to take to dismember the world's largest corporation.

We did what we had to do — all the while wondering if it would work.

Today, it works. Although every one of us is still analyzing divestiture's effects on our responsibility areas and working out the glitches, we've come a long way.

Service has remained at quality levels

A year ago, when divestiture took place, some thought the Bell System breakup would cause local telephone service to deteriorate drastically. But it hasn't.

And the many changes haven't always been easy — on you or on us. We still don't know where some of our longtime work friends in other departments wound up. And I can imagine the consternation of many customers who had been accustomed over the years to one call doing all, being told overnight they would have to get their own telephones.

To help you with your questions, we introduced a series of informational booklets in 1984 called "Tele-Help." And, as a result of your questions, more booklets are coming this year, including a series for small businesses.

New revenues, new services and budget cutting

One of the principal axioms of our business has always been, "to serve well, we must earn well." Since divestiture, that's never been truer in Texas.

It's important to point out we've managed to get through the first year on our own as a stand-alone company without any significant increase in local residence rates. In fact, flat-rate residential service increased only 30 cents per month in 1984 — and that was the result of a rate filing a year earlier.

And despite all the havoc of divestiture, our internal measurements tell us service has never been better in Texas.

But more than ever, we understand that really satisfying customers requires a great deal more than looking good on a monthly service report. We know we have some weak spots, but we're working on them.

You see, the ultimate judge is not what our surveys tell us, but what you tell us.

And serving you is our only business. We appreciate the opportunity to do so.
