The University of Texas has just issued full four-year scholar ships to eight of the winners in the 1912 prize crop contest of The Texas Industrial Congress.
They twere sent to Col. Henry They were sent to Col. Aenry Exall, president of the Congress for his signature and were then mailed to the fortunate young farmers. Miss Annie Lou Dar by of Pittsbuig, Camp Co. winner of $\$ 25$; the fourth prize in he Fexas Cotton Club, is the only girl among the scholarship winners. She raised 2.03 bales on one acre at a net profii of 84.71. The other winners are: Ifred Branch, Overton, Rusk County who received the first Crize of $\$ 250$ in the Texas Corn lub lor one acre of corn. His eld was 167.5 bushels produced a profit of $\$ 95.35$. Emil S. Covar. of Fayetteville, Fayette County, awarded $\$ 135.00$, the second prize in the same class
on a production 125.27 bushels on a production 125.27 bushels
at a net profit of $\$ 69.38$. John R. Henderson, Birthright, HopR. Henderson, Birthright, Hop
kins County, $\$ 75$ the third priza kins County, $\$ 75$ the third priza
in the Texas Corn Club for a yield of 133.8 bushels at a profit of $\$ 67.16$. Henry Kovar, Fay. etteville, Fayette County, awarded 859. the fourth prize in the same class on a yield of 188 . 22 bushels at a profit of 864.95 . I. W. Kloppenburg, Sublime W. Kloppenburg, Sublime
Lavoca County, awarded the sec ond prize of $\$ 125$. in the Texas Cotton Club for one acre of coton on a yield of 2.09 bales at a profit of \$91.33. Webb Crow, Tyler, Smith County, awarded 75. the third prize in the Texas Cotton Club for a yield of 2.38 bales-the largest cotton pro duction of Texas during 1912net profit $\$ 85.40$. Raymond Baca, Fayetteville, Fayett County, awarded $\$ 200$, the sec ond prize awarded in class D or two acres of kafir corn o milo-maize. His yield was 157.1 bushels, net profit \$48.49.
Mr. E. S. Kovar was eutitled to the scholarship on two ac counts as he was awarded th first prize in the Texas Cotton Glub on a yield of 2.01 bales produced at a profit of $\$ 91.68$ in addition to the second prize in he Texas Corn Club.
The announcement of the 1913 prize offer of $\$ 10,000$ is now be ing distributed in pamphlet form. The number of acres in the four crop model demonstration farm, known as class A, has been re duced from ten to four acres, thus affording the tenant farmers who rent only a small farm, an equal opportunity to contest
for the large prizes offered in or the large prizes offered in his class. The Congress antici pates that a large number of boys will also enter this class. A larger number of prizes have been offered in the Texas Corn and Cotton Clubs, open to boy and girls over ten and under dwenty years of age.
