WTSU--A retired English teacher who has worked to preserve the history of the McLean area is one of 10 recipients of the Texas Panhandle Distinguished Service Awards at West Texas State University.

Vera Back of McLean received the award during the eighth annual luncheon hosted by the WTSU Returning Student Program. Individuals and organizations in 30 communities nominated 108 women for the awards.

Colette Dowling, author of "The Cinderella Complex," addressed the luncheon participants.

Mrs. Back came to the McLean area about 70 years ago as a young school teacher at the Back School north of McLean. She taught English in McLean schools for 30 years before retirement in 1967. During World War II, she taught three years at Amarillo Air Force Base which involved a quick course in airplane mechanics.

She also owned an insurance agency in McLean.

In 1969, two years of effort were completed when the Alanreed-McLean Area Museum opened. Mrs. Back has collected articles, including the first permanent wave machine in McLean, for the museum and initiated the idea of a memorial album to hold the cards accompanying museum donations. The museum has been cited by the Texas House of Representatives.

During her 89 years, she has occupied herself with teaching and writing. She is the author of the 1964 "Feathers," a non-fiction volume, contributed a column to the McLean News and writes poetry.

She has been a long-time active member of

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## Former Aggie Great-- Dick Todd To Speak

Dick Todd of Crowell, an award-winning football player from Texas A&M and a member of the Washington Redskins team, will highlight the annual McLean All-Sports banquet Monday night at the McLean Country Club.

The banquet, which honors McLean High School athletes, will begin at 7:30 p.m. Members of the football, basketball, tennis, track, and golf teams will be presented at the banquet. Six awards will be presented to outstanding athletes. Awards will be given to the McLean News Most Valuable Player, the Lions Club Fighting Tiger and Lions Club Fighting Tigerette, Most Valuable Girl Athlete, Fighting Heart (boy), and Fighting Heart (girl).

Members of the various teams will be guests of the McLean Schools and McLean Lions Club, who are sponsoring the event.

Todd began an outstanding athletic career

at Crowell High School where he scored a national record for scoring 318 total points in 1934. He had a career mark of 664 points in high school. He was named to the All-State football team by the Fort Worth Star Telegram in 1935. In 1938 he was named the Most-Valuable player at Texas A&M and made the All-Southwest conference team two years in a row. During his days at A&M, he was called the most feared running back in Texas.

After graduation, he joined the Washington Redskins, where he was a member of two championship playoff teams. He coached two seasons at A&M and two seasons at Washington, serving one year as the head coach of the Redskins.

He was named to the Texas A&M Hall of Fame in 1966, to the Texas Sports Hall of Fame in 1968, and to the Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame in the seventies.

## Free Health Fair Planned For Tuesday

McLean and area residents will get a chance for free health screening tests and get the opportunity to see some of the latest developments in health care April 26.

The first annual McLean Health Fair is planned for Tuesday from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Marie Foundation Building. More than 36 booths have been reserved by various health agencies for the fair, according to Billy Wilson, pastor of First United Methodist Church in McLean, the sponsoring organization.

Those who attend the health fair will be able to

have free health screenings for glaucoma, a urinalysis, blood pressure

check, hearing test, diabetes test, and tuberculosis test.

Coffee Memorial Blood Bank will draw blood from volunteers who wish

to donate to provide blood insurance for their families.

A reflexologist will demonstrate the method of treatment which aids the reflexes, and will give free treatments. At least 60 workers from health-related agencies will provide educational displays and information, according to Wilson. Local EMTs (Emergency Medical Technicians) will also be at the fair to display equipment and demonstrate skills.

Wilson said that several schools are planning to bus their students into McLean to visit the health fair. He said that letters of invitation have gone out to the McLean schools, Alanreed school, Lela school, Lefors school and Samnorwood school.

There will be no admission charge for the event.

## June Suggs Appointed To City Council

June Suggs was appointed to fill the city council seat vacated by George Terry, in action April 12 at the McLean city council regular meeting. Terry gave up the position because of his recent election to the position of mayor. Aldermen also elected Bill Thomas as mayor pro-tem, and swore in new councilmen Lloyd Bybee and W.A. Bentley, after canvassing the April 2 election ballots.

After studying the legality of the city making donations, the council voted to rescind an earlier motion to give the Hillcrest Cemetery Association five percent of any royalty received from a city-owned gas well. "The cemetery association certainly is a most deserving organization," councilman Bill Thomas commented. "But we cannot, according to law, donate anything, so that will be our policy from

now on. We just weren't aware of the ruling in the past."

Aldermen also appointed Ted Simmons, Laverne Brooks, and Johnnie Mertel to serve three-year terms on the advisory board of the government housing authority.

Also approved was the purchase of at least six new joints of 1 1/2 inch fire hose for the McLean Fire Department. The council also upped membership in the volunteer organization to a maximum of 30 personnel. At the present time there are 24 members of the fire department, and according to Jim Barker, two more men had applied for membership in the organization. The increase in the maximum roster will allow more volunteers to join the fire department.

The first week in May was declared cleanup

week by the council. Trash trucks will pick up small limbs and refuse collected during the week, but for extra-large loads, someone will be required to assist in loading the truck.

Councilman Barker reminded the council that citizens should be careful about burning trash, and that the trash truck will not pick up trash which has been burned sooner than two days before collection day. "This is

an especially bad time of year to be burning trash," he added. In other business, the council voted that summer water rates will go into effect May 1.

Attending the meeting were mayor Terry, councilmen Bill Thomas, Lloyd Bybee, June Suggs, Jim Barker, W. A. Bentley, city superintendent Bob Glenn, city secretary Stella Lee, Lush Rodgers, and Lisa Patman.

## Commissioners Set Date To Accept Paving Bids

Gray County Commissioners will accept bids for extending and paving a runway and installing an emergency generator at the Perry LeFors Airport on May 2, commissioners decided at their regular meeting Friday morning.

The runway extension is part of a Federal Aviation Administration long-range plan for growth, according to Commissioner Ted Sim-

mons. In addition, cracks in the pavement of the runway must be sealed, and a government surplus generator that the county purchased several months ago must be installed.

Commissioners awarded the bid for installing the elevator in the White Deer Land Museum to Wylie Hicks, Jr., Inc., who submitted a bid of \$71,695. The county will be responsible for removing a Japanese elm tree that blocks the way for

the elevator to be installed, according to County Judge Carl Kennedy, who presides over the commissioners' court.

The entire elevator project will cost \$77,695, Kennedy said, because the county has already paid \$6,000 in engineering fees. Mrs. Louise Bowers Sientz donated \$70,000 to the county to install the elevator, but Kennedy said she had

## Argument Won't Hold Water

The arguments against stiffer DWI legislation just won't hold water....or light beer either. Several groups, including the American Civil Liberties Union, are saying that mandatory sentences for repeat offenders will put an added burden on the Texas taxpayer. They claim that the law will force taxpayers to build more jails, hire more judges and law officers. Thus, they say, will cost the taxpayer's dearly.

The fallacy in the argument is that they assume that the law won't work. They think that stronger enforcement of the law will not keep the drunk driver off the road. The fact that is being ignored is that drunk drivers eventually learn to stay off the roads if the penalties are tough enough, and that's the purpose of the legislation in the first place.

It's true that the new law may require more jails, but do you know of a county in Texas that is not already in trouble because of antiquated jails? It's also true that, for a short time, we may need more law officers and judges.

But I believe that all these expenses will be negligible if we can stop the slaughter on our state's highways. One group has estimated that putting just one drunk driver in jail for 90 days will cost the taxpayers \$1,800. Does their reasoning allow them to conclude then, that we should not arrest the drunk driver and let him go on his merry way? How expensive is his behavior if he is not arrested? Have any of these judges bothered to figure what is the cost in human life and property damage when the drunk driver is not stopped?

Perhaps the critics are right. Maybe we should adopt South Africa's law, which carries a 10-year prison sentence for drunk driving....or perhaps San Salvador's law, which executes drunk drivers by firing squad....or Malaysia, where the drunk driver is executed and his wife is sent to prison.

Whatever punishment the Texas House and Senate finally decide is best will be better than the lax laws we now have.

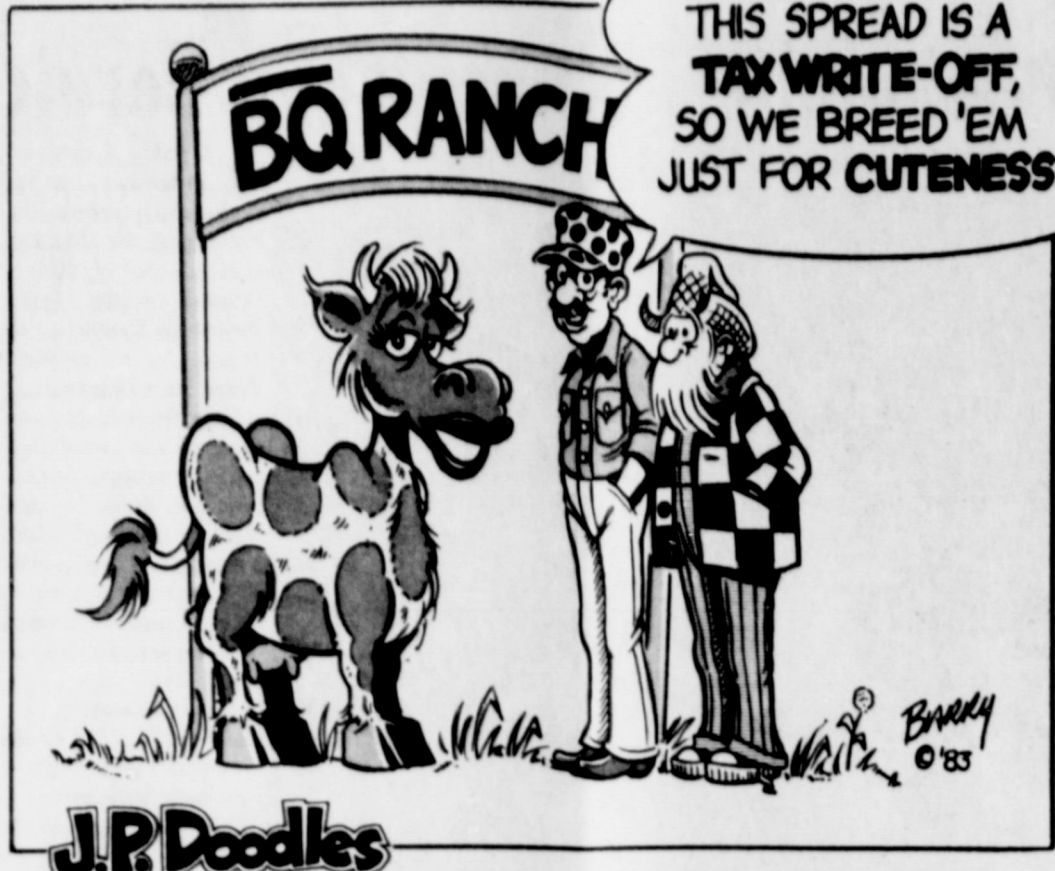
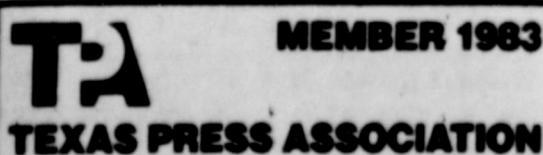

given the county informal assurance that she would make up the difference between her donation and the actual cost of the installation.

Commissioners also voted to confirm the authority of C.A. Stein, an attorney, to represent Gray County in the James Grandstaff damages lawsuit. Grandstaff's widow has filed a suit against Gray, Carson and Hutchinson Counties, the City of Borger, the City of Pampa, and several police officers for what she believes is the wrongful

death of her husband in Borger. Stein was hired by the county's insurance company, Kennedy said.

Commissioners also approved the change of a fixed base operator at Perry LeFors Field. The county owns the airport but leases the administration of it to Pampa Aircraft, Inc. In December, Roy Smith, the former owner of the company, sold it to Harold E. and

Coleen M. Devore, who are now the field's fixed base operators.

Commissioners also voted to advertise for bids on a roller and soil compactor to be used in Precinct 2. The bids will be opened May 13. Commissioners also voted to bid on six surveyor's levels for sale through the General Services Administration.

Retiring county foreman Frank Olson, who has worked for the county for a total of over 40 years will receive a commendation from the commissioners' court in appreciation of his service to the county. He will retire at the end of April. Olson is employed as a foreman in Precinct 2, under commissioner Ronnie Rice.

The school cafeteria will prepare sack lunches for the participants in the playday, Thomas said.

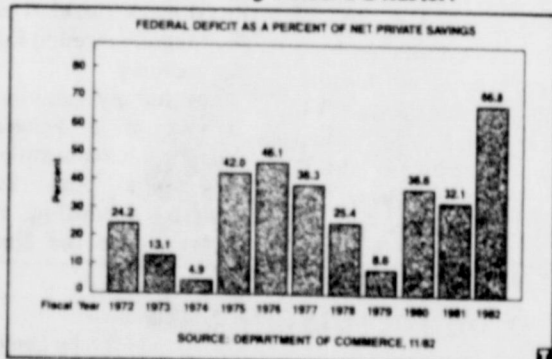

## NEWS OF THE ECONOMY

### Can We Keep Our Economy From Sliding Toward Disaster?



The U.S. Government will spend about \$200 billion more this year than it will take in taxes—if the economy shows recovery. If recovery is weak or abortive, that \$200 billion could surge alarmingly.

Next year and the year after, the deficit will be just as large!—unless we do something.

Deficits are financed by borrowing. Washington is, in fact, the most gargantuan borrower in the country. To finance the current deficit, the government will have to

borrow 60 percent of all private savings—money available for lending and investment in the United States.

At the bottom of a recession, Federal borrowing may not seriously affect the cost of funds available to people and businesses.

But as the economy recovers Uncle Sam should get out of credit markets. Money for lending and investment should go to business and industry for new plants, equipment and jobs, to

consumers for houses or automobiles.

If that doesn't happen, if government continues to require more than half of all the credit available—even during economic recovery—interest rates will rise. Rising interest rates will ultimately choke off the recovery. And we will be back on the downward path to economic stagnation.

We will have to decide what we want from our government, and recognize we may have to pay for these decisions through high-

er taxes. But these decisions won't be easy—and they will only be reached if the debate focuses on balance and fairness.

If we are to succeed, defense, entitlements and taxes will have to be reviewed. The course we set must be fair and equitable to all Americans; it must assure an adequate defense and a humane society; it must be economically sound; and it must be politically realistic and workable.

Kay Tavenner of Panhandle gave a touching morning devotional.

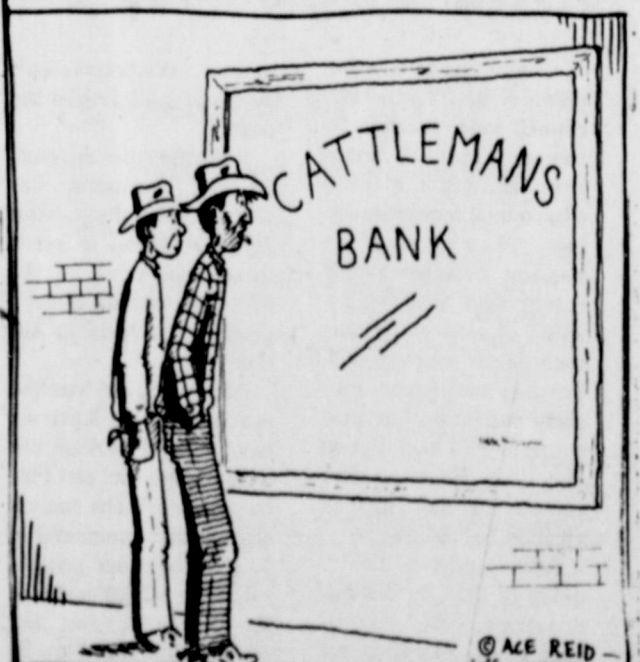
The sharing sessions stressed the benefits of sharing and caring and of strengths and capabilities of women on the move.

## In The Kitchen

by Linda Haynes



Several of my favorite recipes are a combination of ingredients with cake mixes. These usually make the tastiest, and certainly the easiest, cakes. Here are a couple you may not have tried.

**Coconut Cream Cake**  
1 (18.5 oz.) pkg. regular white cake mix (not pudding type)

1 (3 1/2 oz.) can flaked coconut, divided  
1 1/3 cup water  
2 egg whites  
1 (8 1/2 oz.) can cream of coconut

1 (12 oz.) carton frozen whipped topping, thawed

Combine cake mix, 1 cup coconut, water, and egg whites; beat 2 minutes at highest speed of electric mixer. Reduce speed to low; beat for 1 minute. Pour batter into a greased and floured 13x9x2 inch baking pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 to 30 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool cake in pan for 10 minutes. Punch holes in top of cake with toothpick. Pour cream of coconut over cake while still warm. Spread whipped topping over cake; sprinkle with remaining coconut. Cover and chill at least 4 hours. Cut into squares to serve.

**Lemon-Coconut Cream Cake**

1 (16 oz.) package white angel food cake mix  
1 (4 1/2 oz.) pkg. lemon pudding and pie filling mix

2 egg yolks, beaten  
1/2 cup sugar  
2 cups water  
1 tablespoon grated lemon rind  
2 tablespoon lemon juice  
2 1/2 cups whipping cream, divided

1 (3 1/2 oz.) can flaked coconut, divided  
Prepare and bake cake mix according to package directions. Invert pan on funnel or bottle until cake is completely cooled, about 2 hours.

Combine lemon pudding mix, egg yolks, sugar, and 2 cups water in a heavy saucepan; mix well. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until thick and bubbly. Remove from heat; stir in lemon rind and lemon juice. Cover and chill completely (about 1 hour).

Loosen cake from sides of pan using a small metal spatula. Remove from pan. Split cake horizontally into 4 layers. Beat 1 cup whipping cream until stiff peaks form. Fold whipped

cream and 1/3 cup coconut into lemon filling. Place bottom layer of cake on cake plate; spread with 1 1/4 cups lemon mixture. Repeat with second and third layers. Place remaining layer, cut side down, on top of cake. Cover and chill cake overnight. Beat remaining whipping cream until stiff peaks form; frost sides and top of cake. Sprinkle with remaining coconut. Chill at least two hours before serving.

**Border Healing woman**  
The Story of Jewel Babb as told to Pat Ellis Taylor  
This excellent autobiography of Jewel Babb as told to and narrated by Pat Taylor will no doubt be regarded as one of the best human-interest stories put before the public in many, many years.

Jewel Babb is now in her early eighties, and her story is the magnificent account of a lady who has spent most of her life in the isolated desert region near El Paso, Texas. 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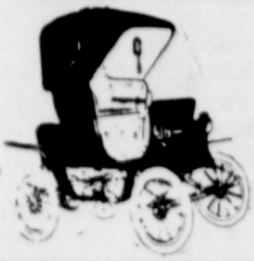

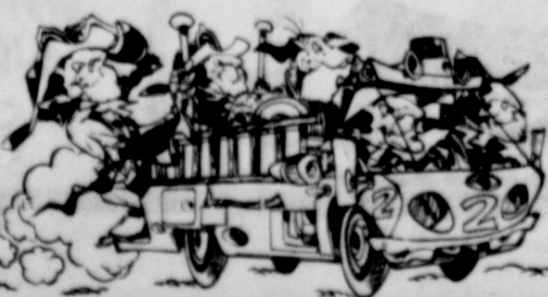

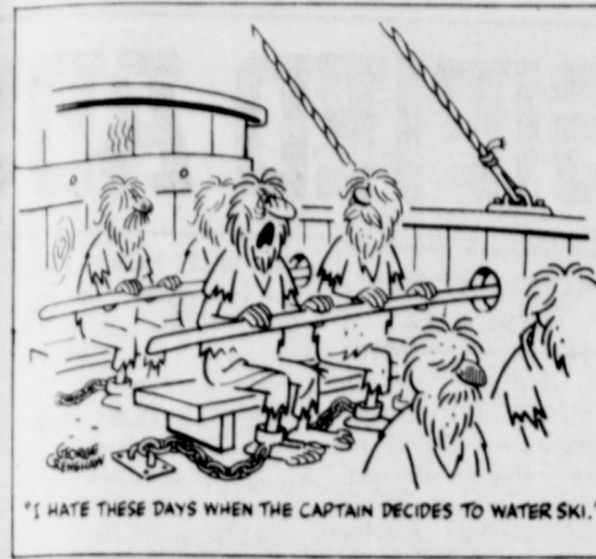
