

By Superintendent **Rex Peeples** The Texas Legislature is now in session and is wrestling with many reforms for education. One of the more important is a law that would cap damage awards and attorney's fees, and eliminate joint and several liability. This is commonly

School Boards estimates that

it costs Texas school districts between \$8 and \$10 million annually to deal with liability risks. The rate of growth in these costs has increased over 100 percent since 1983. It is understandable that insurance companies offering this liability in Texas dropped from 14 in 1984 to three in 1986.

In the past. . . The queston of electing a secretary to succeed Ed Musser was narrowed down to three candidates: Mrs. Spoth, Beaulah Shockley and Mrs. Holland. Sales Tax Rebates Decline

More bad news arrived this month with the rebate in city sales taxes taking another 13 percent drop. According to Bob Bullock, State Comptroller, payments are currently running 6 percent behind throughout the

The payments represent January sales reported during February.

Countywide the rebates dropped 9.5 percent. The City of Panhandle's figure dropped 10.6 percent over year's figure; Skellytown's rebate declined 19.8 percent and White Deer showed a 6 percent increase.

Sales taxes reported on an annual basis were also down. The total annual sales in Carson County in 1985 were in excess of \$15 million, this year they were around \$9 million.



Second Grant

City Engineer Dwight Brandt met with city leaders last Tuesday night to discuss the feasibility of acquiring a TDCA Grant for water improvements in Groom. The City will make application to improve the water system on the east side of Groom.

Brandt gave an overview of techniques that can be used to increase water pressure to that side of the city without total replacement of water lines.

The grant falls under the same guidelines as the one acquired to increase needed water storage to the City. It will require proof that the improvements will benefit those of low to moderate income living in the city.

The City will be assisted in the grant bidding process by Brandt and PRPC representatives.

Mayor Al Homer presented concerns of poor water drainage on Broadway in Groom. His plans included enlisting the aid of the local FFA chapter to build ramps where necessary.

The annual Rabies Clinic was discussed. The City will ask the veterinarian from Panhandle to man the clinic and remind all local pet owners annual vaccinations are required by city ordinance.

Councilman John Eschle moved that the General Fund be placed in an interest bearing account. The approval was also given to transfer \$5,000 from the General Fund to the water works fund.

In other action, a blade no longer used with city equipment was sold for \$50.
