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
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Brownie Troop Inducts New Members

Outstanding Chianina Breeder Award for 1987. The award is presented to only one breeder in the United States each year.

The Burks have been very active in the American Chianina Association. Kay is currently serving as president of the Southwest Region (Texas and New Mexico), as well as being an active member on the national board of directors. She is the first woman ever to serve either as Regional president or as a national board member. Charles is a past member and chairman of the board.



Certain individuals in areas served by General Telephone in Texas who presently do not have telephone service may be eligible for reduced telephone installation charges as part of a national program being piloted in Texas to expand the availability of telephone

E.L. "Buddy" Langley, president of General Telephone, said installation fees for eligible participants will be reduced by a maximum of 130 whith the balance payable without interest in four

equal monthly payments.

Texas is one of four states

in which the program, called Link Up America, is being The telephone compnay official siad the goal is to preserve and pro-mote telephone service for low income households and to get those Americans who currently do not have telephone service onto the telephone network.

The concept of Link Up America was proposed earlier in the year by the Federal-State Joint Board to the Federal Communications

Commission. The Fcc adopted th program in April.

The program will be fund-ed through interstate tele-

phone revenues.

Qualification for the program is based on income level and eligibility for social service assistance programs. In general, an individual or household will qualify if income is below the federal poverty level and the individual has not had telephone service for at least three months.

Qualified individuals who are interested in more details or who might want tosign up for the program are asked to contact the Link Up America representative in the General Telephone business office.

The program is limited to reduced installation charges and does not include any assistance with monthly phone charges.



Fire Department Keeps Busy

If you like plenty of action, join the McLean Fire Department. The members of our volunteer brigade have seen plenty of action during the past week, responding to 5 fires in a period between Dec. 1 and Dec. 6.

It all started last Tuesday with a call from the Tony Acuna residence. Fortunately the call was a false alarm as there were just smoke caused by a plugged up vent in the fireplace. Fire Chief Clifford McDonald said that 'the incident is a good reminder to all of us that we should check our fireplace vents every so often to make sure they are free from any blockage.'

The next three calls were responses to grassfires, one each on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. The fires were on the property of Lloyd Littlefield, Jim Hathaway and at the dump ground. All were extinguished without trouble. Mc-Donald said there was no connection between all of these fires and all seem to have been accidents.

The final fire occured in a car on Dec. 6. The vehicle, owned by a Missouri man, caught fire about one-half mile east of town on I-40 and was totally destroyed. The driver was not hurt.

No injuries or reports of significant damage resulted from these incidents.






