Highway 273 Bridge to be Replaced

The Texas State Department of Highway and Public Transportation is planning to replace the State Highway 273 bridge over McClellan Creek about six miles north of McLean.

"The proposed construction includes removing the old bridge and replacing it with a new one in order to accommodate traffic on State 273," according to Jerry Raines of Pampa who will directly supervise the work once it is underway.

A temporary detour will be constructed across the creek just west of the current SH 273 bridge. Portions of the detour will be removed when construction is completed, Raines said.

How to Make After-**School Time Count**

The following is another in a series of articles by Alanreed Principal Billy Bob Adams on the importance of parents in supporting their child's education.

"What children learn outside of school is just as important as what they learn in the classroom," says Joan M. Bergstron, Ed.D. of Wheelock College, Boston. So how do you make time after school valuable for your child? Education experts agree that a balance of structured time (i.e., planned, organized activities, usually with adult supervision) and unstructured or "free" time is the best possible combination.

How structured time helps

*Develops interests that may last a lifetime.

Teaches self-discipline. Wipes out boredom.

Unstructured time has its nefits too:

Gives kids time to be

•Relieves stress (kids need to unwind too). *Develops creativity and a sense of responsibility for entertaining themselves.

How to choose the best after-school activities for your child:

*Consider your child's age. Kindergartners through 3rd graders can benefit from an average of 3 hours per week of structured time; grades 4 to 6 can have up to 7 hours

At any age, set a maximum of three structured activities per week.

*Find out what your child likes to do. Most children will readily tell you. Look at what materials, toys and activities he shows an interest in. Is it a box of crayons or a chemistry set? Take him to special stores (art supply, hardware, computer) to learn what materials 'speak" to him.

*Allow for time, transportation and your pocketbook. Before you sign your child up for an extra-curricular activity, make sure it won't eat into her homework time; figure out how she will get there and back and estimate how much the activity will end up costing.

*Talk about commitment beforehand if your youngster wants to take music lessons, discuss with him

the importance of practice

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before you sign him up.

Set up a schedule:

*Be sure there's a good balance of activities. Don't overschedule your young-

*Set up a monthly calendar. This helps both you and your child keep track of the schedule. Pencil in homework first and then plan around it. Allow at least a half an hour for younger children and an hour for older ones. After homework write all other activities: lessons, practice, playtime, TV,

*Look for signs of overloading(crankiness, headaches, trouble at school) and underloading (boredom, overeating, fights with siblings). If this happens talk with children about the

*Adjust as necessary. Having a super child is not the goal. The goal is to have a happy child.

Beef Cheaper Than You Think It Is

EDITOR'S NOTE: This article originally appeared in the April 1987 issue of THE CATTLE CARTEL NEWS-LETTER. The article is called "Life in the Express Lane" by Carol Wilson. It was given to the McLean News by Bill Graham:

My bill at the grocery store last week was \$137.00. If I had five kids and a hungry husband at home, that wouldn't have been too bad. But I thought it was a terrible price to pay for food for two people.

I was home stashing my supplies in the cabinet when a friend came over. In the midst of my singing the grocery store blues, she commented, "Oh well, you probably bought a lot of meat.

She didn't know that we have half a beef in our freezer. The \$137 went for flour and sugar and canned goods and cabbage, but not for meat. But her comments piqued my interest. Her opinion is a popular one. Most people blame their high grocery bills on the "high" cost of meat.

I decided to do some comparative pricing next time I went shopping. I found the same grocery store that sells beef loins for 16 cents an ounce charges 31 cents an ounce for halibut steak and 37 cents an ounce for lobster. Something was starting to smell a little

I like good home grilled hamburgers, so I decided to find out what they were

really costing. Ground beef was a bargain at seven cents an ounce. But the accompanying catsup, mustard and mayonnaise retail for six, 16 and seven cents an ounce. Ouch!

In the next aisle, peanut butter was selling for 13 cents an ounce...and an ounce of crackers to go with it cost 20 cents. The new sugar-free Jello is selling like hotcakes, at the prohibitive price of \$1.36 an ounce. And corn chips at 90 cents and cheese puffs at 98 cents could sure run the bill up quickly! At those prices, I didn't think eight cents an ounce was too much to pay for pork roast.

Prepared breakfast cereal was selling for 18 cents an ounce, four cents more than the cost for an ounce of Choice Sirloin steak. Beef was looking like a better buy all the time! I was glad I didn't like steak sauce when I found it would cost 23 cents an ounce to put sauce on my 14 cent steak.

I found that a quarter would purchase an ounce of toothpaste or shampoo and razors retailed for 30 cents apiece. Light bulbs go for a dollar apiece. Deodorant costs 30 cents an ounce. And you can take a Porterhouse steak home for 20 cents an ounce, a nickel less than it takes to buy a roll of toilet

And the list continues. One ounce of tea bags sells for 89 cents, but we haven't seen a reenactment of the Boston Tea Party. An ounce of Kool-Aid costs 75 cents and coffee goes for 27 cents an ounce. But boneless hams are sold for 9 cents per

I just can't figure why people will complain about paying 10 cents an ounce for Round steak and turn right around and buy Stove Top

stuffing for 20 cents an ounce. That is double the money! I prefer standing over a hot grill tending the beef ribs I bought for six cents an ounce to dusting furniture with my 11 cents an ounce polish. (Mmmm, I can almost taste the barbecue right now!)

The store was full of paradoxes. Salad dressing mix is sold for \$1.87 an ounce and breakfast bars go for 30 cents. Chuck steak, on the other hand, can be bought for less than a dime. Ounce for ounce, candy bars sell for more than three times the price of Chuck steak.

When steaks are cheaper than paper towels or chocolate chips or coffee, I find it hard to believe that people: can gripe about the prices they pay over the meat

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

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

Coffee M e m o r i a l Blood Center has not only dropped the non-replacement fee, but also the "holding charges" used previously for having blood available during surgery; yet not actually transfused. Blood is available to all who need it, charging only a processing fee which is covered through most existing company and individual insurance policies and now is lower due to the aforementioned decreases.

Workday Saturday To Bring Community Center Near Completion

Progress continues to be made on the Groom Community Center. Working nights this week, the walls in the community center area are being textoned and readied for painting.

The Groom Economic Development Corporation was running very low on funds as this final bit of construction needed

wind the project to a close. Monday morning, two checks for \$1,000 each were received, so plans were immediately made to continue and have the ceiling in place by next week. One of the checks came from an individual donor and the other was made by the local Lions Club which originally donated funds to the GEDC

to get started. Work completed this week will bring the community center completion down to the final step, covering the floor and purchase of tables and chairs.

"The Groom Community Center Board plans to spearhead a fund-raiser and at that time we'll have the costs available and let people donate funds to cover

the purchases. At the same time, we

plan to unveil the plans for an endowments program to insure ample funds are available for the operations of the center," said Brumley.


So far, organizers have been very pleased with the memorials and donations they have received. Rent is also being collected on the clinic.

Looking at the project in the long range, when everything is running smoothly, the GEDC hopes to begin the process of securing a grant to renovate remaining southwest portion of the hospital into a 7-9 unit congregat housing project.

'Should this area be rehabilitated in such a way,' says Brumley, "it could provide the money needed to operate the facility."

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
