George Terry was elected mayor of McLean Saturday in a record turnout of voters for a city election. According to election judge S. A. Cousins, the 377 voters who cast their ballots was the largest number in recent years in a city election. Terry polled 147 votes. His closest opponent was Wayne Bybee with 89 votes. F. J. Hess had 81 and David Haynes had 58.

In the city council elections, a former city councilman W. A. Bentley led the ticket with 253 votes, followed by Lloyd Bybee with 177. Both men will be seated on the council. Other candidates were June Suggs with 96 votes, Miro Pakan with 92, and Cindy McDowell with 77.

The election of Terry will create an opening on the city council. According to city attorney Don Lane, Article 989 of the Texas Civil Statutes provides that one vacancy on the council can be filled by appointment of the council. The appointee will serve out the unexpired term. The state also provides that the council could call a special election, but that the election could not be set until the second Saturday in August. The law makes no provision about who the council should appoint to fill the va-

cancy.

In the school board election, Department of Public Safety trooper John Holland led the nine candidates for three places with 292 votes. Incumbent Darryel Herndon was returned to

the board with 200 votes. The third place on the board went to Tommy Cole with 132 votes.

Other candidates were Thacker Haynes, 121 votes; Ed Patman, 113 votes; Wendell Ridgway, 102 votes; Gwen Henley,

104 votes; Sonnie Bybee, 40 votes; and Linda Syfrett, 30 votes.

The new mayor and the council members will be sworn into office and begin their terms at the council meeting April 12 at the City Hall.

## Board Members Sworn In

Newly-elected board members were sworn in Monday night, and officers were elected at a meeting of the McLean Independent School District school board in the school business office. John Holland, incumbent Darryel Herndon, and Tommy Cole were issued the oath of office at the meeting. The new board elected Lloyd Hunt to serve as president, Joe Magee as vice-president, and Darryel Herndon as secretary.

The board accepted resignations from Evelyn and Earl Riley, custodians, and from Pat Washburn, the ag teacher. The board hired Jack Brewster as industrial arts teacher and assistant coach at a salary of state scale plus \$2250. The board also offered a contract to Roger Myers as band director at state scale plus \$2000.

Joe Billingsley was hired as a custodian to replace Evelyn Riley at \$110 per month. He will

also serve as a bus driver.

The board renewed the contracts for the auxiliary personnel, renewing contracts for Jo Blaylock, head cook; and cooks Mary Bybee, Marie Cummings, and Jeanne

Smith; custodian Sandra Bailey; bus foreman Frank Sparlin; clerk Rose Ann Shank; and bus drivers Tom Adamson, Cecil Reynolds, Margaret Milam, Frank Sparlin, and Carol Abigt.

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## TV Disaster Alert System Brings Added Safety To City

When Sammons Communications finishes installation of a new disaster alert device throughout its system, the residents of small towns in the Texas Panhandle will be better protected from storms, according to manager John Mason. The McLean City Council recently approved payment for a telephone line from the Sammons tower to a location in McLean. A telephone will be located in the city (probably in the fire station) so that weather spotters can pick up the phone, dial a special code number, and alert all cable subscribers about an approaching storm.

Mason said that the code number will allow the voice of the telephone caller to enter all channels on the cable. The

voice will be broadcast on the air and will give warning of danger.

Mason said that Sammons will install two pieces of equipment at their tower in McLean to activate the system. He said that Borger and Pampa have had the system for a while, but that Sammons is trying to install the system in all the small towns which the company serves.

There will be no extra charge to cable customers, Mason said. "This is strictly a service for our customers," he said. "We thought this was one thing our company could do to help protect lives and customers in the area we serve."

Mason said that the system will be activated as soon as the equipment arrives and can be installed.

## Firemen Fight Grassfires

McLean Volunteer Firemen extinguished two grass fires Wednesday which occurred within about thirty minutes of each other. The firemen were called to the James Hefley place five miles south of McLean about 2 p.m., and then to the Joe Magee place one and one-half miles south of McLean. The two ranchers were burning off pasture land when the fires

got out of control. The McLean firemen fought the fires until about 5:30 p.m. According to fire chief Jim McDonald, the firemen used the county's water truck to help fight the fires. "We are in bad need of a water truck big enough to serve the fire department," McDonald said. "We appreciate the county letting us use the truck until we can secure one."

## Kill All The Lawyers?

Falstaff's remedy was undoubtedly a bit drastic, but the antics of some lawyers, including those notorious nit-pickers on the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals, lend it a certain appeal (no pun intended).  
"The first thing we do," Sir John advised the King, "we kill all the lawyers."  
Legalists on the State's highest criminal court have made a shambles of the law and justice in Texas for many years... overturning jury decisions right and left on the flimsiest of technicalities... and there are signs that a revolution is brewing. It is long overdue.

A bill is now before the state legislature which is aimed at blocking a key avenue of appeal in criminal cases, the technically-flawed indictment, one of the most flagrantly-abused of legal loopholes.

The proposed law would require defendants (and their attorneys) in criminal actions to raise objections to an indictment before...not after...a trial. Any minute slip in the working of an indictment can be, and often is, used by sharp-eyed criminal lawyers to gain reversals of jury decision which have gone against their clients, costly (to the taxpayer) new trials, long delays and not-infrequent miscarriages of justice because of them, resulting in the release from custody of some of our most vicious criminals.

In league with the attorneys for criminal defense are the mis-named "justices" of the Court of Criminal Appeals who seize on the flimsiest technicalities in the law to thwart the work of public prosecutors and enforcement officers and overturn the decisions of juries, loading the scales of justice in favor of the criminal element.

It is a game they play, these legal eagles who earn fat fees in private criminal practice, and they get their kicks, apparently, from tripping up their overworked and underpaid adversaries in the public sector in the weblike network of laws which they have helped to create. And the referees in this adversary game are the nit-picking brethren who win election to the Court of Criminal Appeals who become a part of the game, which is to determine who can twist the law most deviously.

The law which the Legislature is currently trying to enact is aimed at un-doing some of the mischief which those same legislators, themselves predominantly lawyers, have created over the years by

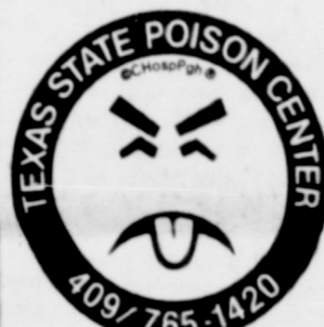

#### WORK RELEASE PROGRAM

AUSTIN - Texas has the largest prison system in the nation and the third largest prison system in the world. We are by no means proud of the statistics and we are working on legislation to help reverse the escalating figures. We are sponsoring a work release bill, known as Senate Bill 779, to help ease overcrowding of our state prison system, and at the same time save taxpayers an enormous amount of money.

We feel that not all criminal offenders or even the taxpayers of this state are best served by offenders being sent to county jails or to the Texas Department of Corrections in Huntsville. This bill will formalize the procedure involved in determining qualifications of prisoners wishing to participate in a work release program. It also encourages those counties who presently do not have such programs to establish one.

In addition, S. B. 779 will formalize the responsibilities of each of the parties involved in work release programs. Potter County officials have formalized a very successful work release program which we believe will serve as a model for other counties in the state. Potter County Sheriff T.L. Baker implemented a work release program in Potter County in 1974. The continued development and expansion of the program initiated at the Potter County Corrections Center and the success of the program has prompted the drafting of S. B. 779.

Existing law allows persons convicted of misdemeanor offenses to serve jail time during the offender's off hours and on weekends. The law we are sponsoring would include third degree felons who were convicted of non-violent crimes. The rationale behind S. B. 779 to allow the non-violent

offender to become a productive member of society by maintaining employment and serving jail time after working hours. By allowing the offender to maintain employment the offender is able to provide financial support to his or her family, repay the county for court costs and fines and pay restitution to the victims of the crime. The new legislation would make it mandatory for the offender's employer to send the offender's paycheck directly to the county sheriff. The sheriff would then be responsible for distributing the offender's earnings to the offender's dependents, to the county for court costs and fines and to pay restitution to the victims of the crime. All remaining earnings will be kept in a special fund and will be returned to the offender once his time has been served.

Any offender wishing to participate in the work release program under the proposed legislation will be required to apply for the program and must prove he or she has not committed a violent crime. The sheriff will decide who is permitted to participate in a work release program.

We see this bill as one solution to the many problems caused by today's prison situation. We are not stating that work release is for everyone, it's not, but for those offenders who would be better served by remaining a part of the community, this bill provides an opportunity for them to do so. In addition, it reduces the number of hardships on the taxpayers of our state by requiring the offender to work for his family, county and state. ### In The Kitchen

A new edition of The Gray County Heritage Cookbook is now on sale at The McLean News office. This book is at least twice as large as the earlier edition published last fall. If you have not bought a copy of this historical momento, you will be missing out on a real treat. Not only does the book feature outstanding recipes, it also has interesting pictures and historical notes. I spent several weeks last year looking for a good recipe for pickled okra, and I opened the new Heritage cookbook and there one was.

**Pickled Okra**  
Mrs. T. C. Carter  
Mrs. Ewing Cobb  
Put okra in pint jars.  
Mix 1/2 gallon vinegar, 1/2

gallon water, and 1 cup salt. Bring to a boil and pour over okra in jars. To each pint jar add 1 hot pepper, 1 section of a clove of garlic, and 1 t. dill seed. For a smaller amount use 1 cup water, 1 cup vinegar and 1/8 cup salt (or 2 scant T.). This will cover 2 pints of okra.

And how about this interesting, old recipe....

**Kraut**  
4 T. salt  
5 lbs. shredded cabbage.

Mix well; pack in fruit jars. Put lid on; place in warm place, but not hot. Screw tops on tight; put away for a month or more while cabbage is making kraut. Do not use vinegar and do not cook.

I've always allowed that the rigors of life are better than rigor mortis.

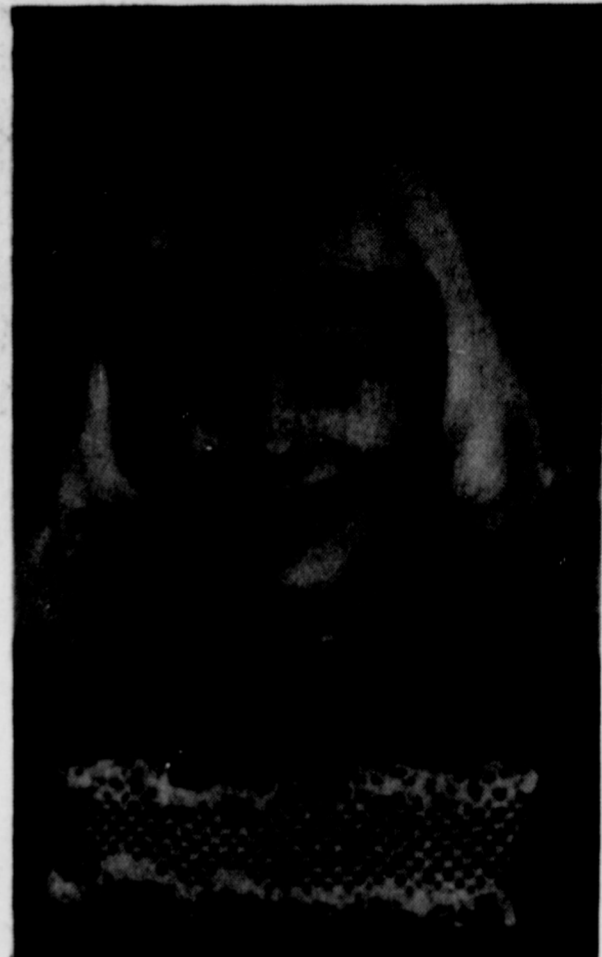

Continued From Page 2 weaving all those loopholes into the law in the first place. Abuses of the law have become so flagrant that even the legislative branch of the legal profession is becoming appalled, and the public pressure for reform is growing.

But no less an authority than Judge Truman Roberts, just-retired member of the Court of Criminal Appeals and one of the most flagrant of the nit-pickers, defies the Legislature to produce reform. Judge Roberts declares that the proposed law, if passed, will never hold up in court...not, at any rate, in the Court of Criminal Appeals...and the worst part of it is that he may be right.

"I think the Appeals Court would knock that down before it could come out of the chute," Roberts tells the press.

Judge Roberts should know...he has a fine batting average on technicalities.

So we may yet have to invoke that Falstaffian remedy...beginning with the Court of Criminal Appeals.
