Groom Students Visit NASA Officials

Fifth-graders from Groom and around the Top of Texas area were able to find out first hand if a career in space science would be for them when the National Aeronautics Space Administration (NASA) came to Pampa on Wednesday, October 26.

Over 900 hundred students from 19 public school districts, converged on the M.K. Brown Civic Center for an entire day of presentations.

A group of NASA officials presented programs on Life in Space, Chronology of the Space Program, and Careers, Training and Working in Space.

NASA has previously made regional presentations in Dumas, Hereford, Spearman, Memphis and the Amarillo area.

Leading the students were representatives from NASA's Johnson Space Center in Houston, including Marc Horn, an adjunct assistant professor at Oklahoma State University and an education specialist for the space agency.

Horn has taught astronomy and science education and conducts numerous workshops on space for

space launches, and Jim McMurray, education specialist for the John C. Stennis Space Center in Mississippi.

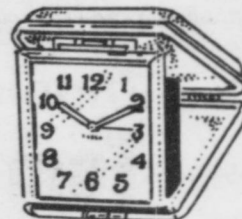

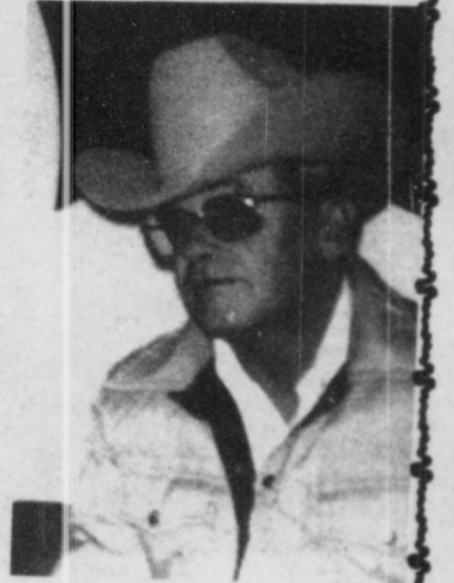

Dear Carson County Residents:



Last week I wrote about my qualifications for the office of Carson County Sheriff. This week I would like to outline my plans for the Sheriff's office, if elected.

As Sheriff my top priority will be to spend tax money as wisely as possible. This includes a planned, systematic upgrading of departmental equipment. I believe that it is important to maintain sound equipment to insure reliable service as well as to reduce county liability should an accident occur. I believe that the current budget will be sufficient for several years to come.

As Sheriff, I would place personell through out the county in a manner that would increase their availability and decrease response time to all parts of the area. These county employees will be responsible for responding to any life threatening situation that might arise in their area of the county. In addition they will also work a scheduled shift.

I would like to take more advantage of the low cost training that is available through the Panhandle Regional Law Enforcement Academy in Amarillo. I will require departmental personell to attend training that would decrease county liability.

If elected Sheriff I would maintain a small, highly regulated reserve deputy force. These reserves have proven themselves invaluable in some situations. They will be expected to assist with traffic control at accident or fire scenes, fill in for dispatchers, assist regular personell in the jail, and assist regular deputies on patrol. Only under extreme circumstances would these reserve deputies be required to patrol alone in county vehicles.

If you elect me as your Sheriff I promise to approach all phases of the job in a mature, common sense manner. I will go out of my way to cooperate with other county departments and other law enforcement agencies. I believe that my experience makes me the best qualified candidate for the job.

As you prepare to vote on November 8, please give me your full consideration.

the battle, will add much to the knowledge of the early Gray County history.

Stan Anthony presented to the large crowd a short story of what occurred at the Battle of McClellan Creek and what led to the event. "The battle occurred when a U.S. cavalry unit came across a group of Indians near the lake. The troops were on a mission to drive Indians out of the Panhandle to open up the area for buffalo hunting. The Indian, the day previous to the battle, had located two white girls who earlier had been kidnapped by another group of Indians in Kansas. The girls had been freed by that group and then had wandered alone in the Panhandle for five weeks. The cavalry unit was able to rescue the girls during the successful battle against the Indians", said Anthony.

"We've had a lot of help from a lot of different people" in researching the battle history and then locating the actual battle site, Wright said. Some 450 artifacts were located recently at the site, including bullets, shell casings, canister balls, nails, pieces of chains, primer bits, horseshoes and a knife.

The artifacts will be arranged for permanent display at the museum, Wright said.

Aiding Wright in the research and location were Stan and Margie Anthony of Groom.

Wright said Pampa author Kelly Ebel is currently going through the research, historical accounts, journals, government documents and other materials to prepare a book on the Black Kettle Battle. Wright said the book should be ready for publication this spring.

Wright said a microfilm viewer had been purchased to use microfilm material for the research and writing, the viewer also will be donated to the museum, he said.

The actual battle site area is currently on private property near the lake, Wright said. He said efforts are currently under way to gain permission to place a historical marker at the site.
