



They requested that the city pay half the costs of installing a new system. The other half will be paid for by the Amublance Service. The council approved the allocation of \$221 to

In a five page letter to the Mayor and City Council, Mr. Jones listed "the following items of grievance pertinent

to municipal operations":

1) Municipal Incorporation-In this section, Mr. Jones stated that McLean is "an incorporated village" operating under Title 28, Chapters 1-10 under Article rating under Title 28, pters 1-10 under Article of the Revised Civil this section, Mr. Jones states

Statutes of Texas. However, he adds, that "the City of McLean is presently operating in accordance with Chapter 11 under Article 1133 of the Revised Civil Statutes and, therefore, "has for and, therefore, "has for many years been operating illegally." Councilman Green res-

ponded by saying that he had researched past minutes of council meetings and that no menuon was ever made that the city government has to operate under Articles 1-10. In fact, he said, "Article 11 is the only law that has ever been mentioned in council minutes.

Acting on this grievance, Councilman Harold Fabian made a notion that the City of McLean continue to operate under Chapter 11 as the law most pertinent to city operations. The motion was approved, Councilmen Green, Fabian and Bailey voting in favor, and Councilman Pakan

voting against

that on February 25, 1986, the council proposed a resolution "limiting the powers of the elected mayor to only those acts as authorized by law." After a review of Article 954 of the Revised Civil Statutes, which define the powers of the mayor, Mr. Jones stated that the action of February 25 shows the "council to be deliberate in their insubordination and disrespectful nature" and that "the duties, powers and authority of the elected mayor have been altogether igor have been altogether ig-nored." He added that "a situation of negligence does now exist and hereby urge those responsible to comply with the law."

In response, Councilman Green stated that council actions have not infringed on the powers of the Mayor and asked for a motion to act on this grievance. No motion was proposed.

Mr. Jones, in another section pertaining to the powers of the mayor, stated that of the mayor, stated that "The vote as councilman by our mayor has been disallowed, either by directive of the past city councils without resolution or by the acqui-escence of the mayor him-self."

Councilman Green responded by saying that it is "generally understood that "generally understood that the Mayor votes only in case of a tie." He added that "No city council has taken away his right to vote in these circumstances." No action was taken regarding this

3)City Officers-Breach of Duties-In this section, Mr. Jones charged that a council member had not responded to the requests of several citizens for assistance and had, therefore, "avoided duties and responsibilities to the residents of the City of McLean and to the city council." Since these citizens did not appear before the council to substantiate their complaint, no action taken on this grievance.

In other statements under the same section, Mr. Jones stated that one of the city should






