"This public hearing will allow the Committee members to hear first-hand the problems county officials are facing and to begin formulatiog a strategy on how we can address those problems when the Legislature convenes next January.

Buchanan predicted that, except for balancing the State's budget, the liability insurance crisis would be the single-most important issue confronting the Legislature. In addition to the liability insurance issue, the County Affairs Committee is studying the overall finan cial condition of county gov erned what rexas.
