McLean Pharmacy Begins Third Week Of Business

McLean's newest business is beginning its third week of operation as the new year approaches.

The Pharmacy, owned solely by Paul and Elmonette Bivens, opened for business in the lobby of the McLean hospital shortly after Parsons Drug, previously McLean's only drug store, closed.

The Bivenses, co-owners of Bivens Pharmacy in Clarendon and registered pharmacists, agreed to open a pharmacy in McLean after receiving several requests from McLean citizens.

"We did not necessarily see a 'golden money-making opportunity' here and decide to jump in and open the store," Mrs. Bivens explained. "We did, however, see a strong need for a pharmacy and we believe McLean will have no problem supporting its own drug store."

The pharmacy is open Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. Their phone number is 779-2525. "We can refill all medications here," explained Mrs. Bivens. "All we ask is that you bring in your bottle and we'll take care of the necessary details to get the prescription refilled."

She also added that those citizens who were not yet out of a prescription medicine might come into the store and let the Pharmacy know they would soon need the refill and what type of medication would be required.

"While we have a good supply of pharmaceuticals, we'd like to make sure that the medicine will be on hand at the time the refill is needed," she said.

The Bivenses have many plans for the future of McLean's Drug Store and welcome all residents of McLean and the surrounding areas to stop in and let them assist you in your pharmaceutical needs.

I recently had the opportunity to visit with Elmonette Bivens, co-owner of the new pharmacy located in the lobby of the hospital.

The pharmacy is owned by Mrs. Bivens and her husband, Paul, who is also a registered pharmacist. The couple also own Bivens Pharmacy in Clarendon.

Mrs. Bivens is a delightful, energetic person and has nothing but the best for McLean and its populace in mind.

She and her staff have vowed to make everything as easy as possible for the citizens of McLean and it's my personal belief they're fulfilling that promise.

It is true that the trooper received only minor injuries while the Smith family received serious and fatal injuries; it is also true that the trooper was wearing a seatbelt and the others were not. If he hadn't been, his injuries would have

I am not too familiar with the media's interpretation of a "happening", except that it probably has something to do with the purchase of a 1979 car from the dealer or a mortgage broker who tells you like it is.

But to the World War #1 Veteran, now in his upper eighties or low nineties - it has a far different meaning. During his most productive years, he labored assiduously at 50 cents to 75 cents an hour to pay off the mortgage on the home that he hoped to own eventually. But now with taxes and insurance about as much as mortgage payments used to be, he wonders at the futility of it all. At age 65, his employer tells him he must be retired from gainful employment. The federal government subsidizes his continued existence with meagre social security allotments and the Veterans Administration adds a monthly "welfare contribution". All gifts wrapped with income make limitations.

During years past, with decreasing purchasing power of the dollar, two persons really have been required to live as cheaply as one. The comes the day when the Veteran's life partner has been put to rest.

Cut pork into thin slices, then into thin strips. Combine remaining cornstarch and soy sauce, ginger, garlic and sugar; stir in pork. Heat 1 tablespoon oil in wok or large skillet over high heat. Add pork and stir-fry about 1 minute, or until lightly browned; remove. Heat remaining oil in same wok. Add onion and stir-fry 2 minutes. Add cabbage; stir-fry 1 minute. Add tomatoes, pork and soy sauce mixture. Cook and stir gently until sauce boils and thickens. Gently fold in tofu; heat through. Makes 4 servings.

NOTE: If using romaine, increase water to 1/2 cup.

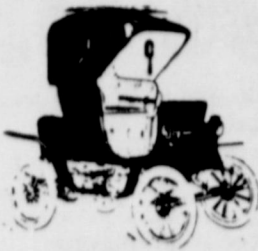

ASTERWAYS WITH MICROWAYS

SPICY APPLE GROG

Total cooking time: 15 minutes

3 cups apple cider 1 750-milliliter bottle pop
2 cups white grape juice apple wine
1 16-ounce jar spiced crab apples 1 cup brandy

In 4-quart bowl combine apple cider, grape juice, and undrained crab apples. Place in microwave oven.
Cook cider mixture, uncovered, at HIGH for 10 minutes. Stir in apple wine and brandy. Cook at HIGH for 5 minutes till heated through. Pour into mugs; add a crab apple to each mug. Makes 10 cups.

MOCHA TODDIES

Total cooking time: 3 minutes

1/4 cup water 1 cup rum
1 2-ounce jar (1/4 cup) instant coffee crystals 1 tablespoon vanilla Milk
1 16-ounce can (1 1/2 cups) chocolate syrup Vanilla ice cream

Measure water in a 4-cup glass measure. Place in microwave oven.
Heat water at HIGH for 1 minute. Add coffee crystals and stir till dissolved. Blend in syrup, rum, and vanilla. Store covered in refrigerator. Makes 25 servings.
To serve: Place 2 tablespoons mocha base in each heat-proof mug. Add 1/4 cup milk to each mug. Stir to combine.
Heat mugs at HIGH till hot. Top each mug with a scoop of vanilla ice cream.

CRANBERRY WINE CUP

Total cooking time: 15 minutes

2 cups cranberry juice 2 inches stick cinnamon
cocktail 6 whole cloves
1 cup water 1 750-milliliter bottle dry red wine
1/2 cup sugar 2 tablespoons lemon juice
Peel of 1/4 lemon, cut in strips

In 3-quart bowl combine cranberry juice, water, sugar, and lemon peel. Tie cinnamon stick and cloves in cheesecloth bag; add to bowl. Place in microwave oven.
Cook cranberry juice mixture at HIGH for 10 minutes till almost boiling and sugar is dissolved. Discard spice bag and lemon peel. Add wine and lemon juice.
Cook at HIGH for 5 minutes till heated through. Garnish with skewered cranberries. Makes 6 cups.

WALLBANGER WASSAIL

Total cooking time: 21 minutes

1 12-ounce can frozen orange juice concentrate
1 6-ounce can frozen lemonade concentrate
6 cups water
1/4 to 1/2 cup sugar
6 inches stick cinnamon
1 teaspoon whole cardamom seeds
1 cup vodka
1/2 cup Galliano liqueur

In 3-quart bowl combine undiluted juice concentrates, water, and sugar. Place in microwave oven.

Heat juice mixture at HIGH for 10 minutes till almost boiling and sugar is dissolved. Tie cinnamon sticks and cardamom seeds in cheesecloth bag; add to bowl. Cook at HIGH for 7 minutes. Discard spice bag. Stir in vodka and Galliano.

Heat mixture at HIGH for 4 minutes till hot. Garnish with orange slices. Makes 9 cups.
