Auction Raises \$12,593 To Begin Renovation

Members of Groom Economic Development Corporation termed the auction held Saturday a success with \$12,593.25 raised toward renovation of the building. Buyers from all over the Texas panhandle came from as far away as Lockney and Shamrock to purchase items in the auction. There were 117 registered buyers including doctors, hospital administrators and local citizens.

Cob Britten and Pat Britten volunteered their services as auctioneers for the event. A number of purchases were made for sentimental value including stool used by Dr. Witt after a long day in surgery as he began paper work.

Now that the money has been made, the first item of

"Work is expected to


commence in the next few days," said Johnny Brumley head of the efforts to get the building into shape as a community center. The work force will include 10 team leaders with three additional members on each work

By now the plans for the building have been unveiled to each and every civic group. The building will include facilities for the clinic, community meeting hall and possibly offices and housing for the elderly.

"With volunteered labor, continued donations and memorials, we will be able to move toward accomplishing goals for the building," said Brumley.







ing season.

Region 5, said, "Winter driving can be very hazard-ous. Driver's are faced with many dangerous obstacles: nights are longer, freezing temperatures, snow, sleet, and ice covered roads, all creating handicaps for the

driver.

The most important safetytip for winter driving is to
'slow down.' On ice covered roads, only drive when it's necessary and realize that it's going to take you at least it's going to take you at least twice as long to cover that same distance that you drove when the road was dry and clear of ice. So, re-member to set more time aside for driving under win-ter conditions.

when temperatures drop below the freezing point, drivers must guard against reduced visibility caused by frosted windows and wind-shilds. Allow your cars engine to warm up and for the defroster to become effec-tive before driving. Be sure you windows and head-lights are clear and free of any obstructions like snow or mud. Do all this in advance, before you hit the road."

Recently, as the controversy built over use of public built over use of public money to build a golf course in Pampa, Buddy Epperson added his name by signing up as a write-in candidate. In the final totals of the election, Simmons hauled in 1550 county-wide votes while getting 281 in Precinct 5, which includes the McLean area. Smitherman had 784 votes in the county and 203 in the precinct. Epperson had 422 total votes with only 3 comping from the
