Bids To Be Let For McLean Ag Building, Commission Says

Amarillo News Gray County Commissioners Monday voted to advertise for bids for an agriculture building to be located at McLean. Plans call for a 50-foot by 100-foot steel building to be erected south of the city limits. The facility will be used for 4-H and various agricultural related activities.

Commissioner Ted Simmons of McLean said target date for completion is later this summer. In other action, commissioners approved bids relative to Perry Lefors Airport improvements contingent on grant approval by the federal government. Low bidders were G. W. James Construction Co., \$135,073 for runway

paving and extension; Quarles Electric, \$4,955 for installation of an emergency generator; and the bid of Ray's Electric of Amarillo, \$18,718.25 for runway lighting installation. Commissioners took no action on a request by Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo for Gray County to help pay hospital bills owed to Ama-

rillo Hospital District by Gray County residents. Commissioners decided to further study legislation which may offer guidelines as to who qualifies as an indigent

care patient. State Health Nurse Marge Holland was given approval to move into a larger office in the Hughes Building due to expansion.

Shamrock Man Dies In One-Car Accident

A Shamrock man was killed and a Spearman man was injured in a one-car accident at the McClellan Lake turnoff on Interstate-40, 7.4 miles west of Alanreed about 1:25 Saturday morning. David J. Thayer, 24, a golf pro at the Shamrock Country Club, died in the wreck and Kenneth Richard Atkins, 19, of Spearman was hospitalized in stable condition at Shamrock General Hospital, according to investigating trooper Ron Shank. Both victims were transported by McLean Area Ambulance service.

He was taken to Amarillo Emergency Receiving Center, where he died at 4:28 a.m. Shank reported that he investigated three other minor wrecks in or near McLean last week, but none of the wrecks resulted in injury. On April 28 at 8:10 p.m., Opal Whiteny of Norman, Okla. turned left out of the center lane of travel and hit a 1975 Chrysler, driven by David Adams of Ft. Wainwright, Alaska. Whiteny was driving a 1981 Oldsmobile.

Is the Texas Legislature Anti- Education?

Is there a giant conspiracy in the state of Texas to cripple the public education system? Any school administrator who is just the least bit paranoid would certainly think so.

The legislative session began with glowing promises from the new governor that Texas teachers would finally come out of the basement and begin receiving adequate compensation for their jobs. But as the session has dragged on, the teachers have watched their pay raise dwindle away to as much substance as the hot air coming from Austin.

Now, lawmakers are saying that the only way teachers will get a pay raise is for the legislature to raise taxes. Now, I understand that the state treasury is depleted, compared to what was expected earlier in the year. I know that each time the price of oil goes down by \$1 per barrel, Texas loses \$45 million out of the state treasury.

But why blame the teachers for a tax increase? The legislature has managed to trim the budget in other areas, and has worked in plenty of money for

highways and prisons, and has left the teachers' pay raise out...because there was not enough money.

I wonder if the legislators think that a tax bill to pay teachers' salaries will be more appealing to the taxpayers, than a tax bill to pay for prisons or highways or other expenses? I feel sure that this is part of the reasoning.

But with the state lawmakers doing a side-step dance on the promised pay raises, and the government giving a tax credit to those who send their children to private school, one begins to wonder just how important the public school system is to us.

By making the teachers the scapegoat for the long-dreaded tax increase, the legislators are doing a great disservice to the children of the state they are sworn to serve. Poor pay equals poor teachers equals poorly educated children equals an illiterate society.

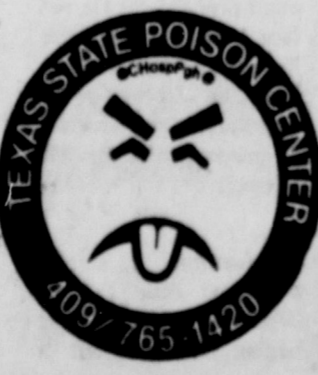

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Evanelia Franke - A Life Of Devotion To Children

On almost any day you can see the loving group at Thomas Nursing home, where her daughters cluster around her chair, adjusting her collar, patting her hand, murmuring words of love to her. Mrs. Evanelia

Franke, 88, sits quietly, holding the baby doll that never leaves her arms. She seems to gain a strong sense of security from the doll, which she cuddles in her arms. She smooths each pleat in the doll's dress, and scans its face for any hint of dirt.

The actions are repetitions of the reality of her early life, for this frail, dainty woman gave birth to 17 children from 1914 to 1936. Four of those children now live in McLean, three of them moving here from California

just to be close to their mother. Mrs. Lois Myers brought her mother to McLean about eight years ago for a visit, but the older woman never returned to California where she had lived most of her life. She lived in the home of Lois and Z. A. Myers for five years, until she had a series of strokes. She has lived at Thomas Nursing Center for the last three years. Three daughters who moved here are Betty Lopez, Doris Reborn, and Elsie (Ginger) Morilla.

The granddaughter of a woman who came to California in a covered wagon from Texas, Evanelia Juden was born in San Bernardino, Calif. on Sept. 9, 1894, the third child in a family of eight. According to her daughters, Evanelia's greatest ambition, from the time she began playing with dolls, was to have a large family when she grew up. Her family moved to Flagstaff, Ariz. because of her father's health when she was very young, and a tragedy there almost ended her life. During her eighth year, she and her brothers and sisters were playing upstairs when the staircase caught on fire, trapping them. Most of the children jumped out of a window and escaped injury, but Eva's clothes were on fire and she panicked. One of her brothers pushed her out of the window, but by that time she was badly burned about the knees, neck, face, and one arm. The arm was so severely burned that the doctor wanted to amputate it, but her mother refused.

Since this was only 1902, the process of grafting was still very primitive and slow. Eva stayed in bed for over a year, and suffered terribly as proud flesh had to be removed almost every day.

She has carried the scars all her life, and the traumatic experience affected her whole childhood.

Her family moved back to California when she was ten. As a young woman she worked for a while in a laundry, ironing and folding men's shirts, but she preferred to stay at home and help her mother with the baking and caring for the younger children.

When she was 19, she married Rudolph Franke, a door and sash maker by trade, and it was not long until her ambition for a large family began to be realized. Beginning the next year, she gave birth to the first of 17 children who would be born in the next 22 years. Five of the children died in infancy, but she reared six boys and six girls.

Her husband had always wanted to own a nursery, and eventually he owned three, which sold plants, and flowers, and orange, walnut and avocado trees. The oldest child, Ginger, said she remembered a day when eight or nine of the children were playing in the front yard of their home. A large sign saying "Nursery" was near the house, because one of Mr. Franke's nurseries was down the block.

A stranger, seeing all the children in the yard and the "Nursery" sign, stopped and asked Mrs. Franke if she had room for two more youngsters in her day nursery. He must have been shocked when he learned that the yard full of children belonged to the same woman.

Mrs. Myers recalled that her mother never had a washing machine or a refrigerator when they were growing up. Mrs. Lopez laughed "We had no need for a refrigerator - there were so many of us that there were never any leftovers." Mrs. Myers said that she always remembered waking up to lines of wet clothes.

"I don't ever remember seeing my mother go to bed or get up," Mrs. Myers said. "She was always up working by the time we got up, and still working when we went to bed."

Mrs. Lopez remembered her mother's insistence on neatness. "Each day when we returned from school, we had to hang up our dresses to wear the next day. I remember one week that Mama promised me a nickel if I kept my school dress clean all week. But I fell on the way home, and got my dress dirty, and cried all the way home."

Although her life was filled with hard work, she must have been a fun-loving mother. She loved baseball and made the annual World Series a big family get-together. Mrs. Lopez also recalled having water fights with her mother.

"And brushing Mama's hair was our great joy," Mrs. Myers said. She said that her mother had thick, long, brown hair which fell beneath her waist. At night the children would brush her hair, and the girls would

take turns twisting and braiding the hair into different designs. The lush hair was not cut until Mrs. Franke was 84 years old.

After talking to her grown daughters, I got a strong picture of a quiet, shy, loving mother who always had time for her children. Her great secret must have been that she made each child feel special. Even now the grown women will jokingly argue about which one was most special to "Mama". Perhaps the best key to her character is the fact that the first phrase she said after recovering from her stroke was "I love you" to one of her daughters.

The women remember that during the days of the Great Depression, Mrs. Franke many times would say she was not hungry, or she would eat crackers and milk or bread and ketchup while the children ate. "I guess we all believed her," Mrs. Morrilla said. "It never occurred to us that she wanted to make sure that we were fed."

The women have fond memories of growing up in a house full of children. "We never had to worry about having someone to play with," Mrs. Lopez said. "We didn't have many toys, but we sure made up some interesting games." She said that sometimes the family lived in big houses, and sometimes they didn't. "We slept everywhere - in the parlor - wherever there was room. Sometimes Daddy would add on rooms, and sometimes he wouldn't, but we managed." Every mealtime was a party, the women said, with so many children to feed.

Mrs. Morrilla said that one day the family had been at the beach. By this time there were ten children. As they were driving home, someone noticed that a four-year-old brother was missing. Frantically they drove back to the beach and found the little boy playing in the sand with his pail and shovel.

Mrs. Morrilla said that on one Christmas during the depression, the only gift the children received was a new baby brother.

With Mrs. Franke's life so devoted to children, it was only natural that she would feel more at ease with the baby doll in her arms. The doll is lovingly dressed. (One of the daughters, Mable in Kansas, makes Mrs. Franke's clothes, and daughter Ginger makes matching dresses for the doll.) Mrs. Lopez brought the first doll to her about five years ago, and Mrs. Franke was so pleased that she has kept the doll with her constantly. The family gave her a new doll for Christmas this year, and she loved it immediately, they said.

Proof that hard work never hurt anyone came, when in her seventies, she underwent two very serious surgeries. She has fully recovered from those. The strokes she suffered a few years ago have left some damage.

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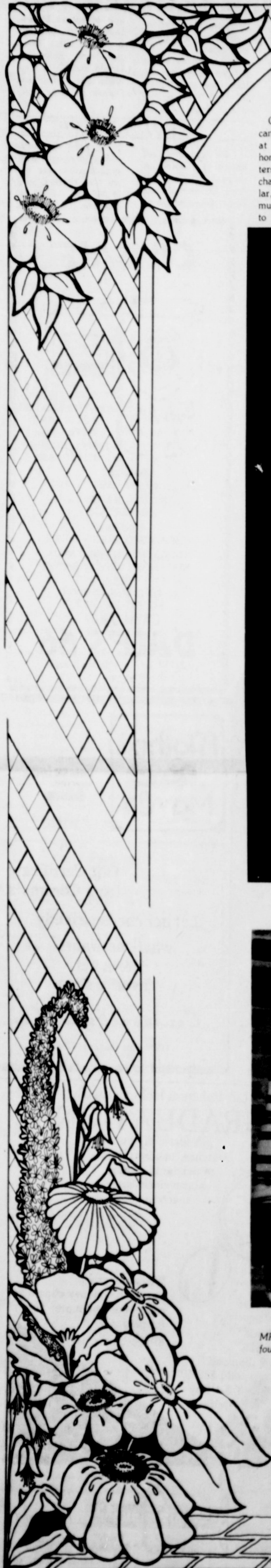

1/2 pt. whipping cream or 1 pkg. Dream Whip
1/2 cup powdered sugar
1/2 cup pecans

Add well-drained pineapple, powdered sugar and pecans to whipped cream or Dream Whip. Place in pie. Chill and serve.

For Navy man John C. Curry and the Fighting Checkmates of VF-211, home away from home is a thousand feet of floating steel. It comes complete with 5,000 family members and the pungent aroma of jet fuel and sea air.

For seven months, his home is an aircraft carrier. It's not the most comfortable of homes, but during a deployment, Curry is there because his job is there.

The son of Wanda Butler of Jal, N.M., and Gene Curry of El Paso, Curry is an aviation hydraulics mechanic with Fighter Squadron 211, home-based at Naval Air Station Miramar here.

"I work on the hydraulic structure of the F-14 aircraft," said the 23-year-old third class petty officer. "I maintain and repair the flight controller switches which are hydraulically actuated."

"When I first came to the squadron, I was a plane captain," said Curry. "That gave me a chance to observe the different shops. The airframes shop worked outside the most, were always busy and worked with a lot of different tools. I liked those things, so I thought I'd like hydraulics."

Commonly referred to as the Tomcat, the F-14 is a carrier based, multi-mission fighter that forms the nucleus of a carrier's air defense. Curry says it's a great aircraft, but a challenge to work on.

"Working on the F-14 is a challenge in itself," said Curry. "The hardest part is learning the different systems on the

aircraft. Because of the sophistication of the hydraulic systems, some of the work I do gets really complicated."

Despite the challenges and difficulties of working on an aircraft that is mostly hydraulic, Curry says the job still has its rewards.

"My biggest reward is

being able to get the planes up and ready to fly," said Curry. "It's demanding and takes a lot of effort and man-hours, but we keep them flying."

A 1979 graduate of McLean High School in McLean, Texas, Curry joined the Navy the following year to see the

world. Since then he has visited such distant places as Africa, Australia, Singapore and the Philippines. But he said travel isn't the only thing he's gotten from the Navy.

"I've grown up," said Curry. "The first time my parents saw me, they noticed the change. I don't act like a kid anymore."

"What I like best about the Navy is the traveling. Going on deployment has been my most memorable experience so far."

Curry said he would definitely recommend the Navy to others and believes everyone should serve his country. But it takes a special kind of person to make a good sailor.

"A good sailor tries to do his job to the best of his ability," said Curry, "and respects his superiors."

The book explains why Dr. Ornish's program works with step-by-step instructions for following it at home. There is an extensive section on the diet, with delicious original recipes by Martha Rose Shulman.

The emphasis of the program is not on what you have or have not done in the past, but what you can do for yourself now. For anyone who suffers from coronary artery disease or who is concerned about preventing it, this will prove to be a very important book. It is now available at Lovett Memorial Library.
