Groom Tigers Roll On As Gruver Gets Thumped

The Groom Tigers looked even more impressive in their second outing at Gruver on Friday night, when the Tigers handed the Greyhounds a 42-14 loss. The Tiger defense led the way in the second half for the offense to dominate play and run up the score.

"Our defensive unit did a superb job," said Coach Gary Rambo. In the second half Gruver had no first downs.

The first half the two teams appeared to be evenly matched with each scoring two a piece and going in at the half 14-14. Gruver got on the board first on a 6-yard pass play. The Tigers came right back early in the second quarter tying the score with Brent Thornton scoring from 3-yards out. Britten's kick tied the score.

The next score was again by a successful pass attack by Gruver's quarterback with a 63-yard completed pass.

The determined Tigers came back marching the ball all the way down the field to the one-yard line with Jack Britten scoring

from one yard out. His kick was again successful and the score was tied with time running out on the first half of play.

Thehalftime locker room scene in the Tiger's dressing room is drawing some attention now as Tiger fans are curious to know just what Coaches Coffee, Rambo and Belcher say to rally their team to outstanding second half performances. Twice now the Tigers have come back out at the half to dominate the game and chalk up two impressive wins.

"Thanks to some outstanding defensive play by Brent Thompson, Rocky Crump and Daniel Lambert," said Coach Rambo, the Tigers offense exploded in the second half. The Tigers win was set into motion early in the third period when Bruce Thornton made the all important score when on fourth and four he carried the ball 33 yards for the TD.

The next score came easy as the Tiger's defense held Gruver on their own one-yard line in Greyhound

territory four downs. Gruver was forced to kick from their own endzone.

The ball went straight up into the wind and an unlucky break for the Greyhounds came down again

on the one yard line. Jack Britten scored on the next play.

The Tigers then salted the Greyhounds wounds by scoring twice more on short runs by Britten from 3-yards out and Brent Thornton from 4-yards. Britten hit each PAT kick giving him 11 of 12 for this season.

No doubt the running backs took care of business with 396 yards total rushing. Leading rushers were Bruce Thornton averaging 9 yards per carry, Jack Britten had an 8 yard average per carry and Brent Thornton averaged 5 yards per carry.

The Tigers will host Phillips Friday in their homecoming clash. Pre-game activities including presentation of the Homecoming Queen will be at 7:30 p.m. Kickoff will be at 8:00.

Farm Safety Week

September 21-27 is National Farm Safety Week and Southwest Public Service Company once again is reminding area farmers and ranchers to be especially careful when working around electricity.

"While power lines carry needed electricity to farms and ranches," said SPS safety manager Bill Greaser, "even the slightest contact with these lines can injure or kill."

In this part of the country, irrigation pipes coming into contact with power lines is the leading cause of electricity-related farm injuries and deaths, Greaser said.

"Irrigation pipe can be a deadly conductor of electricity," he said. "If someone lifts a tall section of pipe into an overhead line, he could be severely burned or electrocuted."

SPS continually stresses the need to "watch up for safety," a message that is emphasized in informational materials offered by the Company to area farmers and ranchers. These materials are available from any SPS office.

Tax Reform To Benefit Farmers

Most farmers and ranchers will likely benefit from the tax reform bill currently awaiting approval in Congress.

"While there are both pluses and minuses in the bill as far as farmers and ranchers are concerned, generally 80 percent should come out ahead," says Dr. Wayne Hayenga, economist with Texas A&M. The proposed tax bill is expected to cut individual taxes by an average of 6.1 percent.

However, the effects of the bill will not be uniformly spread around. Live-stock producers will lose the important benefit of capital gain treatment on raised breeding stock. Purebred breeders and crop farmers especially will miss the benefit of the 10 percent investment tax credit on purchased depreciable tangible property.


Cash accounting will still be allowed but with restrictions on some deductions for unused supplies. This restriction may also help curb some perceived abuses of the accounting rules by investors.

As far as tax cuts are concerned, families with annual gross incomes between \$10,000 and \$30,000 will see about a 10 percent reduction in taxes mainly due to increased personal exemptions from the current \$1,080 to \$1,950 in 1988.

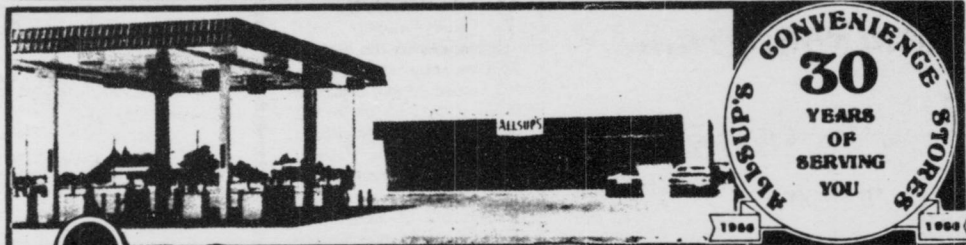

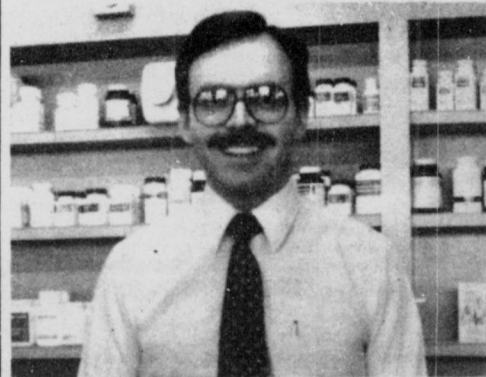
Water service was interrupted from 3:00 to 7:00 p.m. on Wednesday afternoon while repairs were made on three separate leaks.
