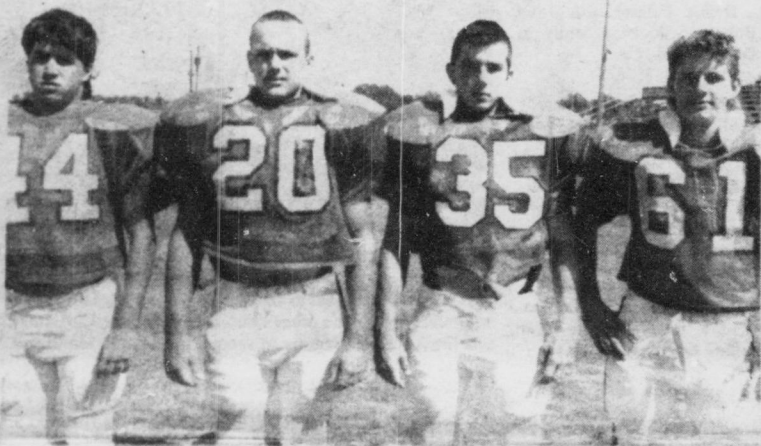

Tigers Open Season In New District

Groom Tigers have high hopes this season to finish at the top of their district. The Tigers were placed in a new division this season with Nazareth, rather than Wheeler, to be their toughest foe.

The Tigers will be helped along the way with a number of returning starters on both offense and defense. Offensive starters returning are Daniel Lambert, Stoney Crump, James Miller, Brent Thornton, Bruce Thornton, Jack Britten and Brent Thompson. Defensive returning lettermen are Miller, Lambert, Brent Thornton, Britten, Scott

Fields, Bruce Thornton and Thompson.

Starting in the backfield will be Britten at tailback. He rushed for 1,000 yards last season. Brent Thompson will play fullback and Paul Williams and Rocky Crump will alternate plays at wingback. Bruce Thornton will lead the squad at quarterback.

Completing the Tiger team will be Kevin Kerlee, Michael Rose, Richard Koetting, Brice Ruthardt, Vincent Meeker, Jason McCoy, Tony Rodriguez, Richard Jenkins, Travis Homer, Daniel Hinson, David Hinson and Wilbur Kempf.

Coach Terry Coffee stated that Vega and Nazareth would be the Tigers toughest competitors in the new district and that from what he had seen, Happy would be a much improved ball club. Coffee said again that injuries are the biggest threat to the team. "We're playing football with 23 members on our squad, Lefors and Miami both have 22 members and they will be playing six man football."

The Tigers have now completed two scrimmages and Coffee says he is very pleased with the progress his team has made. "We have a little

School Enrollment Up

A total of 230 students began the school year in Groom on Monday. That is an increase of 11 students over the number that was enrolled at the end of school last year.

The new figure puts 119 students in grades K-5; 41 students in Junior High and 70 in High School.

The fourth grade class once again turned out to be the largest class with 27 students enrolled. Two students in that class will be attending Groom Schools for the first time. There are 24 students enrolled in the kindergarten class and if all goes well, 22 seniors will receive diplomas at the end of school.

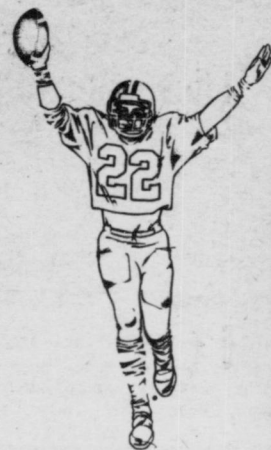

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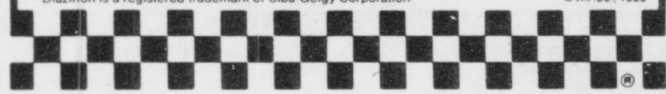
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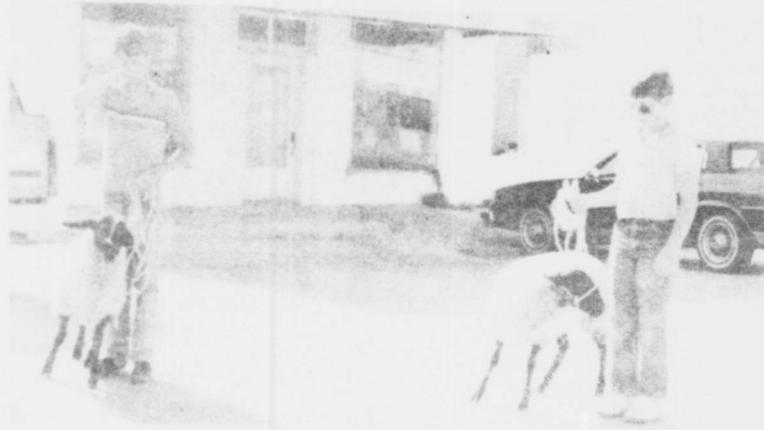

The McLean Tigers ended their pre-season play in grand style last Friday night as they defeated Claude in a scrimmage, outscoring them two touchdowns to none.

Most of the game was a hard defensive battle as the Tigers pushed back the Claude offense time and again, stopping several potential scoring drives.

Late in the game, Clint Herndon scored the first touchdown on a long run from midfield. With a charged, pumped-up offense the Tigers quickly scored again. After getting good field position on a run by Greg Littlefield, Huey Green scored the second touchdown.

Sunaming up the game, Head Coach Bill Phillips said, "I am real pleased with the kids. The game gave them a lot of confidence and now they feel like they can play with just about anybody. We are looking forward to the season. We are going to

win some games this year."

The McLean team has 25 players this year, including several students new to the area. Matt Williams, a Senior, has just moved here from Waco and will be playing split end. Kevin Petty, a Sophomore from Aspermont, will be a tight end. Senior Brick Fry will be a fullback.

Coach Phillips is excited about the addition of four freshmen to the team: tailbacks Tres Hess and Donald Harris, tackle James McClellan and guard James Martin. He said, "These guys are tough and aren't afraid of anything. We're real glad to have them on the team."

City Council Considers Pohlmeier Replacement

The McLean City Council met in special session last Tuesday night. Among the major items of business, the resignation of Brian Pohlmeier was accepted. After meeting in executive session, the council proposed the names of Cindy McDowell, Jerry Cook and Joyce Eck as possible candidates to fill Pohlmeier's position. All of these individuals will be contacted and the council will make a decision at the next regular meeting.

In other business, the council:

-Discussed moving the Fire Department to the west section of the factory building. The department does not have enough room for its equipment in its present location and moving would be cheaper than adding on to the current structure.

Since SPS has been attempting to find an occupant for the factory building, the council suggested that SPS be approached to determine the likelihood of finding someone to rent the building in the near future. The council passed a motion stating that if no renters can be found, the west portion of the See Council, p.6

School Board Approves 1986-87 Budget

The McLean School Board held a public hearing last Tuesday night on its budget for the 1986-87 program year. Total revenues are projected to be \$1,258,359, down 7 percent from last year. Total projected expenditures are \$1,274,539, down 13 percent from last year.

Although Business Manager Shirley Johnson said that this bare-bones budget was slashed everywhere possible, the major cuts are reflected in the area of capital outlay. This category includes expenses in furniture, equipment and vehicles. Mrs. Johnson said that each year the school district purchases a new bus. However, this year, because of the cutbacks, no money has been allocated for this purpose. Mrs. Johnson says that only a bare minimum of this year's budget has been earmarked for maintenance of the school buildings and equipment.

One teacher's salary has also been eliminated. Keith Smith was not rehired for the current year and will not be replaced.

At the end of the meeting, the school board approved the budget.

The new rates will become effective on October 1, 1986, and will be reflected in gas bills in November. Consumers inside the city will be charged \$7.00 for the first 2,000 feet of gas used and \$3.50 for each thousand feet over that amount. Those outside of the city limits will be charged \$7.50 for the first 2,000 feet and \$3.65 for each additional thousand feet.

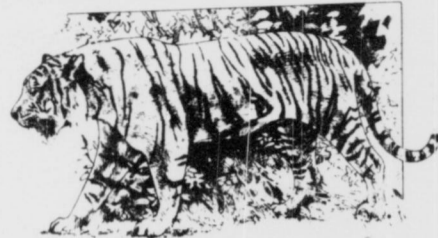

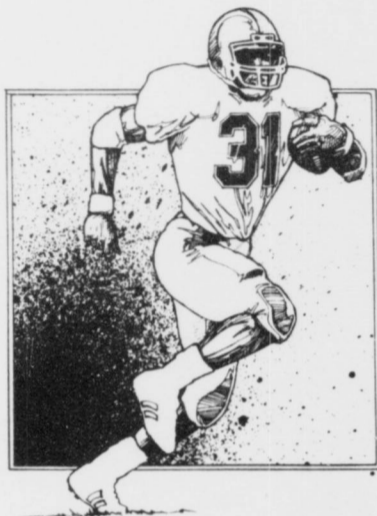

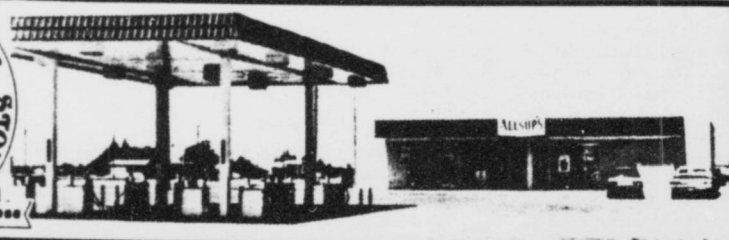

Local Family Joins Sesquicentennial Ride

Sue Britten and her three little ones spent the week before school having the "time of their lives" and sharing a part of Texas history. They joined the J.W. Jines Sesquicentennial wagon train near Canadian and rode with the train for five days completing their leg of the train in Perryton.

A special celebration was held on the J.W. Jines Ranch. Mr. Jines was an original member of the wagon train organized during the Texas Centennial. He organized this particular Sesquicentennial wagon train as a reunion for members of the Centennial train. The train that Mrs. Britten, Katie, Leo and Cody rode with consisted of 16 wagons and 60-100 horse riders at various times along the trail.

Mrs. Britten and the children all rode separate mounts and joined Martha Clawson of Gruver who drove a mule team and wagon in the train. Mrs. Britten and the children served as out-riders for the mule wagon. Mrs. Britten also gained experience driving the mule team.

The Britten children were most impressed with the rattlesnake hunt held one evening while they were with the train. Leo said all three brought home snake skins but no one roasted the snake meat. Meals on the train included breakfast and supper cooked over open fires with a special barbecue and old fashioned barn dance. The children tried their hand at learning old time reels and authentic pioneer square dances.

Mrs. Britten said the experience was one they all enjoyed. "None of us were ready to leave the train after a week and we would certainly do it again."

We got out school started Labor Day with 231 students enrolled. Three elementary teachers volunteered to change rooms because of the 24 enrolled for kindergarten. We now have the kindergarten housed in the first room on the right approaching from the east entrance.

Speaking on enrollment, we normally lose five to six students per year because of absences. If that remains true, we will end up with about 225 Average Daily Attendance (ADA). Here are the ADA figures since I have been in Groom: 1980-81 ADA 217; 1981-82, 230; 1982-83, 223; 1983-84, 225; 1984-85, 229; and 1985-86, 221.

Our football team has had two scrimmages, Valley and Follett. The coaches were quite pleased with both. We would like to invite all you

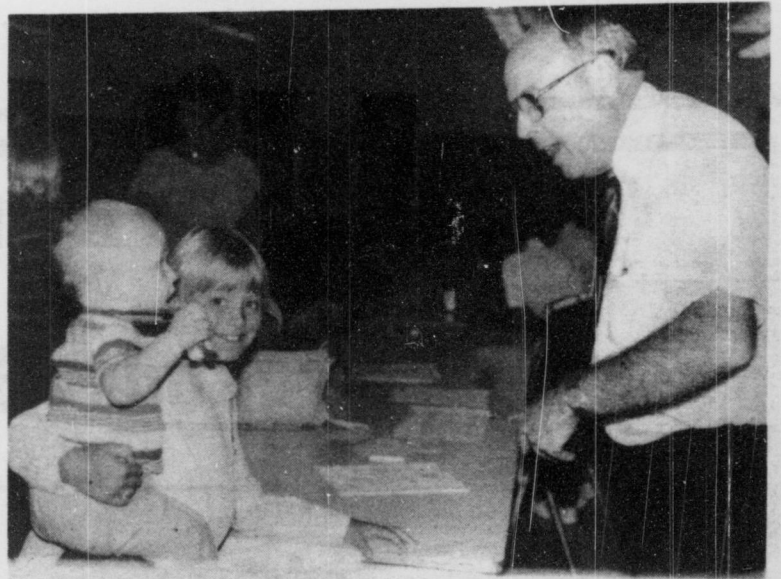
people to attend our games this season and to see our band perform under the direction of our new director, Jose Munoz.

This summer we collected all the old minutes of school board meetings and had them bound. I will try to read some of the most interesting and pass it on to you.

Our first minutes recorded are July 16, 1919, with the meeting taking place at the State National Bank of Groom. First officers and members were George E. Clark, president; Hulon Collier, secretary; J.F. Pool, treasurer; J.M. Stubblefield, custodian of books; R. Foster, B.A. Franklin, John Britten.

Each member had to be sworn in by taking the oath of office. The oath in part said "...that I have not fought a duel with deadly weapons within this state nor out of it."

We are looking forward to another successful year and would like to invite each of you to come visit with us.

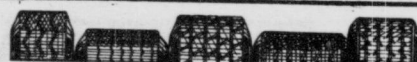
