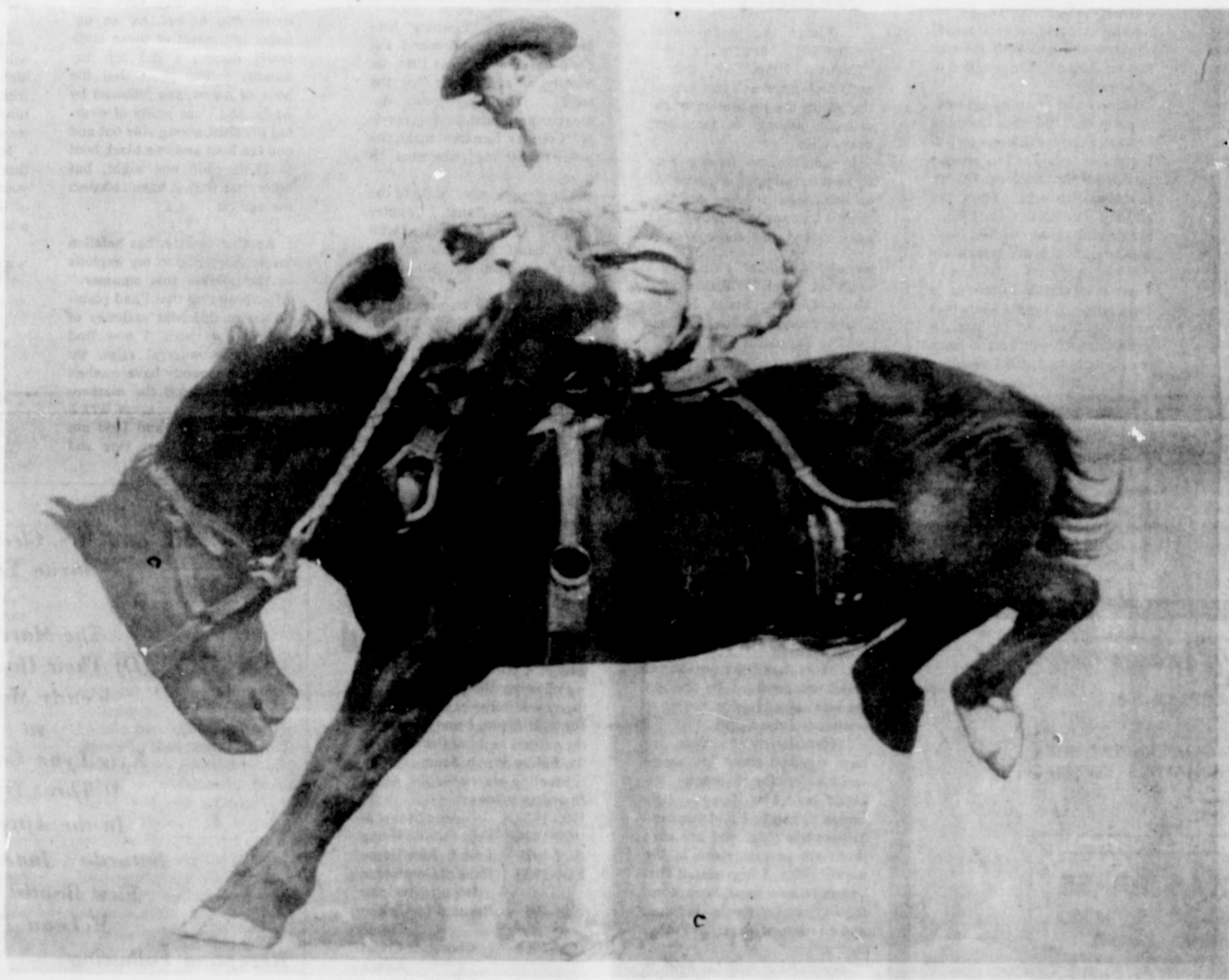

## Haynes Resigns From Board; Accreditation and TABS Discussed

Following the resignation of board member Thacker Haynes, MISD trustees voted to hire Sam D. Haynes of McLean, subject to assignment, in their monthly meeting Monday night.

Thacker Haynes, who was elected to the board of trustees following the April, 1984 election, is a first-cousin to Sam D. Haynes, and resigned to avoid a nepotism conflict within the school district.

In a statement given to **The McLean News**, Thacker Haynes said, "I have really enjoyed serving the people of McLean in this capacity. I have learned a tremendous amount concerning the working of the school, and look forward to serving the people of McLean in whatever way I may. I have much faith in the board members with whom I served, and feel they are doing their best to make McLean an educationally and athletically competitive school."

Sam D. Haynes has two years coaching experience and began work for the McLean schools in December, 1984 as a substitute teacher and coach, filling the position of former coach Jack Routt.

In other business, the board discussed and approved a rate increase and an overall coverage increase of insurance for all school properties. According to insurance agent Jane Herndon, the rates on schools, churches, and municipalities are currently increasing as all insurance companies are considering them a "poor class of business to cover". Mrs. Herndon also explained that the loss ratio has been much higher recently on churches, schools, and municipalities and the coverage will be higher as a result.

Board member Darryl Herndon abstained from the voting on the issue.

Superintendent Jim Rutherford discussed with the board the letter received from Carl L. (Baug) chairperson of the Texas Education Agency Division of Accreditation. In the letter to Mr. Rutherford, Debaugh commended the superintendent and the staff for their cooperation with the monitoring team during the course of the visit.

The school rated the high rating of "Substantial Compliance" in 25 of the 36 areas discussed. Receiving "Substantial Compliance" ratings were: I. Governance - A. Community condition C. Separation

of powers between board and superintendent, D. Board Policies, E. Public Information systems, F. Public involvement, II. Accreditation Planning Process, III. Curriculum and Instruction - A. Time allotments, K-6; B. Class Sizes; C. Essential elements begun K-6; Subjects and time allotments grades 7-8; Grade 9 under new graduation requirements; F. Status of curriculum documents; G. Utilization of curriculum documents; H. Coordination of special program with regular instruction; I. Variety of instructional arrangements; K. Process of assessing student achievement; L. Use of TABS and other test data; P. Principal as instructional leader. IV. Personnel - B. Personnel records; C. Recruitment and hiring; D. Job Description/evaluation; E. Staff development; F. Planning/preparation period; C. Safety practices; D. Health department standards.

"Areas of Concern" included Board minutes. "The Board minutes should be signed by the president and secretary of the board. There were several cases, dating as far back as August 13, 1984, where at least one of these signatures was missing. Board officers need to sign these minutes as soon as possible."

Curriculum and Instruction - Availability and variety of instructional materials. "Varied learning center approaches, including listening centers, would enhance the excellent instruction and improve the program in all areas."

Library and learning resources program. "Neither Learning Resource Center (Elementary or Secondary) could at the present time meet the requirements for Learning Resource Center beginning September 1, 1985. Books and resources are inadequate. Books in elementary classrooms are not catalogued. There is no certified librarian in the district. It's quite likely that someone from the Division of Accreditation will return near the September 1, 1985 deadline to check the progress toward meeting the 1985 standards."

Health Services - "Health services should not be the job of the elementary principal. The district should explore all possibilities to secure the services of a part-time nurse so that these duties are not placed on the elementary principal."

### Lynna's Macaroni Salad

1 bell pepper  
1 small carton sour cream

well and place in refrigerator and let set overnight. Next day, dice bell pepper and celery, stir in sour cream, and add to macaroni mixture.

### GINGER BELL PEPPER SALAD

Two bell peppers, diced  
1 lg. purple onion, diced  
Several tomatoes  
garlic to taste  
Several tomatoes, diced  
Combine all vegetables, sprinkle on garlic powder or salt. Let set in refrigerator overnight. (I take some extra tomatoes and pour the juice from them over the salad to make it a little juicier.)

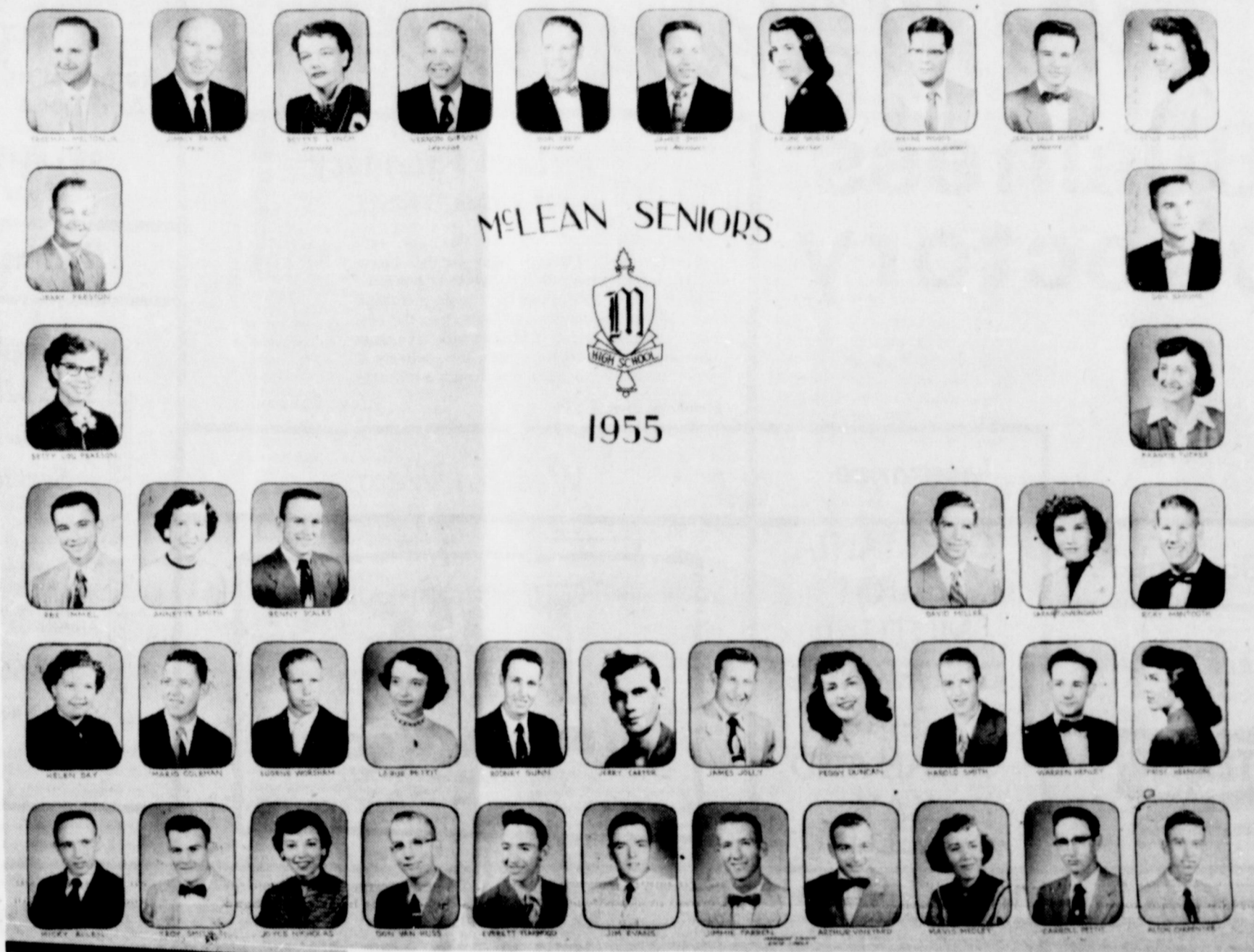

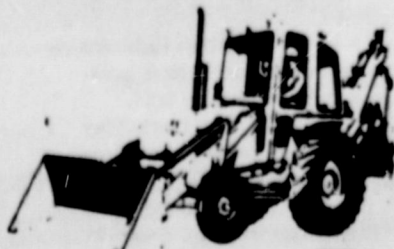

physical facilities. "The following facilities are not suitable: There are no baskets in the boys dressing area in the gym. There are holes in the sheetrock in the gym."

Maintenance of physical facilities. "The following facilities are in need of maintenance: There is a plumbing leak in the boys' restroom in the elementary school. There are three dining room chairs in the home-making facility that need to be repaired or discarded."

Other Issues - Rental of Gym from City. "It is recommended that the school district build its own gym and discontinue renting from the City as soon as possible."

There were only three areas listed under "Corrective Action Required". Under Curriculum and Instruction - Counseling Services. "Counseling and guidance services were not accessible to students as required by Principal 5 Standard 13, Page 30 of Principles, Standards, and Procedures for the Accreditation of School Districts, December, 1982 printing.

Compliance with other curriculum rules. "The district is reminded that Chapter 75 of the Texas Administrative Code requires that certain courses must be offered beginning with the 1985-86 school year. At the present time, the district provides no instruction in any foreign language. Two years of instruction in the same foreign language will be the new minimum."

In a follow-up letter sent by Defibaugh, the school was given an August 1, 1985 deadline to provide evidence to the Division of Accreditation (that appropriate action has been planned or has taken place for the above areas.

Mr. Rutherford informed the board that the school had already begun work on the above items, and that no problems were anticipated.

The Division of Accreditation recommended that McLean's Independent School District's current accreditation status is accredited. When appropriate corrective actions and/or corrections have taken place, a recommendation will be made that McLean Independent School District continue as fully accredited.

Following the discussion of the Accreditation visit, results from the Texas Assessment of Basic Skills were discussed. Students in the third, fifth, and ninth grade were tested this year, and according to Rutherford, a tremendous overall increase was shown in the averages.

"Our objective over the past four years has been to bring up our averages up to 85% or better," said Rutherford. "We've increased about 40% in

## YOUR GARDEN

Container Gardening  
By Carl Totemier  
Member, The American Horticultural Society

Apartment life no longer need keep budding horticulturalists from blooming, thanks to the growing popularity of container gardening.



Containers can be made from many materials, from unglazed terracotta to fiberglass or plastic. Fiberglass and plastic require less water so they're better choices for the gardener who is away from home during the day. Container plants need more frequent watering than outside plants, however, so be sure your container has adequate drainage. This can be assured usually through one or more holes in its base. Water when soil feels dry and apply till water begins to drain from the container.

Since the roots of container grown plants are confined, a good soil mixture is essential. Artificial soil mixtures are convenient but often lack sufficient trace elements such as iron. This is easily supplied with a fertilizer such as Stern's Miracle-Gro All-Purpose Plant Food. It's water soluble. This prevents the plants from becoming yellow and stunted. Conditions that often occur with container plants due to frequent watering and rapid summer growth.
