NEWS OF HEALTH

AGENT ORANGE SAVED AMERICAN LIVES

The defoliant Agent Orange was used extensively by the military during the Vietnam War to protect soldiers from enemy ambush. Many veterans have testified to the protection offered by the chemically-treated areas.

Some veterans believe Agent Orange, which contains trace amounts of the chemical dioxin, harmed their health. There is little likelihood, based on overwhelming scientific evidence, that Agent Orange could have caused the health conditions some veterans have described. Veterans who believe they are ill should seek medical care. They have been through a difficult experience, a tough, demanding duty, which fortunately more Americans are beginning to appreciate.

Veterans involved in a project termed Ranch Hand had the heaviest exposure

to Agent Orange of all American personnel serving in Southeast Asia. These were the servicemen who sprayed the herbicide. Their daily direct exposure was vastly greater than that of ground troops. This exposure lasted ten to 12 hours a day, five to six days a week, for periods of at least a year.

Yet government studies found Ranch Hand mortality to be identical to the mortality of other veterans. Both the Ranch Hands and their veteran counterparts had 40 percent fewer deaths than expected in comparison with the typical U.S. white male. This lack of mortality may be partially explained by the healthy worker effect.

The Veterans' Administration's examination of 85,000 Vietnam veterans found no unusual health

trends. These were veterans who underwent examination because of concerns about their health. The health problems found were not unusual and were of the sort seen in a population of males growing older.

A common sign of human overexposure to dioxin—the rash called chloracne—was not documented in any of the veterans examined.

A study done by the Australian Senate Standing Committee on Science and the Environment found similarly that there was no convincing evidence of increased birth abnormalities, psychiatric disorders or mortality among Australian Vietnam veterans. The study concluded that many of the veterans' conditions closely resemble the disorders previously found among veterans of the two World Wars, the Korean War and the Arab-Israeli War.

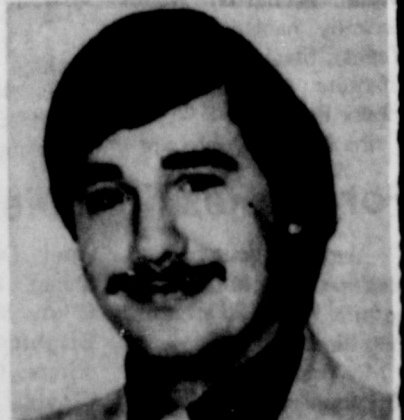
