#### Interstate 40's Bypass Opens Around McLean Today ing to attract businesses

pletion of construction on Interstate 40, which will by-pass McLean, will officially come to a stop as the new stretch of highway will open today (Thursday).

According to Resident Engineer Jerry Raines, in an interview Tuesday, if all went as planned Wednesday, workmen would be able to complete the biggest part of construction on the interstate to allow the new section to be opened.

"We have some striping to finish on several segments of the road, some guard rails that need to be set up around bridges and some concrete work needs to be done around the ditch draines," Raines said. "If it does not rain tonight (Tuesday) or Wednesday, we should be open by Thursday. However, something could happen and we might not make it until

Friday." Raines also told the News that although traffic would be open on the new stretch, construction work was far from over.

"We will have quite a

lot of work to do, even after we get the highway en. he stated. "One of the biggest jobs left us is the constructing of a ramp for west-bound traffic to get into McLean. At present, we will have to re-route west-bound traffic to get them off that end of McLean, but we will eventually have a ramp built there to make access easier."

Construction for the by-pass was begun March 1982, and since then, much speculation has been made as to, not only the completion date of the highway, but its effect on McLean.

McLean businesses are now considering re-locating closer to the new highway, and work is currently being done on finalizing agreement for a new motel, possibly a truck stop and/or a fastfood restaurant or convenience store.

McLean has received as much or more publicity from the I-40 bypassing as any other town undergoing the same operation. One reason for this publicity is the fact that McLean is the last town to be by-passed by the interstate.

McLean has been the subject for several television stations (out of Amarillo and Houston); more than one daily newspaper (Amarillo, Pampa, and the Ft. Worth Star Telegram included); and at least one magazine - specifically Linda Haynes' publication in Amarillo's 'Accent West' magazine.

McLean will try to capitalize on such publicity a final time, when it will host the official "Grand Opening" ribbon-cutting ceremonies

scheduled for July. According to mayor and Bryan Smitherman

George Terry, several state highway officials from Austin have been invited, as have local and state-elected officials.

"We do not want to actually celebrate something that might initially hurt McLean, but we do have an opportunity, and make the most of it." stated Mayor Terry.

"We've got to work hard to make up for what we're losing, but we can do it," he said.

The mayor and city fathers have been work-

City fathers recently passed a zoning ordinance that will allow signs along the interstate, and will designate an area of 700 feet on both sides of the highway as a retail and multifamily zone.

Chicago-A fat actor has written the latest bestselling diet book about how he shed excess blubber. If you are overweight, you might be tempted to buy it. Don't waste your money.

Like many of the popular diet books - and there's always one on the best-seller lists-it's basically a rip-off.

That's because the author tries to convince tubby people that they can lose weight while still enoying tasty, delicous, yummy, satisfying meals. It can't be done. I've read all kinds of diet books because, like most self-indulgent Americans, I've spent much of

my adult life overweight. I've tried the old drink ing man's diet, the eatanything-you-want diet, the three-squares-a-day diet, the lotsa-spicymeatballs diet, the gobble-pasta-till-youburst diet, and all the other enjoy-eating-and-

lose-weight diets.

claim, there is only one diet that works. I call it: The You-

No matter what they

Gotta-Suffer Diet. Having just lost 25 pounds in about 10 weeks, I know it works and I'm willing to share it with you. It's quite simple. You don't have to do a lot of calorie counting, measuring and weighing tiny bits of food, or pour over time-

consuming recipes. All you have to do is be miserable, which is fundamental to any successful diet. And you have to remember only one rule, the cornerstone of my diet.

The rule is: If you enjoy it, you can't have it; if you don't like it, you can eat all you want.

This rule derives from the scientifically acknowledged fact that Mother Nature is a nasty, sadistic, mean broad. She made everything that tastes good fattening. And everything that is not fattening tastes terri-

An example is the brussel sprout. Under my diet, you can eat all the brussels sprouts you want. Stuff yourself with them. Shove them in your mouth with both hands. You won't gain an ounce.

That's because brussels sprouts are awful. Just as lettuce,

celery, cabbage, carrots and most vegetables are

awful. The only vegetable that isn't awful is the potato. and only when it is french fried. Or baked and heaped with butter, sour cream and chunks of bacon. Or covered with gooey cheese. Then the potato tastes great. Therefore, you can't eat

See how simple it is? Let's say you go to a German restaurant. There's no big problem in ordering low-calorie foods. You just order the

worst thing on the menu. The menu might have a pork shank with dumplings, which is great cuisine. So you can't

Instead, you order the broiled white fish, with some sliced tomatoes on the side. It's enough to make me gag.

When the waiter asks you what you will drink. you follow the suffering rule. The best thing to drink would be a liter of German beer. The only thing better would be two liters of German beer. So you can't order it.

Instead, you order the worst think the bar

serves: a diet pop. Or, if you are stupid as well as overweight, Perrier with a twist

Then comes dessert. You probably want something wonderful, like a big slab of cheesecake or some kind of rich chocolate cake.

Which means you can't have it. Instead, you must suffer and ask if they have any fresh melon. Squirt a bit of lemon juice on it, smile and pretend you are having a fine time, while you are ready to scream and do violence.

Or maybe you choose an Italian restaurant. Once again, the choice is not difficult. Once again, the best thing on the meal would probably be a plate of fettucine Alfredo. or spaghetti carbonara, or lasagna. With a bottle or two of red wine. And a snort of anisette with your coffee.

So you order a baked halibut. With Tab.

Spirit Wind 1984 will be performing at the First United Methodist Church in McLean June 10 at 8


This choir is a select group of United Methodist young people from churches all over the Panhandle and West Texas area. They have been selected from more than 70 who auditioned this past year and are representative young people
