

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FmHA Doubles Number Of Guaranteed Operating Loans

ministration in Texas has made twice the number of guaranteed operating loans this year as it did at this time last year, according to FmHA Texas State Director, J. Lynn

Futch.
As of June 4, FmHA had guaranteed 11,024 operating loans totaling \$1 billion during fiscal 1986. At the same time in fiscal 1985, FmHA had made 5,951 guaranteed loans amounting to \$675 million. Texas has made 1986 guaranteed loans for \$50. 3675 million. Texas has made 386 guaranteed loans for \$50 million. At the same time in fiscal year 1985, Texas had made 171 guaranteed loans for \$25 million.

"After a somewhat slow start," Futch said, "banks and other private sector lending institutions are participated."

ing institu ing institutions are partici-pating to a greater extent with FmHA in providing farm operating credit to farmers who need special

farmers who help.

"For the first time, direct farm operating loan funds have been exhausted in the states," he said. Additional requests for operating credit in Texas will have to be met through ouaranteed loans."

in Texas will have to be met through guaranteed loans."
As an example of the "new spirit of cooperation," Futch noted that in just three weeks since the announcement of Operation Assist, private lenders have accepted 232 FmHA loan guarantees nationwide for \$17.0 million. Under Operation Assist, FmHA County Supervisors complete paperwork for farm credit applicants and take them to a private lender to try to work out an FmHA guaranteed loan. If the private lender makes the loan, FmHA agrees to reimburse

vate lender makes the loan, FmHA agrees to reimburse the lender up to 90 percent of any loss which may occur.

The Interest Buy Down program, authorized in the 1985 farm bill, already has resulted in 819 loans for \$83 million nationwide. Under the interest buy down, FmHA will match a reduction in interest rates by a bank of up to two points.

tion in interest rates by a bank of up to two points. That agreement can result in a reduction of up to four points for the farmers.

The Approved Lender program had attracted 1,300 banks as of April 30. An approved lender is a bank or other lending institution whose forms and paperwork have been approved by whose forms and paperwork have been approved by FmHA in advance. Guaran-tee requests from approved lenders are given high prior-ity by the agency. "Private sector lenders have accepted the new FmHA in advance. Guaran-tee requests from approved

Fire sector lenders have accepted the new FmHA programs designed to help as many efficient farmers as possible to stay in business," Futch said. "The vord is out that the Federal Government can no longer afford to meet all the demand for operating funds from farmers who are facing financial difficulty. From now on, that's a shared responsibility of both the private and public sectors."




Plaque Dedicated To Ernest Erwin



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
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

DPS Predicts 45 May Die In Over July 4 Holiday Period

As many as 45 persons may die in traffic accidents in Texas during the long July 4 holiday period, according to

noliday period, according to an estimate by the Texas Department of Public Safety. "The mixture of lower gasoline prices and increased travel this summer could prove to be deadly over the July 4 holiday," said Colonel Jim Adams, director of the DPS.

"In addition to these facin addition to these fac-tors, travel during the holi-day will be made hazardous by the continuing problems of drunken driving and ex-

of drunken driving and excessive speed."

Last year, 25 persons died as a result to traffic mishaps during the July 4 holiday, but because of the day of the week on which July 4 fell, the holiday period was only 30 hours. This year, the period will be 78 hours, from 6 p.m. Thursday, July 3 to midnight on Sunday, July 6.

Of the traffic fatalities during the July 4, 1985 period, 72 percent occurred in accidents involving excessive speed or drinking.

As in years past, in an effort to hold down the number of holiday traffic

effort to hold down the number of holiday traffic deaths, the DPS will conduct "Operation Holiday," in which additional troopers from the Department's uni-formed services will be plac-ed on Texas highways for heightened traffic law en-forcement and to assist forcement and to assist

forcement and to assist motorists.

Additionally, the Department will conduct its "Operation Motorcide" effort, in which periodic releases will be made throughout the holiday to keep the public informed about the number of traffic deaths occurring deaths occurring traffic ross the state.
"The philosophy behind

public aware of the dangers of holiday travel and what motorists can do to make their time spent on the highways safer," Adams said.

This will be the first July 4 period since the new Texas

period since the new Texas safety belt law went on the books. Last year, 82 percent of those killed in traffic acci-

of those killed in traffic accidents during the holiday period had not been restrained, either by a safety belt or child safety seat.

"The message in that safety belt statistic is clear," Adams said. "The chances of being seriously injured or killed in a traffic accident are greatly reduced by wearing a safety belt and using a child safety seat for children under four years of age."

Adams said the two restraint laws, coupled with increased awareness of the dangers of drinking while driving, are contributing to an overall decrease in Texas traffic fatalities.

"Preliminary figures indi-cate the number of traffic deaths statewide was down deaths statewide was down

The SCS has checked 16 engine and pump plants this spring. The efficiencys on these 16 range from 10 to 18 percent of the standard. The cost to irrigate wheat ranges from \$15.00 to \$27.00 per acre. The cost will depend on the amount of water applied. The extremely dry weather this spring are requiring approximately 6 inches of water to water wheat one time.

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

Rookie of the Year for the team was Robert Miller. He scored 13 points with 10 RBIs and ended the season with a batting average of 375.




