

It is always so easy to say "If I was running this town or this school I would do this or that, but in reality it is just not that easily done. New changes being proposed in educational circles, and the limitations of income on small cities, should encourage us all to study the qualifications of the cadidates carefully and select the ones we think can meet the challenges of the future in a manner which will be of benefit to our children and our community.
