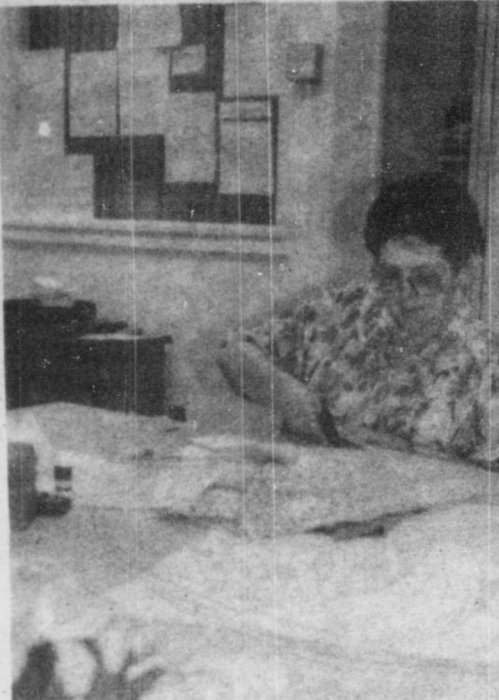

Hospital To Be Deeded Over To Corp.

The Groom Memorial Hospital Board of Directors, in a meeting held on June 19, 1986 stated their intentions in the near future to deed the real estate and improve-

ments of the Groom Memorial Hospital to the Groom Economic Development Corporation.

Three reasons were cited for that action: 1) six years of

being vacant with no foreseeable future hospital use; 2) the continued and rapid deterioration of the building; 3) the powers granted by the charter of the Groom Economic Development Corporation are broader than that of the present Hospital Corporation. Thus, enabling them to explore other ideas and possibilities for other community purposes.

The Hospital Board firmly stated that the property would still remain for the benefit and use of the Groom Community.

Your comments and ideas concerning the pending deci-

sion would be greatly appreciated.

Present Hospital Board members are John E. Homer, Jerry Thornton, Jim Kingston, Alfred Homer and John D. Howard.

Groom Students Fare Above State Average

A special test was mandated by House Bill 72, the statewide education reform in 1984. Formally named the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills, the test is commonly referred to as the TEAMS test.

Third, fifth, seventh and ninth graders were tested in February and first graders were tested in April. Results of the first grade tests will not be available until later.

The News has prepared a composite report on the tests comparing local students' percentages with those of Amarillo students and the statewide average. From this point on, the averages will be given in that order: that is, Groom, Amarillo and State.

In the third grade, 89 percent of the Groom students mastered the 9-objective reading portion as compared to 74 percent statewide. Other third grade results were 82% - 88% - 80% on the 11-objective math portion. The writing portion which required mastery of

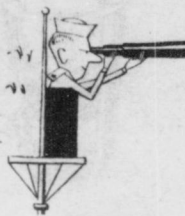
both the multiple choice sub-test and a written composition sub-test under the narrative written composition objective, showed 86% - 69% - 60% at the third grade level.

Fifth Graders had 100% - 90% - 83% on reading, 93% - 89% - 80% on math, and 42% - 70% - 64% on writing.

The seventh grade results showed 100 percent in all areas for Groom. Percentages for Amarillo and the state are as follows: on reading 89% and 78%; on math, 89% - 81%; and on writing 68% and 66%.

Results of ninth graders were 92% - 80% - 80% on reading, 100% - 90% - 81% on math, and 93% - 63% - 63% on writing.

Teachers at Groom Schools were also tested in March when they traveled to Panhandle for the TECAT exam. Groom teachers joined the ranks of many other area small towns teaching staffs by having 100% of the faculty pass the exam.

Jodi Homen Home From Hospital Doing Well

Jodi Homen, four-year-old daughter of John and Brenda Homen was rushed by ambulance to Northwest Texas Hospital last Thursday evening after an accident at her home. She was found pinned by the garage door and treated by local ambulance attendants before being transported to the hospital.

Mr. Homen said she woke up Sunday at the hospital and recalled all the events of the accident. She went back into the garage after a pair of shoes as the door was closing. Trying to rush out, she fell and was pinned to the floor by the door which came to rest across her shoulder and back. According to Mr. Homen, she remembers struggling to get out but the little girl was found unconscious by her brother who

notified his mother of the accident.

Jodi spent several days in intensive care for head trauma. She was kept heavily sedated during most of her hospitalization.

All test performed by doctors to determine the extent of her injuries came back with good results, said Mr. Homen.

The Homens said the garage door opener has been disconnected now. He tested the door after the accident and learned that though it will usually bounce back up when hitting objects in its path, a foot from the ground the door pushes shut with full force. Measuring that force, he said, that 200 pounds of pressure are exerted by the closing double wide garage door.

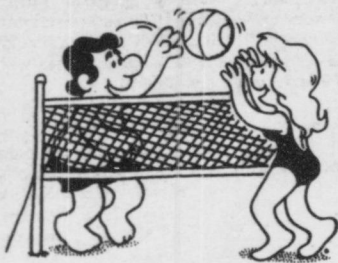

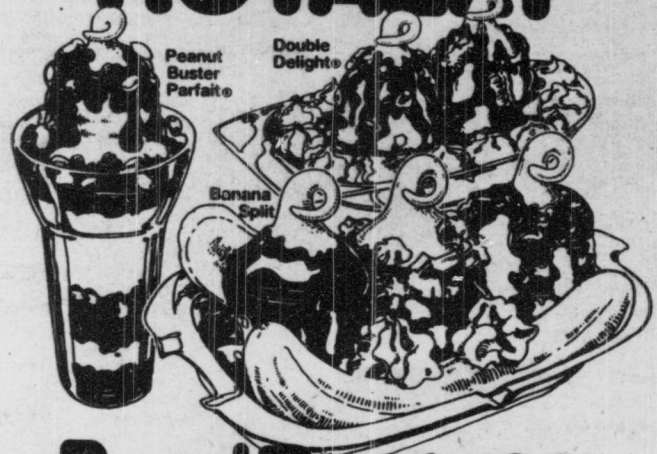

**DPS Urges Caution
For Driving During
July 4th Holiday**

Major V.J. Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Texas Department Public Safety said, "Everyone should know the most dangerous time to drive is on weekends, during the summer and on holidays. This July 4th holiday is going to combine all three."

The Texas Department of Public Safety will be conducting "Operation Motorcade" from Thursday, July 3 at 6:00 p.m. until Sunday, July 6 at midnight. During this time all available troopers will be working to assist motorists, so they might have a more safe and enjoyable holiday. But Major Cawthon also stated these same troopers will also be on the alert for the motorists who continue to be traffic hazards for everyone and that will be the drinking and the speeding driver.

An estimated 45 persons will die in traffic related accidents during the holiday.

**Financial Woes Sounded
At Commissioner's Court**

Carson County Commissioners received a bleak outlook on budget matters when they met in regular session on Monday morning. Judge Jay Roselius gave an overview of a number of expenditures to be added to the regular list of annual expenditures in the budget due to both state and federal regulations. The new regulations will put a financial strain on Carson County as well as many across Texas. Judge Roselius said that Carson County will be especially hard hit with the losses in revenue from the white oil issue and the low price of oil in general. The Judge pointed out that Carson County stands to lose approximately \$200,020 million in tax values due to these conditions.

The generator given to Carson County by Pantex has been installed. Judge Roselius said the generator can easily carry the electrical system in the courthouse and that the airconditioning system can also be operated by the unit.

A jailer/dispatcher for the Sheriff's office was hired by the court. Helen Garcia of Panhandle will begin work on July 1.

Dr. Black Plans To Staff On Day Clinic In Groom

Groom Economic Development Corporation received a verbal agreement from Keith Black, D.O. of Pampa last Monday during their regular meeting. Dr. Black has agreed to provide health care Tuesdays in Groom, though no contracts have been signed by either party. Dr. Black attended the meeting of the Corporation and briefed members on needs for equipment to provide a clinic.

The clinic is set to begin service in August with Dr. Black in town Tuesdays, 4:00 to 8:00 p.m. Appointments will be scheduled through the week with a phone to be installed at Brumley Insurance. Appointments can be made well in advance. The phone number will be announced later.

Rex Peeples will chair a committee to provide housing information to prospective Groom residents. The listing will include rental properties as well as vacant lots and residential properties for sale.

Johnny Brumley reported on his meeting with the Hospital Board. The board agreed to lease the building to the Corporation. Brumley has developed a three part plan for use of the hospital building. He will be scheduling meetings soon with various city clubs and organizations to present the plan and enlist whatever volunteer help available to proceed with the project.

John Eschle is still accepting names and addresses of GHS graduates for a book to be compiled for Groom Day.

Johnny Brumley serves as the corporations vice president, not John Homer as was reported to the News earlier.

The Corporation is accepting donations from local businesses, civic groups and individuals. Individual memberships are available for \$10 each. Interested persons may contact Bill Ellington or Sue Britten to make a contribution.

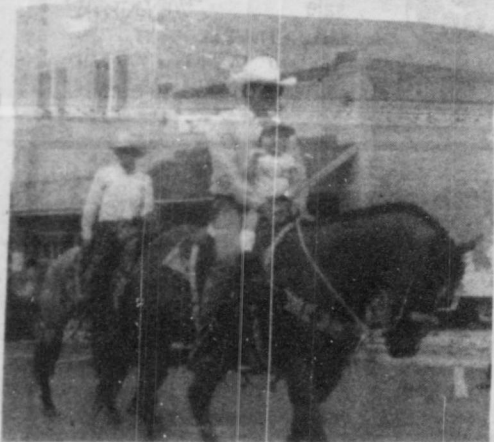

Groom DPS Officers Investigate Five I-40 Wrecks Last Week

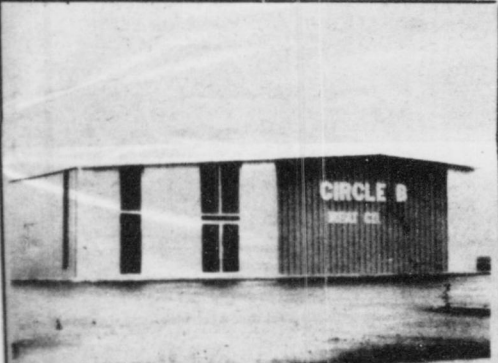

**1986 Wheat Harvest
Yields Below That Of
Recent Years In Area**

Wheat harvest is probably about 80 to 85 percent complete in the Groom area. "Two full cutting days would wind things up," said Paul Fields.

Harvest has been interrupted more than usual this year by continued afternoon and evening rainstorms. Farmers can recall years when a good rain brought harvest to a stand still for several days, but in this country, in normal years when the fields dry out, harvest is continued without further delay.

Local elevator operators estimate yield totals to be about 50 percent below average. Local farmers have hauled wheat from the field with yields from six bushels per acre to 56 bushels per acre at best. Averages run closer to 20 bushels per acre on dryland crops and 40 bushels per acre for irrigated wheat.

Though yields are low, quality of the wheat has remained high especially considering the damp conditions accompanying this harvest.

Protein levels are being figured by local elevator operators on this year's crop. Protein levels have been unusually high for the low yielding crops. "Grain quality overall is good," said Johnny Cline, "and protein levels will help offset conditions brought on by the low yield. He adds, "It doesn't really matter what the yield is per crop, \$12.00 wheat doesn't meet the bills."

Paul Fields shares Cline's views saying, "The price of wheat brings water to the farmer's eyes."

Local farmers are banking on the maize harvest. It will take a good maize crop to keep some going. Most farmers have spent this harvest planting maize in the morning and harvesting wheat on those afternoons the weather has allowed.

Luckily this harvest's losses from hail or disease brought on from wet weather conditions have been very slight.
