They also agreed to allow a 20 percent homestead exemption and a discount of 3, 2 and 1 percent for early payment of County taxes beginning on October, 1989.

A request from Cabot Corporation to assign a right of way in the north part of the County to their successor or assignees was approved, and a discussion was held on House Bill 2335 and how the County could be involved in this recently passed Criminal Justice Legislation.

Graduate Course Offered

The West Texas Center for Economic Education will offer the special graduate credit course "Economics in the Social Sciences" July 17 through August 1 on the West Texas State university campus in Canyon. The course, designed for kindergarten through sixth grade teachers, emphasizes the Texas essential elements and relevant basic concepts. Attention will be focused on the review, illustration and application of proven audiovisual and other resource materials for effectively teaching economic concepts in the elementary classroom.

The instructor is Dr. Clint Daniels, associate professor of economics and director of the West Texas Center for Economic Education at WTSU.

Classes will be conducted from 8:15 a.m. - noon Monday through Thursday, July 17 through August 1. The fee for the 10 class session is \$26.50, including tuition and classroom support materials. The center is able to sponsor the course at this reduced fee because of a grant by the Amarillo Area Foundation with funds from its supporting organization, the Don and Sybil Harrington Foundation.

Although the course may be taken without formal

admission to the WTSU graduation program, it is encouraged for those who may want to apply credit toward a WTSU degree.

The course is limited to 20 participants, and applications will be accepted until July 10 on a first-come, first served basis.

SPS To Distribute

13 Million In Credits

Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) filed today to distribute \$13 million in credits to its Texas retail customers, primarily representing these customers' share of proceeds from SPS's sales of

electricity to other utilities.

A residential customer who uses 1,000 kilowatt hours a month would receive a credit of \$10.21.

These new credits are separate from and in addition to previously announced credits related to recent SPS rate reductions.

As a participant in an experimental market program, SPS has been able to sell electricity to a western utilities as far away as California on a competitive basis, said Jerry Diller, SPS's group manager of rates and regulation. Under the program, 75 percent of the difference between the cost of production and the sales price is to go to customers in the SPS service area, Diller said.

"Previously, these sales required time-consuming approvals of individual transactions and a rigid price formula established by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission," Diller said. "Under the experimental program, utilities are able to buy and sell electricity in what amounts to a daily auction." The credit also represents proceeds from SPS sales to other utilities made in the traditional regulated manner.

SPS has been successful in the bulk-power market because it is a low-cost producer, Diller said.

Demand has been high because several power plants in the western United States have been out of service for various reasons," Diller said. "Also, hydroelectric power from the Pacific Northwest was limited due to relatively dry conditions."

These circumstances will change, Diller said, so it is difficult to predict if SPS sales at past levels will continue.

SPS filed the requested credit with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT). If approved, the

credit would be recognized in August electric bills.

"We also are requesting that the PUCT establish a procedure whereby we can pass on any future credits from such sales on a periodic basis as they accumulate," Diller said. "Under present PUCT procedures this is not possible."

The proceeds from these bulk-power sales to other utilities are treated as a fuel-cost credit. The \$13 million credit requested by SPS included approximately \$2 million in traditional fuel savings resulting from lower costs for coal and natural gas. The credit also includes interest at 11.7 percent.

Early Data

Agriculture Census

Early data from the 1987 Census of Agriculture show that the U.S. had 2,087,759 farms, 1,059,573 of which had annual product sales of \$10,000 or more. Land in farms totaled 964,470,625 acres, 86 percent of them in farms with \$10,000 or more in sales, the Commerce Department's Census Bureau reported.

The census showed that the U.S.'s farmers and ranchers sold \$136 billion in agricultural products and that farms with \$10,000 or more in sales averaged \$125,187 per farm.

Other findings: \$58.9 billion or 43 percent of total agricultural sales were for crops, while \$77.1 billion or 57 percent came from the sale of livestock, poultry and their products.

The agriculture census obtains information on all identified farm and ranch operations in the United States. The Census Bureau defines a farm as any place where \$1,000 or more of agricultural products were produced and sold or normally would have been sold during the census year. Sampling is used to collect data for selected items and to account for nonresponding farm operations.

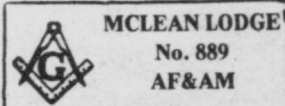

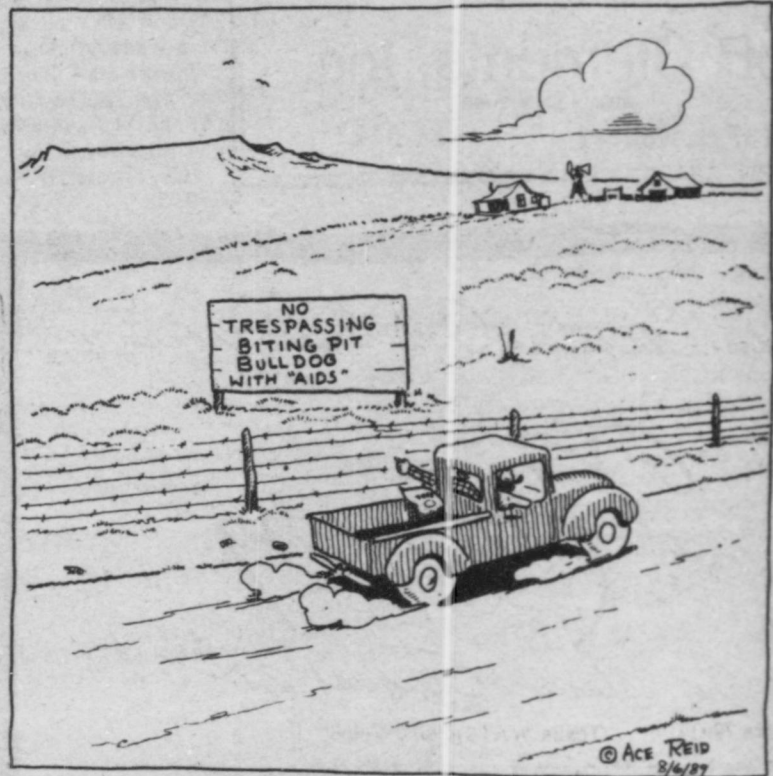
Recipe

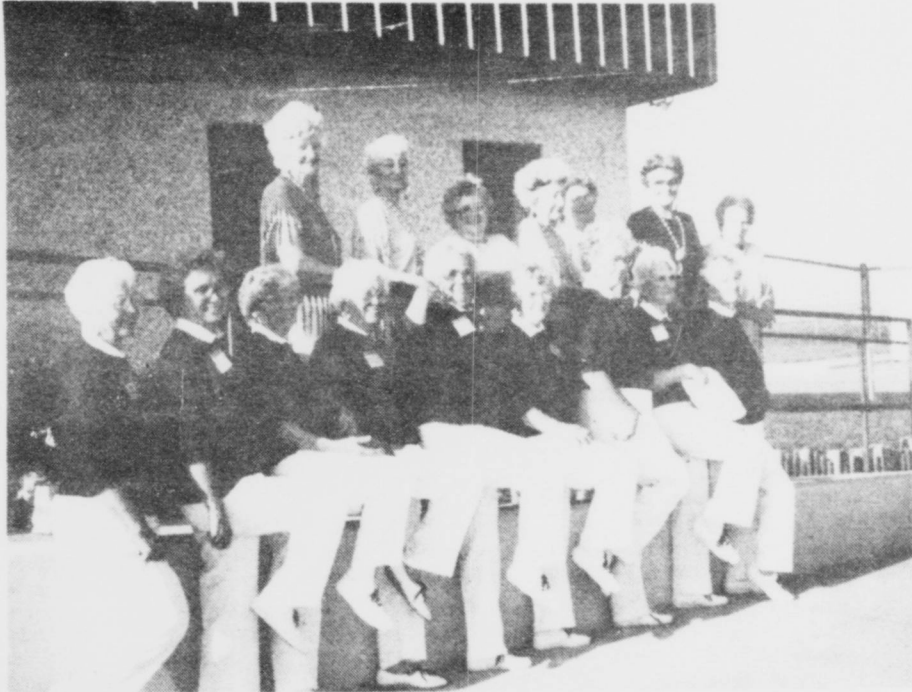

All Census Bureau workers will display official red, white and blue identification badges. Residents are asked to cooperate with them. Public cooperation will mean a better, more accurate, and complete address list will be available for the delivery of the 1990 census questionnaires.

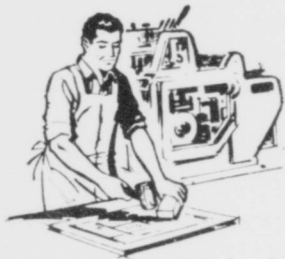

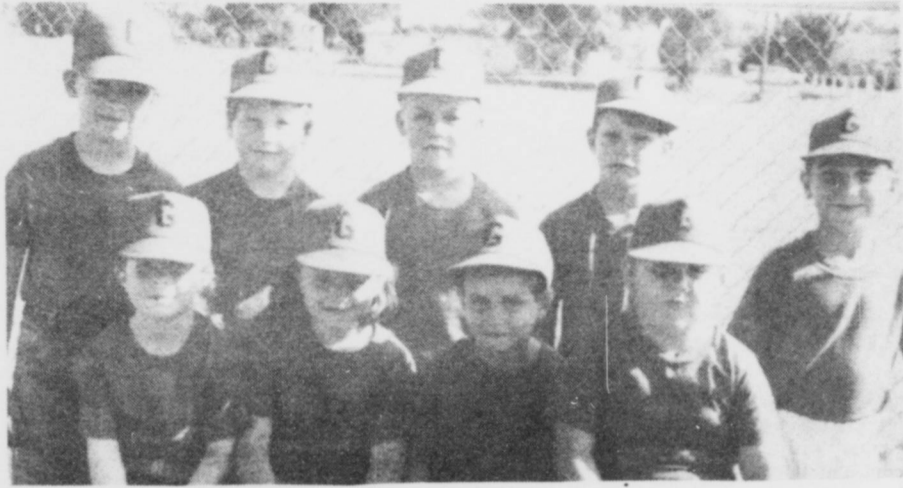

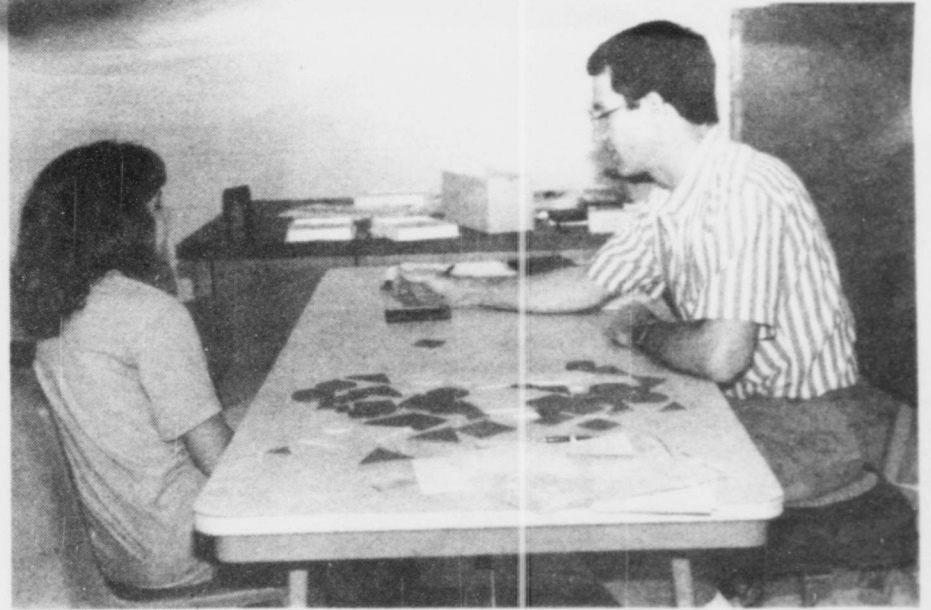

Renovation To Begin

**On Carson Co.
Courthouse**

Renovating the Carson County Courthouse to make to handicap accessible has been a thorn in the side of commissioners for several years. Since the County has received revenue sharing funds, this project is required by the federal government.

The County's application for a PRPC grant to help fund the renovation has been rejected for three consecutive years. Therefore, today's commissioners Court is eyeing how the job can be done to comply with regulations and at the same time be done in the most economical way.

John Ward of Ward, Brown and Associates, an architectural firm, met with the commissioners Monday to review those plans and discuss changes that would need to be made to modify the original plans.

Mr. Ward was asked to meet with the Court again on July 11 with an updated estimate of costs so the County can decide on the best possible avenue to take toward the completion of the project.

Earlier in Monday's session, the Court approved a \$846 amendment to the Sheriff's Department budget to complete the purchase of new uniforms.
