### **Telephone Manager Says Groom** Will Benefit With New System

General Telephone cus-tomers in Groom, Texas will benefit from electronic tele-phone service effective November 8, 1986, accord-ing to Jerry F. West,

Memphis operations mana-

ger.
"A switchover from a mechanical switching system to an electronic switching system (which processes all long distance and local calls for Groom) and local calls for Groom) will bring the latest in telephone technology to customers in Groom. Cutover to this new switching system will take place at 12:01 a.m. on Saturday morning, Nov. 8. During the cutover, customers may experience a 15 minute interruption of service. The midnight hour was selected to minimize customer inconvenience as selected selected to minimize customer inconvenience as much as possible. It's the biggest service improvement change slated for Groom this year," said West, "and it's part of our commitment in providing the finest customer service. the finest customer service

Currently, Groom is being served by electromechanical switching equipment in the central office. "This will be

replaced with a 480 customoffice which will provide customers with faster, more cost-efficient service," he mentioned. After the mentioned. After the conversion, customers will need to dial all seven digits when calling local numbers or their calls will not com-

Customers will have the capability to dial their own operator assisted calls, such as collect, third number as collect, third number billing and person-toperson, long-distance calls from coin telephones, and long-distance credit card calls using GTE or AT&T credit cards.

"This sophisticated and versatile electonic system will give customers faster, more accurate and reliable direct dialed long-distance services as calls are

distance services as calls are routed through Amarillo switching center to destina-tions over the most efficient and direct route," West

"The change will give our customers access to the latest technologies in long-distance services while also providing the capability for making available the special services of the future,"

West said Groom custom-ers will be able to dial their own operator assisted calls such as collect, third number billed and person-to-person by dialing 0 (zero) plus the area code if different from (806) plus the seven digit number of the distant city. The operator will come the line temporarily to de-termine and perform the special assistance required. For credit card calls, the customer dials 0 plus the area code if different from (806) plus the distant number, and the operator will complete the call. Customers using credit card numbers can complete their billing pro-

cedure with the operator.

All these new dialing instructions will be in effect after the conversion on Nov.

Customers who have private lines will no longer have an operator ask for their telephone number when they dial long distance. Equipment called tance. Equipment called 
"ANI" will do all the work 
for the customer. Partyline customers will experience no change in long dis-

West Texas State University's Crops Team will participate in three competitions in the next few weeks in the

in the next few weeks in the Southwest Regional competition to be held at Stillwater, Ok.

WTSU will compete against Oklahoma State University, East Oklahoma State University, East Oklahoma State College and Howard Colege in the regionals.

Members of the WTSU Crops Team are Patrick Weinheimer, Jr., a sophomore plant science major from Groom; Dave Mann, a senior history major from Los Angeles; Bill Settle, a junior plant science major from Silverton; and Coby Kriegshauser, a sophomore

plant science major from Hereford.

Hereford.

The competition is in three pahses: 1) Identification of 200 specimens of plants, seeds, weeds, crops, or diseases; 2) seed analy-

or diseases; 2) seed analysis; and 3) grain grading (grains for commercial use).

"Perfection is our goal" is written on the chalkboard in the room where the crops team prepares. According to Dr. Leonard Wilson, sponsor of the team, the compe-tition is so stiff, even a few mistakes can be disastrous

to the team's placing.
But WTSU's team has fared well in recent years.
"We generally win the regional," Wilson said. And the American Royal and Chicago Board of Trade.
"We're regulity pleased. usually placed we've usually placed fourth or better every year. We've won four different times." times.

At the American Royal competition Nov. 18, team members will go on several educational tours including the Kansas City Board of Trade, Genreal Mills flour mill and Farmland Indus tries
