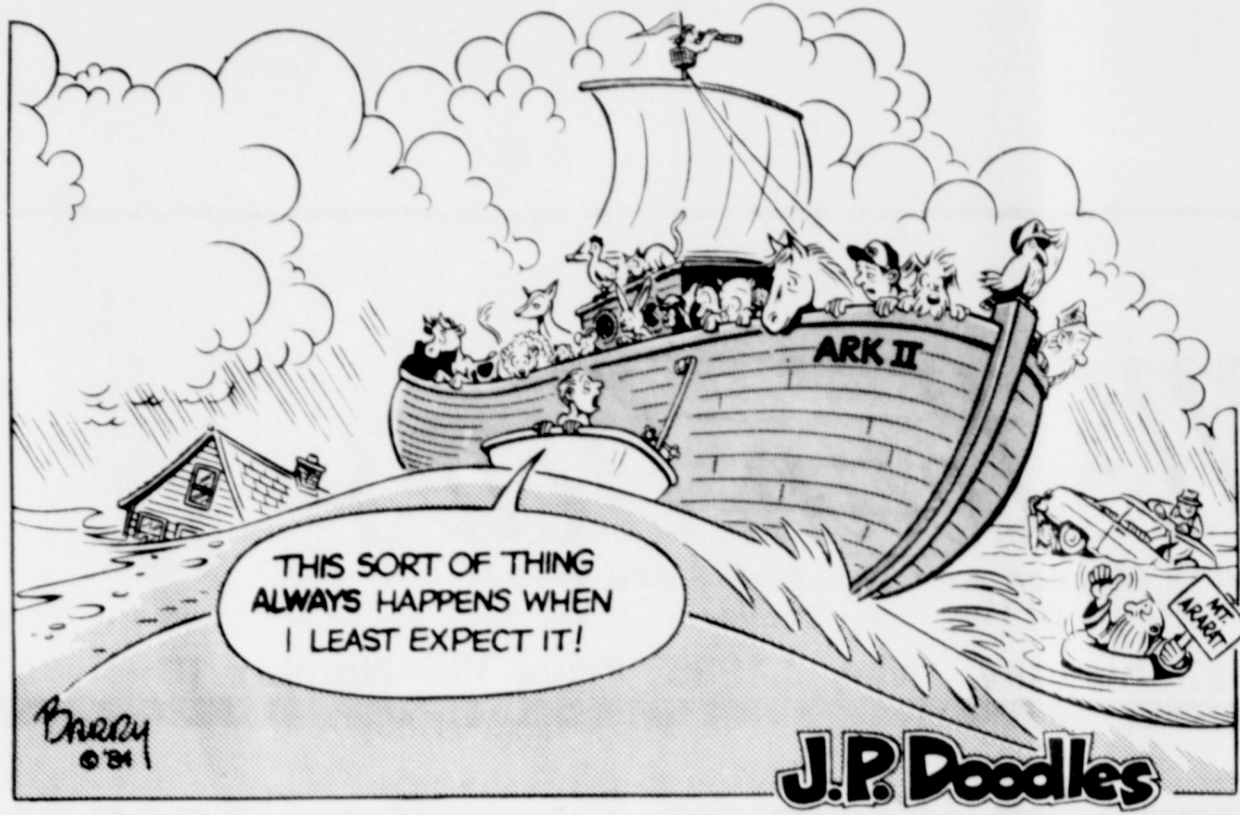
He has attended Abilene Christian College, Harding Col-

Because of Friday's inclement weather, the annual McLean Elementary Play Day was cancelled. McLean received over .70 of rain the Thursday night and the track and football

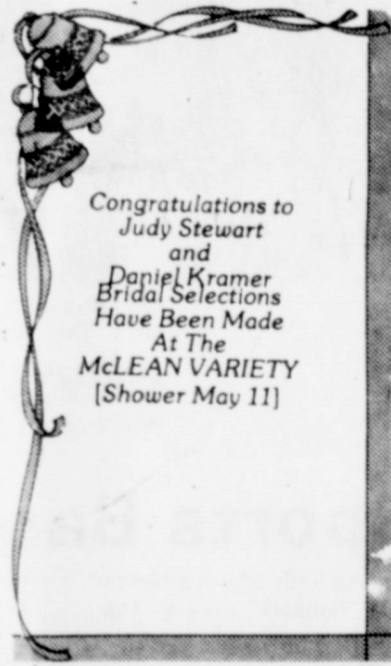

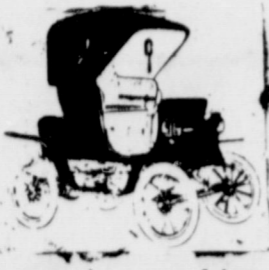

## Airman James D.Reid

### Participates In 'Team Spirit 85'

Air Force Airman James D. Reid, son of Rex and Betty Reid of McLean, has participated in Team Spirit '85.

This is the largest joint, combined field training exercise in the free world this year, on the mountainous peninsula of South Korea.

The exercise involved members of all services of both the Republic of Korea and the U.S. Under the auspices of the ROK/US Combined Forces Command, 200,000 participants from forces currently stationed in Korea and from other locations within the Pacific Command and the United States put their best foot forward.

Team Spirit '85 was the 10th annual exercise of its kind and involved the deployment, reception and employment of U.S. and Republic of Korea forces responding to possible contingencies in the Korean Theatre.

The purpose of the exercise is to evaluate and improve procedures and techniques to be employed during a defense of South Korea. It is designed to

increase combat readiness of all participants, with emphasis in joint and combined operations.

Reid is an aircraft fuel systems mechanic with the 3rd Tactical Fighter Wing at Clark Air Force Base, Philippines.

## Cookin' With Asparagus

### COOKING WITH ASPARAGUS

While shopping in Puckett's Monday afternoon, I came upon some fresh asparagus, and immediately began grabbing as much as I could take home and eat. Although I had to beat Ida Hess off with a stick, I was able to get plenty for our supper.

I just steamed it that night, but I decided I'd try a few of these recipes out next time.

**Stir-Fried Asparagus**  
 1 whole chicken breast  
 1 pound asparagus  
 2 tablespoons oil  
 2 cloves garlic, minced  
 1/2 cup chicken broth  
 1 tablespoon sherry  
 2 tablespoons soy sauce  
 2 teaspoons corn starch  
 2 teaspoons cold water  
 1/2 teaspoon MSG (optional)  
 1/4 teaspoon sugar  
 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 1/8 teaspoon black pepper  
 2 tablespoons toasted sesame seeds

Skin, bone, and cut chicken into thin strips. Snap off lower portions of asparagus. Wash spears and slice diagonally in 2-9 inch pieces, leaving tips whole.

Heat skillet or wok and add 1 tablespoon oil and garlic. Add asparagus and stir-fry 30 seconds. Remove asparagus from skillet and keep warm.

Reheat skillet and add remaining oil. Add chicken and stir-fry 30 seconds. Add chicken broth, sherry, and soy sauce and cook 2 to 3 minutes, or until chicken turns white. Add asparagus and stir with chicken one minute.

Blend cornstarch and water.

Stir into asparagus mixture and cook, stirring, until thickened. Sprinkle with MSG, sugar, salt, pepper, and sesame seeds. Makes 4 servings.

**Asparagus with Browned Butter**  
 (This simple treatment is best

for crisp, fresh asparagus.)  
 1/2 cup butter or margarine  
 1 tablespoon lemon juice  
 2 1/2 pounds asparagus, cooked  
 Chopped Parsley  
 Heat butter in saucepan until pale brown. Add lemon juice

and mix well. Serve over hot asparagus. Sprinkle with parsley. Makes 6 servings.

**Asparagus Cantonese**  
 2 tablespoons oil

1 clove garlic, crushed  
 2 pounds asparagus, sliced diagonally  
 Salt, Pepper  
 Heat oil in skillet over high heat almost to smoking point.

Stir in garlic, then add asparagus. Cover and shake pan vigorously for 3 to 5 minutes. Asparagus should be crisp-tender. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Makes 8 servings.

## TSTA Seeking New Teacher Insurance Legislation

Representatives of the Texas State Teachers Association told members of the House Education Committee that teachers in 220 Texas school districts have no health insurance.

Jack Kelly, TSTA governmental relations specialist, said the State of Texas is literally "gambling" with the health of these unprotected teachers by not providing a minimal state-funded health policy.

"The state provides teachers with a minimum salary schedule, five days of sick leave and a retirement program that has become a biennial source of revenue to balance the state budget and that's it!" Kelly told the lawmakers.

TSTA is seeking legislation to establish group health insurance for teachers.

Testimony by TSTA followed three weeks of intensive lobbying on the Senate side of the state legislature for Senate Bill 525, an omnibus bill which passed the Senate last week.

"We are extremely pleased that the Senate voted to incorporate several TSTA bills into SB 525 which amends House Bill 72, the education reform bill enacted last summer," Kelly said.

TSTA was successful in get-

ting the Senators to provide more funding for the career ladder and to speed up the implementation of levels three and four of the ladder in order to achieve the plan's original goal of rewarding experienced teachers.

The amendments will also

credit teachers for course-work begun before HB 72 was enacted and it allows teachers to appeal arbitrary, capricious and bad faith decisions regarding their placement on the career ladder.

The senators also adopted language giving teachers more

authority over discipline in their classrooms. Additionally, the new bill will minimize teacher paperwork and require school districts to pay certified teachers who volunteer to tutor before or after school for their work.

Earlier the Senate adopted

TSTA's duty-free lunch bill which was carried in the Senate by Sen. Carlos Truan of Corpus Christi.

TSTA is intensifying its efforts to get the same amendments adopted in the House which is necessary for final passage of the measure.

### Resident's Nephew Dies In Accident

Wesley Daniel, pastor, officiating. Burial was at 4 p.m. in the Citizens Cemetery in Clarendon by Hammons Funeral Home.

Bailey County of Justice of the Peace Jack Bates said Bogard was breaking two young horses when one of the horses kicked Bogard once in the chest.

Bates said Bogard and Bill Welch had tied the two horses to a nearby fence, when one of the animals started "acting up" at about 1 p.m.

When Bogard approached the horse from behind to calm the animal, it apparently was frightened and kicked him in the chest, Bates said.

He was pronounced dead at the scene at about 2 p.m. by Bates, who ruled the death accidental. No autopsy was ordered.

Bogard was born in Brown-

field and graduated from Bula High School. He was a member of the Professional Rodeo Association. He lived with his parents and worked on their farm.

Survivors include his parents, Tom and Dorothy Bogard of Bula; three sisters, Tommie Ann Gaston and Opel Roberts, both of Junction, and Barbara Kinnison of Olton; and a brother Jake Bogard of Charlie.

He was the nephew of Mrs. Eva Peabody of McLean.

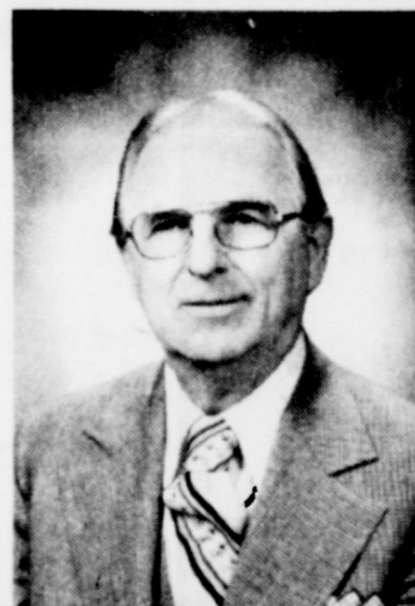

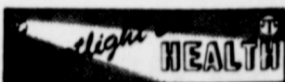

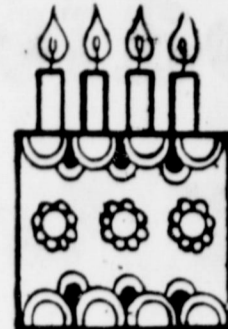
