McLean's newest business is beginning its third week of operation as the new year opproches.

The Pharmacy, owned solely by Paul and Elmonette Bivens. opened for business in the lobby of the McLean hospital shortly after Parsons Drug, previously McLean's only drug store, closed.

The Bivenses, co-owners of Bivens Pharmacy in Clarendon and registered pharmacists, agreed to open a pharmacy in McLean after receiving several requests from McLean citizens.

'We did not necessarily see a golden money-making opportunity" here and decide to jump in and open the store," Mrs. Bivens explained. "We did, however, see a strong need for a pharmacy and we beleive Mc-Lean will have no problem

supporting its own drug store." The pharmacy is open Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. Their phone num-

ber is 779-2525. "We can refil all medications here," explained Mrs. Bivens. "All we ask is that you bring in your bottle and we'll take care of the necessary details to get the prescription refilled."

She also added that those citizens who were not yet out of a prescription medicine might come into the store and let the Pharmacy know they would sonn need the refill and what type of medication would be required.

"While we have a good supply of pharmaceuticals, we'd like to make sure that the medicine will be on hand at the time the refill is needed," she

Dear Editor:

It is a shame to see the news media so quick to condemn our law enforcement agencies -the Department of Public Safety

(DPS) in particular. The Pampa News has a constitutional right to express their opinions -- no matter how short-sighted they may be. I too would like to exercise my constitutional right and express my opinion concerning two articles, "Crash Expert to Reconstruct Wreck" and "Our Opinion", which appeared in the Sunday, De-

cember 30, paper. The nearsightedness of the author or authors was shown throughout the articles. The author was so busy trying to find fault with DPS policies that many facts were overlooked: The drag racers were endangering everyone on the street at the time. They weren't potential criminals, they were criminals! The general public was ignoring the lights and sirens of the police vehicle -- a violation of the law. Perhaps if the public had followed proper procedures concerning emergency vehicles, the tragedy would have been avoided and the reckless drag racers would have been apprehended.

It is true that the trooper received only minor injuries while the Smith family received serious and fatal injuries; it is. also true that the trooper was wearing a seatbelt and the others were not. If he hadn't been, his injuries would have

been serious -- probably fatal. Instead of making it sound like a crime that he wasn't hurt worse, why not use the incident to encourage others to wear their seatbelts?

If Trooper Carter had not pursued the racers and they had been involved in the wreck, everyone would have pointed the finger and asked, didn't you stop them?"

It was not Trooper Carter or OPS policies that killed Mrs. Smith and injured her husband and her daughter. It was the fault of the drag racers and also hat of the general public for not giving the right-of-way to the trooper in pursuit. Too many raffic laws were broken by the public to let one man carry all the blame and guilt.

My heart goes out not only to he victims and their family, but also goes out to the trooper wovled who will carry the orrow with him always.

am not too familiar with the media's interpretation of a 'happening'', except that it probably has something to do with the purchase of a 1979 car from the dealer or a mortgage broker who tells you like it is.

But to the World War \*1 Veteran, now in his upper eighties or low nineties - it has a far different meaning. During his most productive years, he labored asseduously at 50 cents to 75 cents an hour to pay off the mortgage on the home that he hound to own eventually. But now with taxes and insurance about as much as mortgage payments used to be, he wonders at the futility of it all. At age 65, his employer tells him he must be retired from gainful employment. The federal government subsidizes his continued existence with meagre social security allotments and the Veterans Administration adds a monthly "welfare contribution". All gifts wrapped with income make limitations.

During years past, with decreasing purchasing power of he dollalr, two persons really have been required to live as cheaply as one. The comes the day when the Veteran's life partner has been put to rest.

Social security slaps off one third of its monthly contributions. The old man likewise must inform the Veteran's Administration, who determines if they should take away all they have been giving to perpetuate his existence.

Your Veteran organization tells you to deluge your Congressmen with letters "begging them to put an end to this discrimination", but they pay about as much attention as if you wrote the Weather Bureau to protest about too much snow or not enough rain.

'Go away, old man', they say. "Can't you see we are busy planning increases and

future retirements? You've lived your allotted three score years and ten. Don't annoy

That is what's 'a happening' means to the old muscle bound world war \*1 veterans whose life partner no longer shares his worries, or the joys of their having travelled "life's highway" together.

Get with it, you Congressmen! Give the Old Veterans a break, won't you?

The only thing he is guilty of is having saved the U.S.A. from being overrun with European tyrants in 1917 and 1919.






