Commissioners Accept Bids

The Carson County Commissioners Court met on September 26th with all members present. The minutes were read and ap-

Judge Roselius reported to the court that Southwestern Public Service had sent a heating and cooling consultant as requested to check the efficiency of the county's systems. A report of the SPS inspection will be given at a later date.

In other items of business the court:

-Heard that commodities to be given out in October will be butter, cornmeal and milk, according to the dis-

-Discussed present medical coverage for Carson County employees;

-Held the first public hearing and granted approval to apply for a grant to make the courthouse accessible to persons with handicaps. This will be the third time the county has applied for the grant. The next public hearing will be held on October

-Accepted two bids. The first was for a 1989 Ford pick-up from Metcalf Motor Co. for use by the County Extension Office. The cost will be \$13,685 less \$4,485 for a trade-in. The second bid from Glasscock River Rock for \$5,230 was accepted for repair and reservicing of the exterior steps at the courthouse;

-Approved a fire service greement with Stanford at a rate of \$200 per call for the 1988-89 program year.

There being no other business to conduct, the meeting was adjourned.

Kiley Lambert Notified By NMSC

Groom High School has been notified by National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC) that Kiley Wayne Lambert has been designated a Commended Student in the 1989 National Merit Scholarship Program. The principal, Kenneth Sweatt, announced today that this senior placed in the top 50,000 of more than one million participants in the 34th annual Merit Program and will receive a Letter of Commendation in recognition of outstanding academic promise.

A official of NMSC stated, "Being named a Commended Student in the extremely competitive Merit Program is a credit to these young men and women and the schools which play a key role in the development of academically talented youth. We hope the recognition these students have earned will increase their motivation to use their abilities to the fullest, for they represent an important intellecual resource which our nation needs."

The over one million participants in the current Merit Program entered the competition by taking the PSAT/ NMSQT in October 1987 as high school juniors. Although their qualifying test scores are very high, the 35,000 young people throughout the nation who. are Commended Students scored slightly below the level required for Semifinalist standing in their respective states. Only the 15,000 Semifinalists, whose names were announced on September 15, will continue in the competition for some 6,000 Merit Scholarships to be awarded in the spring of


National Yearbook Week
