Speed Limit On Rural Stretches Of Interstate Jumps To 65

Last Friday, the highway commission established the new maximum speed limit of 65 mph for cars and light trucks on rural Interstate highways. In this context, "rural" means outside rural means outside more people.

More than 1,300 signs were to go up statewide. The speed limits affected 2,441 miles of the 3,148 -mile Interstate system in Texas but only about 8 percent of the total vehicle miles traveled
