The 1985 graduating class of McLean High School went through its commencement exercises Friday night, with several members of the class receiving

special scholarships and awards Valedictorian John Glass received the \$4,000 Madge Page Sholarship, given by the family of Mrs. Page. Glass, the son of Mr. and Mrs. James Dale Glass, is the second recipient of the award.

The scholarship, which was received by Bryan Smitherman last year, has been given to McLean students in memory of Mrs. Page, who spent her last 20 years in McLean.

She was an active businesswoman, widowed at young age, and raised four children by herself. She was loved and respected by many in McLean. Her daughter, Verda Lee Cooper and her grandsons David Cooper and Mert Cooper were on hand to present the scholarship Friday night.

Glass also received the tuition free scholarship for any tax supported college in Texas for the first year, authorized by Texas Education Code 54.401, and the ICUT (Independent Colleges and Universities of Texas) as the highest ranking in his class, which varies in amount from \$200 to \$4,000 and is good at most Church schools such as Baylor, McMurry, Abilene Christian University, etc.

Receiving the \$200 Carl Lee Henley Memorial Scholarship was Billie Billingsley. Billingsley is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Billinglsey. The award was presented by Henley's widow. Gwen Henley. The scholarship was begun by Randy Stalls and many of Carl Lee Henley's friends shortly following his

untimely death last summer.

Billingsley was also recognized for receiving a football and rodeo scholarship offer from Northwestern.

Also receiving recognition for scholarships received were Salutatorian Von Holwick. who received the ICUT for second ranking in his class, which varies in amount from \$200 to \$4,000 and is good at most Church schools; Mukesh Patel received a \$300 scholarship for Tech based on his score on last year's PSAT/NMSQT result; and Patricia Rodgers received a \$1,000 scholarship from Ki-

Taxes To Be Turned Over To Attorney

During the monthly meeting of the trustees of the McLean Independent School District,

board members decided to turn all deliquent taxes over to Attorneys for collection on July 1, 1985.

Members discussed pending tax legislation that will require the enforcement of collection of deliquent taxes if such enforcement is not already the policy of taxing districts. In preperation for the enforcement of this new legislation, board members decided to go forward with their decision to hand over all deli-quent taxes to attorneys for collection.

However, if taxpayers are willing to pay the taxes, but simply do not have the lump sum, all is not lost according to business manager Shirley John-

We now have available installment contracts to pay off the taxes," explained Mrs. Johnson. "These contracts have not been available previously, and the contract cannot run longer than 36 months, but it is a better way out for many," she continued.

Mrs. Johnson reported to the board that she had sent several installment contracts out to people, and has already received ten of them back.

"We feel optimistic about the installment plans," said Mrs. Johnson. "They are allowing our taxpayers to keep up on their taxes, while the burden is not as great,'

Mrs. Johnson also informed the board that following a new tax act that has gone into effect this year that every person on the deliquent tax roll must receive a bill, which the McLean schools already do. However, for those taxpayers who cannot be reached by mail, their name and the amount they owe on deliquent taxes will be published in the local newspaper. Local officials believe the publishing of names of these taxpayers will begin this summer.
We would also like to stress

for those taxpayers who are over 65, whose taxes are deli-

quent and the tax is on their homestead, they should file a tax deferral affidavit," said

Mrs. Johnson. 'Although this tax defferal affidavits will not cancel the tax owed on the homestead, it does protect their homestead while theu are alive and living there." she said. "In other words, if they file a tax defferal affidavit and cannot pay their taxes, their homestead will not be taken from them while they are alive and living there. At the time of

their death, taxes will be assessed to the estate," she continued.

In further business, the board discussed the cafeteria renovations and decided to open bids on the project at 4 p.m., May

Following the approval of the April minutes, April checks, April financial statements, April Tax-Assessor's report, and the April Cafeteria Report, the board met with Jimmy Wilker-

son of the Gray County Apprai-

sal District. Wilkerson presented the Appraisal District's proposal for constructing a new building to house the growing Appraisal District.

At present, the district rents 2,226 square feet in the Hughes Building in Pampa at a cost of \$10 per sqaure foot. Wilkerson estimated it would take 4,000 squire feet to house the group before long. At present, the district charges Pampa rent for their collection space, and have plans to continue doing so if the See Page 2
