Homer-Homen Prepare For Vote

Groom voters will vote this Saturday, May 6, 1989 in the city and school elections from 7:00 a.m. til 7:00 p.m. in the school business office. Mayor Al Homer is being challenged by John Alan Homen for the city's top position. Alfred Homer is seeking his fifth term as mayor where he says his candidacy is based on his eight years of experience and his performance as mayor. Homer said,"The city is in good, sound financial shape and after the water well built eight years ago is paid off next year, the city will be without debt." Homer added that plans are underway to begin working on resurfacing the city

John Alan Homen said, "My primary concern is the survival of this community

and with this in mind I will concentrate on improving the economy such as cleaning up the abandoned buildings and properties in town. I believe in doing this it will attract new businesses and families to our community." Homen said, "By achieving these goals it will help our struggling school system, which I feel is the heart of the community."

The city council seats open are now held by Jerry Thornton and Ronny Fields, both are seeking re-election and both are running unopposed. This will be Thornton and Fields second term if re-elected.

The race for Groom School Board trustees is a bit more challenged with six candidates seeking three seats Incumbents Hop Britten,

SPS Move To Hurt Groom

Officials of the City of Groom, Groom Schools, and Groom Economic Development Corporation wrote letters and made phone calls last week to the District and Division Managers of Southwestern Public Service after learning that a service representative would not be relocated in Groom after the retirement of James Duke, local service manager for many years.

The officials asked SPS to re-evaluate their decision because it would mean that Groom would be without service at least one hour under the present circumstances.

SPS chose to locate a service manager in White Deer to service both Groom and White Deer. White Deer has previously been serviced out of Pampa, some twelve miles away.

The officials complimented SPS for their service and their lead in Economic Development of this area and expressed how this would economically hurt Groom.

Local citizens may wish to express their concerns individually, but the above officials felt they needed to persue this immediately.

I assume that you have all noticed that there are not nearly as many problems with animals running loose in the City. Mr. Colley has given a tremendous number of verbal and written warnings in an effort to help you without your being fined.

For five months, I feel that this is not a terribly large number of citations. Especially since Mr. Colley is giving an average of 15 warnings per week instead of citations. Also, if you as citizens would like for the Officer to drive a police vehicle and wear a uniform, please let your council know, It is up to them to provide these items.
