

This recognition program, founded in 1983, is dedicated to the local identification of outstanding math teachers who can serve as models for the profession. It is intended to increase the It is intended to increase the status and rewards for demonstrated professionalism so that superior teachers will be encouraged to remain in the mathematics fields and so that superior candidates will be induced to enter the field of mathema es instruction.

Mr. Hutsell serves as an

instructor for area in-service programs in the mathematics field and has twice been invited to be a teacher and presenter at the Texas State Teachers of Math state conference.

The winners of the national award will win a trip to Washington D.C. and the teacher's sponsoring school would be awarded a \$5,000 National Science Foundation grant to supplement existing

math programs.

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

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

Margaret Surratt Completes County Quilt Block For Anniversary

The train, the windmill and the tree were motifs selected by Margaret Surrati for her entry in the Carson County Quilt Block contest. This contest was sponsored locally by the Carson County Extension Service and the Square House Museum in celebration of the Texas Sesquicentennial anniversary.
Mrs. Surratt's appliqued quilt block is presently being incorporated into a quilt containing the winning blocks from throughout the Texas Panhandle. The finished Panhandle. The Hilliams quilt will be the property of the Panhandle Plains Historithe Panhandle Plains Histori cal Museum but will be on

loan to other institutions.

The three figures in Surratt's quilt block represent important happenings in the Texas Panhandle.

The Train-Rumor had it in 1886 that the Fort Worth/ Denver tracks and the Santa Fe tracks would cross in what is now Panhandle, Texas. A man named Finchord Nelson of Canadian sent one of his hired men, Jim Southwood to this area to stake out a claim ne reason, the Ft. Worth/Denver train crossed some 30 miles west of Pan-handle at an unknown place called Amarillo.

Windmill-The first windmill in this area was drilled by Polish settlers in White Deer in 1907. By having the resource of water, the Panhandle was now inhabitable. In the 1840's, Captain Randolph B. Marcy labeled this area as totally uninhabitable and had called it the "Great Sahara of North

America." Little did he know that the rivers of water were right underfoot.

The Tree—Cree's tree is now and was in our early history a landmark. It seems that Thomas Cree brought his wife to a buffalo wallow between Panhandle and what was to be Amarillo between 1886 and 1888. At that time there were no trees in the area at all, only expanses of grassland. Mrs. Cree said she could live where there were no friends or neighbors close by but she could not live here without something beautiful to look at. Thomas set out to find something beautiful so he ventured to the Turkey Track ranch near Palo Duro Canyons where he bought three Bois d'arc apple trees for \$1.00 each. The couple planted the trees and watered them with their own drinking water. The trees survived and became a landmark for early travelers They also brought hope to the hearts of the early

settlers who said that if the trees could survive, so could

farmers and crops.
