## Councilmen To Begin Enforcing Dog Ordinance January 14

CITY OF McLEAN

In order to avoid the repercussions which took place in our community in October, 1984, this is an Official Notice to all residents of the City of McLean, concerning the enforcement of City Ordinance 133.

Commencing on the 14th day of January, 1985, all dogs running at large in the city limits of McLean will be subject to entrapment and impoundment, **WITH NO EXCEPTIONS.**

Since it is a State Law that all dogs and cats must be legally vaccinated against rabies each year, this is a decisive health measure to avoid the spread of rabies among animals and people. Uncared for animals may also be infected with parvo, distemper, etc., which are communicable diseases to other animals in which they come in contact.

We received a total of 333 votes on this issue. There were 289 votes in favor of the enforcement of this ordinance, and 44 votes against this action. These questionnaires were enclosed in all City Bills in November, 1984, and each of you had the prerogative of making the final decision. We took this means of letting the residents decide whether to enforce this ordinance or abolish it, since an enforceable city

ordinance that is not enforced is illegal. These votes were conducted by two unbiased McLean citizens, Mr. S.A. Cousins and Mr. T. Elmo Whaley.

City Ordinance No. 133, pertaining to the impoundment of dogs running at large in the city limits of McLean was amended in May, 1967. It is not an ordinance which was brought into being by your present mayor and city councilmen.

If your dog is entrapped and impounded, the following will apply:

1) Dogs will be held for 72 hours before being disposed of, in order to give owners the opportunity of reclaiming animals, at which time a daily charge for impoundment will also be imposed;

2) Before reclaiming any animal you must present us with evidence to support proof of current rabies vaccination;

3) The fine for any animal caught in traps will be \$25.00, for first offense, and double the fine thereafter for each ensuing offense;

4) These traps will not be concealed. They will be placed in alleyways, on city property, or on personal property at the request of the property owners;

5) Any unauthorized person, or

persons, found tampering in any way with these traps which are the property of the City of McLean can be legally fined up to a maximum of \$200.00.

A copy of this Official Notice will be posted at the City Hall and the U.S. Post Office in McLean, as well as published in "The McLean News."

Cooperation among all is requested and necessary to prevent misunderstandings.

| 1 pkg. (18 1/2 oz.) spice cake mix | 3/4 cup fresh lemon juice        |
| 3/4 cup water                      | 2 teaspoons grated lemon peel    |
| 3 tablespoons cornstarch           | 3 firm, medium Dole's Bananas    |
| 1/2 teaspoon salt                  | 1 carton (8 oz.) whipped topping |
| 1 tablespoon butter                |                                  |

Prepare cake mix according to package directions for two round 8 or 9-inch layers. Cool. In small saucepan, combine 3/4 cup water with sugar, cornstarch and salt. Cook, stirring, until sauce boils and thickens. Cook one minute longer. Remove from heat. Stir in butter, lemon juice and peel. Cool completely. To assemble cake, place one layer upside down on serving plate. Spread with two-thirds of lemon filling. Slice 2 bananas and arrange on top of filling. Spread one-half of whipped topping over bananas; cover with second cake layer. Spoon remaining lemon filling on center top of cake in 3-inch diameter circle. Spread remaining whipped topping around edge of cake, just touching lemon filling. Slice remaining banana and arrange on top of cake. Makes 8 to 10 servings.

"A great challenge to the church in Ivory Coast, West Africa, is training of national leadership," says Reverend Willard Teague, Assemblies of God missionary to Ivory Coast. "Because of explosive growth, ours is a constant problem of a church born in revival—the need for more workers."

Mr. Teague will be guest speaker Jan. 13, Sun, 11 a.m. at the 1st Assembly of God, 4th and Main St., Z.A. Myers, pastor, has announced.

Mr. Teague and his wife, Jerlene, have worked in Ivory Coast since 1972, following a year in Lausanne, Switzerland, where they studied the French language. They have been involved in evangelistic ministry, the establishing of new churches and founded the Bible institute for training national leadership. They also direct and teach at the institute in Daloa, Ivory Coast. Mr. Teague was chairman of the board of governors of the Assemblies of God West Africa Advanced School of Theology in Lome, Togo. He was superintendent of the Assemblies of God in Ivory Coast from 1976 to 1980.

About their work in Ivory Coast, Mr. Teague says, "The government is very favorable toward the church, and we find complete freedom to minister. The church has experienced rapid growth, and there are more than 30,000 adult members and adherents in the Assemblies of God." The Teagues went to Ivory Coast in the pioneer days of the Assemblies of God there and assisted in setting up the organizational structure.

Prior to missionary appointment the Teagues pastored in Hialeah, Oklahoma, and also traveled in evangelistic ministry in Texas, Oklahoma, and New Mexico. Mr. Teague holds a B.S. degree from Southwestern Assemblies of God College in Waxahachie, Texas, and an M.A. in Biblical studies from the Assemblies of God Graduate School in Springfield, Missouri. He has also studied at the Brite Divinity School of Texan Christian University in Ft. Worth, Texas, and the Phillips University School in Enid, Oklahoma.

On returning to Ivory Coast, the Teagues' primary work will be directing the pastoral and Christian education programs for the Ivory Coast Assemblies

of God, including mobile teaching assignments to various training centers in major cities. They will also conduct evangelistic meetings.
