

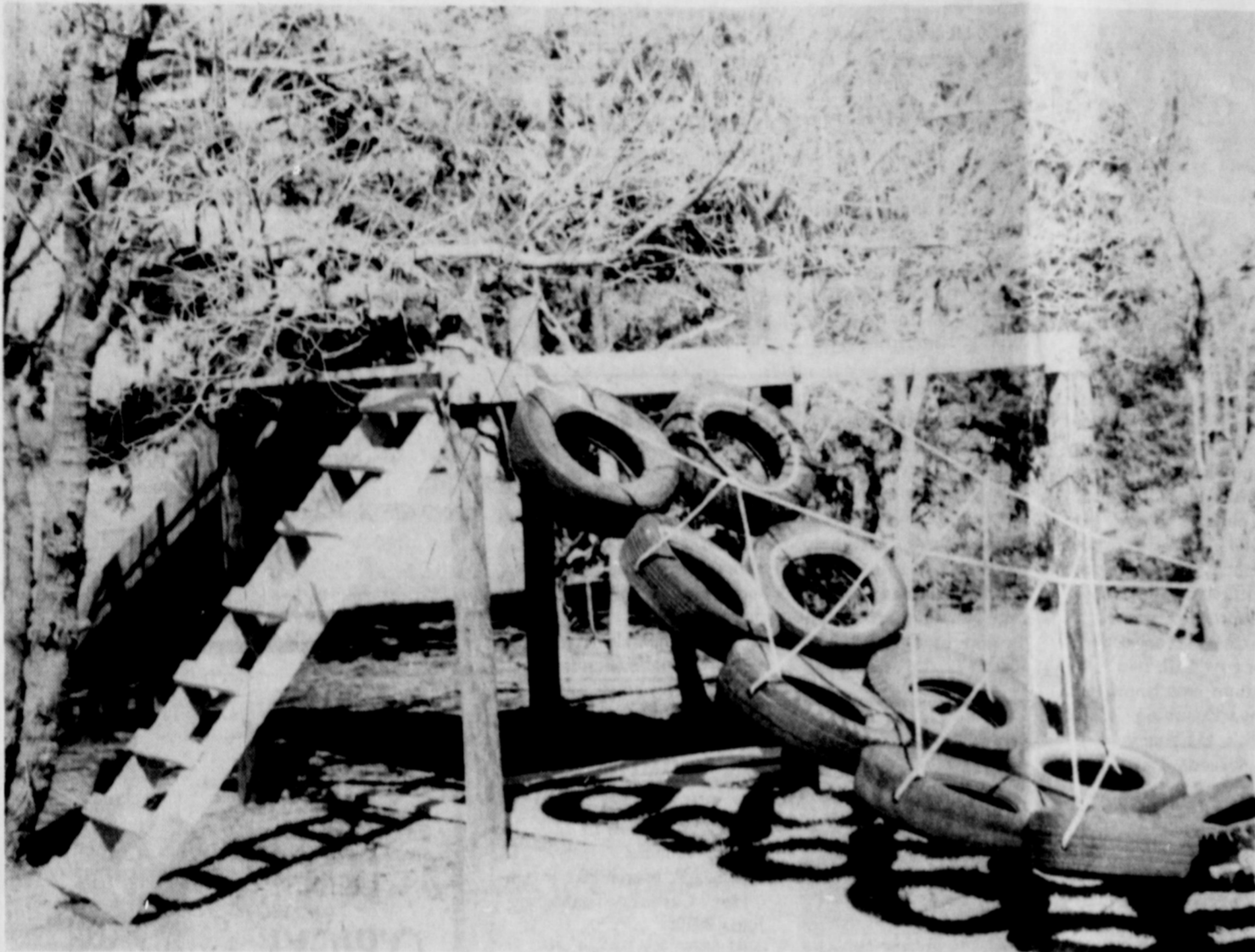

## Students Dismissed From School

McLean students were released from school Monday afternoon and are not to return until March 19, according to schools superintendent,

Jim Rutherford.

"We dismissed schools last week with 42 of our elementary students absent," said Rutherford. "We thought we might have as many as 15 absent this morning (Monday), but when we took our count, we discovered that we had 39 out."

According to Rutherford, the missed days will be made up during the Easter holiday, and added to the end of the

According to Dr. Harold Fabian, it is taking some of the patients four to five week to recover from the flu.

"The first five to six days are the worst," explained Fabian. "However, many of the students are getting up and around too quickly and

are not letting themselves heal completely." Fabian stated that the

clinic had been swamped with patients and that most of them were younger children.

"It has, however, begun to strike some of the older residents. Today, we saw a few in their

thirties and some in their fifties," said Fabian.

Most of the victims of the flu have complained

with headaches, sore throats, and coughs. Some have nausea and severe cramps. At least

one case of extremely high fever (108) has been reported, and one six-year-old has been hospitalized with the flu.

"We were hoping that letting out school last week would help these kids get well," said

Rutherford. "Now, we're hoping that this will do the trick."

## Shamrock To Observe 38th Annual St. Pat Celebrations

By Bill Howe "Irish Galore in '84," the theme chosen to spark the 38th running of Shamrock's famed St. Patrick's Celebration, will take on new meaning when Irishmen by the score, most sporting Donegal beards, with besutuous colleens on their arms, arrive for the festivities March 16-18.

City officials have donned their green underwear, the editor of the local newspaper is taking pills to turn his beard green and the "greening-up" pace quickens as the count-down begins for the biggest Irish community celebration this side of Erin itself.

George Nickel, an early-day postmaster homesick for his native Ireland, created the Irish tradition shortly after the turn of the century when he named the post office serving this dry-and-sandy spot in the Eastern Panhandle of Texas, "Shamrock."

The late Glen Truax, a Shamrock High School bandmaster, gave it life in 1938 when Shamrock Boosters Club, a group of live-wire businessmen, latched onto his suggestion that a town with such a fine Irish name

should capitalize on it with an annual St. Patrick's Day Celebration so grand it would attract thousands of visitors and world-wide attention.

That's why thousands continue the tradition year-after-year by crowding into Shamrock to partake of the Irish-flavored program designed to please every Mick and Lassie. The 3,000 residents

plan to host as many as 25,000 visitors this year, begorra!

The Head Irishman for the 1984 party is Howard "Prof" Weatherby, aided and abetted by Assistant General Chairman Sonny Hillburn.

As the count-down begins, everything in Shamrock is turning green, including the special edition of The Shamrock Texan devoted to the celebration and the colorful store banners and street streamers provided by Shamrock's Kivnans Club.

In fact the stage is set to make the theme, "Irish Galore in '84," an obvious reality. Mrs. Winnie Pave Vinyard submitted the theme to the St. Patrick's Committee and it was judged the winning entry in local competition.

A pre-St. Patrick's Celebration banquet, featuring

the appearance of Dr. W. C. Newberry, the "Sage of Southwest Texas," whose ancestors came to this country from Ireland and Scotland in 1852 and spread across the land with a piece of the blarney stone in either pocket or purse, will open the festivities Friday night, March 26, at National Guard Armory.

Tom Weatherby and his Flatland Mountain Band will provide entertainment for the banquet. The meal, catered by Carol and Herb Williams of Smokehouse Barbecue in Dumas, will be served by members of Shamrock High School's Junior Class.

The real celebrating starts Saturday, March 17, with the Old Settlers Reunion, the hour-long street parade led by the green-clad Shamrock High School "Pride of the Irish" Band under the direction of Daryl Kalre, and followed by the Donegal Band.

Judging, the Miss Irish 1984 Contest, the popular Old Settlers' competition, a street carnival, free luncheon for all participating band members, Fire Department Water Hoop games, team and coin raffle

at 2:00 p.m. The Old Fiddlers' Contests will begin at 12:00 noon at National Guard

Guard Armory will feature the music of Doug Collins and the West Texas Express beginning at 9:00 p.m.

There will be dancing for teens at the Dettle Building, 211 West Highway 66, featuring AmChron, starting at

8:00 p.m. The Irish tradition con-

tinues to thrive in Shamrock and although Truax has passed on, his name will

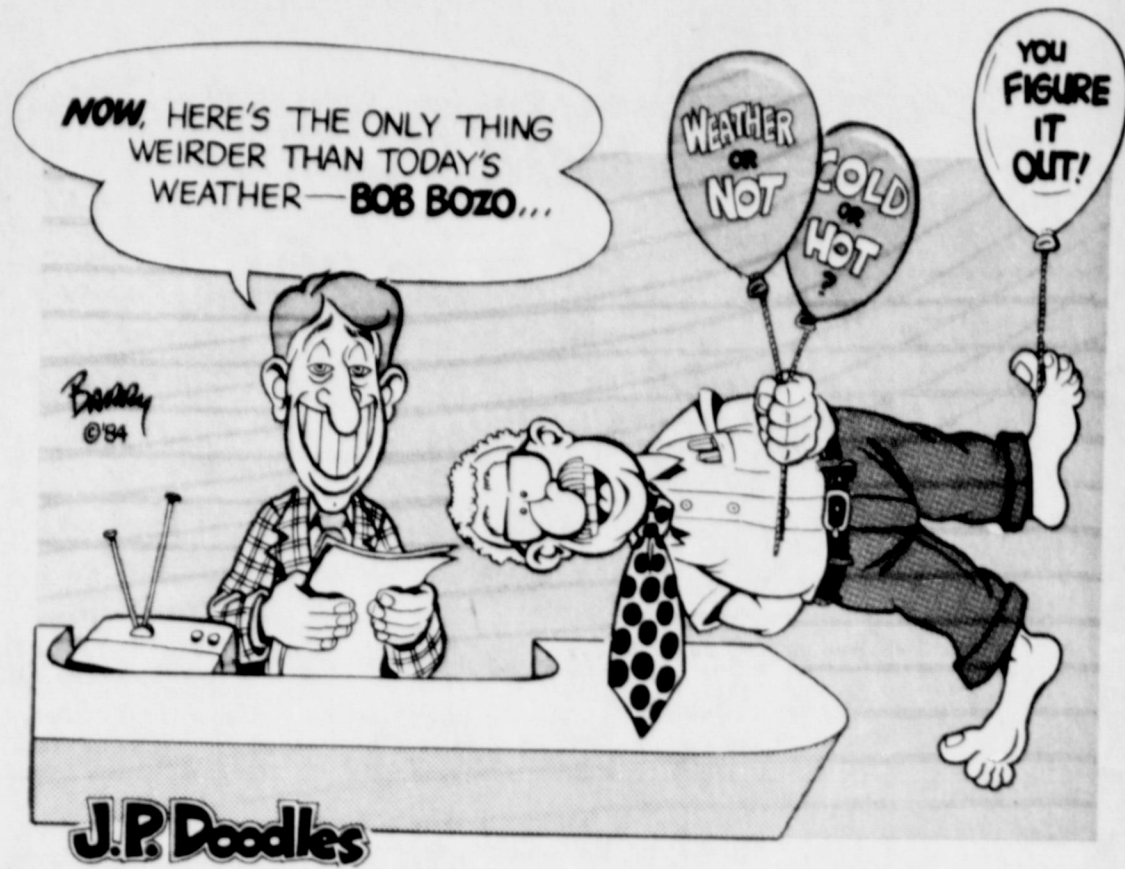
This saved me a lot of time, and enabled me to get better information than I had access to.
