The illegal aliens ranged in age from 15 years to 45 years of age and were enroute to Florida from Ari-

One female was accompanying the 19 young men.
It became very difficult for local law enforcement officers DPS officers Gary Davis, Gerald Ray and Ed Longoria of Claude and County Deputy Jerry Gaines to understand the Spanish speaking folks. Rosa Lopez was called to help interpret the needed information.

All the aliens were farm laborers. The driver of the van was Francisco Pedro, owning Arizona driver's license from Maricopa,

Local law enforcement officers found approximate-ly \$200 in Mexican currency in the van along with a pistol.

All 20 aliens were calm and cooperative as they waited at Justice of the Peace Max Wade's office while the authorities from the Border Patrol in Amarillo arrived to begin the process of deporting the aliens to El Paso and back across the Mexican border. 



The McLean City Council met in regular session last Tuesday night at City Hall. Members present were Aldermen Miro Pakan, Martha Jo Bailey, Dr. H.F. Fabian, George Green and Mayor G.W. Terry.

Jerry Don Cook was appointed to fill the position vacated by Brian Pohlmeier. According to information received from the Secretary of State's office, an appointed representative will serve until the City's next election. This means that Mr. Cook will remain in the position until April, 1987, when the next city election takes place.

Regarding his appointment, Mr. Cook said, "It's a tough job but I will do my best to do what's right for everyone concerned."

In other business, the council:

-Approved the purchase of 187 street signs.

-Approved matching State funds of \$300 for retired firemen.

-Agreed to meet with Kenneth Everett to discuss the use of a part of the factory building to assemble and test electronic

-Met with Dwight Brandt to review plans for the use of the remaining money from the Water Improvement Grant. The Council agreed to advertise for bids on this project and to open

bids on Sept. 30.

Approved moving the Fire Department to the west side of the factory building and to enter into a 99 year contract with the department. Estimated cost of the move will be \$3,000-\$5.000.

Adopted a motion to add \$1.00 per month to City utility bills to defray the cost of a new fire truck. The \$1.00 charge, which will be added to to bills beginning October 1, will continue for the next 10 years at which time a new truck will be purchased.

-Accepted the resignation of Tony Acuna from the Housing Authority Board.

-Appointed Gordon Maddox as auditor for the 1985-86 audit.

-Approved the first reading of Ordinance #226, setting the ad valorem tax rate for 1986 at \$0.2792 per \$100 valuation.

-Agreed to give all regular City employees a 3 percent cost of living raise.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION **NOVEMBER 4, 1986**

PROPOSITION NO. 1
ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 15 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among the counties in which the property of the railroad is located for purposes of property taxation, and would delete the requirement that the Comptroller participate in making the allocation. To comply with both statutory and constitutional law, the apportionment currently is being made by the State Property Tax Board in conjunction with the Comptroller.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide by

"The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among counties for purposes of property taxation."

PROPOSITION NO. 2
ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 33 proposes a constitutional amendment that would replace the constitutional requirement that the subject of a bill be expressed in its title with a mandate that each house of the legislature adopt rules of procedure that would require the subject of each bill to be expressed in its title in a manner that gives the legislature and the public reasonable notice of that subject. Determining compliance with the rule would be the responsibility of the legislature. Cur-

rently, a law is invalidated if a court finds its caption is defective. The amendment would provide that past and future enactments may not be held void on the basis of an insufficient title.

The amendment also would eliminate the court of the court o

insufficient title.

The amendment also would eliminate the suggestion that the state's laws be revised every ten years, and instead would provide for continuing revision of state laws.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment requiring each house to include in its rules of procedure a rule that each bill contain a title expressing the bill's subject, and providing for the continuing revision of state laws."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the Legislature to authorize any county, city, town, or other political subdivision to use public funds or credit to pay insurance premiums on nonassessable life, health, or accident policies. Due to the prohibition in the constitution against the lending of credit and granting of public money, political subdivisions currently are prohibited from becoming shareholders in associations such as mutual-insurance companies, in which policyholders are shareholders. A nonassessable mutual insurance policy does not allow a company to raise capital by assessing the policyholder an extra amount on a pre-House Joint Resolution 73 propo

mium. This amendment will allow mutual insurance companies and stock companies to bid for life and group policies of political sions. Public liability will be

subdivisions. Public liability will be limited to the payment of premums specified in the contract.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing political subdivisions the opportunity to engage in and transact business with authorized mutual insurance companies in mutual insurance companies in the same manner as with other insurance companies."

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would repeal the prohibition against branch banking by state banks and would allow state banks and national banks domiciled in this state to establish and operate banking facilities at locations within the county or city where they are domiciled. The amendment would also authorize the Legislature to permit a state bank or a national bank domiciled in this state to engage in business at more than one place if it acquires a failed state bank or national bank domiciled in this state. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide that a bank may offer full service banking at more than one location within the city or county where its principal facility is located, subject to limitations and restrictions provided by law."
