Tigers Open Against Groom Friday

McLean Tiger fans are expected to be out in full force Friday night at 7:30 at the high school football stadium to support their high acclaimed team. Last year was McLean's first year to play football under six-man rules, not unlike Groom, but McLean's season outcome was somewhat a different picture all together. McLean finished the season top of the District 2A six man standings, only to have their playoff hopes dashed by the flip of a coin in a tie-breaker.

"I think we can make a run at the title," said Coach Jerry Miller, who is entering his second season at McLean after leading the Tigers in their initial six man campaign. "As a team, we're ahead of where we were at this time last year. They reported in better shape, and they know more or less what I want this season."

It's a pretty good guess that what Miller wants is the playoff berth that eluded

McLean last year, and with the return of six starters and 12 lettermen, he's likely to get it.

Tigers return 4 full-time starters, including three all-district selections.

Four year starter Tres Hess, a 5-10, 160 pounder with 4.6 speed, took first team all-district honors as a junior after leading McLean in tackles from his line-backer slot. Offensively, he rushed for 631 yards and was a second team selection at running back.

Two other all-district performers will join Hess in tormenting opposing offenses. Junior Dennis Hill (6-3, 184) returns to his spot on the defensive line, where he garnered first team honors in 1988, alongside sophomore Caesar Looney (5-11, 198), who was an honorable mention selection on defense as a freshman.

McLean's three remaining seniors round out the defensive unit. Robert Sanderson, a 5-6, 145 pound fireplug,



will continue his reign at middle linebacker, rubbing elbows with outside linebacker Todd Stump (6-2, 158) and safety Donald Harris (5-9, 140).

The starting offense is practically a mirror image of the defense. Sanderson will give way to center J.T. Haynes (5-9, 145) when the Tigers take possession; the

other five starters are expected to pull double duty. Harris, who gained varsity experience as the signal caller last year, is penciled in as the No. 1 quarterback.

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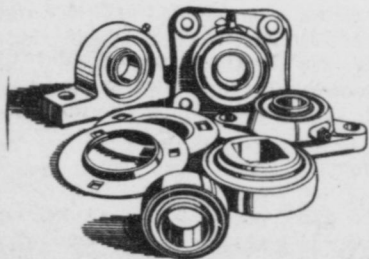

New drug to treat prostate cancer—flutamide—has received FDA approval. It blocks the sex hormone, testosterone, from boosting the growth of cancer cells.

Up to now, only the cornea and the sclera have been used in eye transplants. Now scientists at Columbia Presbyterian have transplanted retinal tissue in mice, and think it will work soon in humans, too.

If parents have elevated cholesterol levels, youngsters over age two should be tested, too, the American Academy of Pediatrics says. The children's risk is high, and diet should be watched early.

Healthful snacks—made with sugar substitutes so they're less likely to cause cavities—earn special labeling in Switzerland. The American Academy of Pediatric Dentistry is considering a seal here.

Even marginal deficiencies in zinc slowed the growth of rhesus monkeys in a University of California/Davis study. Both immunity and learning ability were affected, too.

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Rumor Renews Interest In CRP

A rumor of no more Conservation Reserve Program sign-ups sparked a renewed interest in the program during the ninth sign-up which ended in mid-August, Soil Conservation Service officials said.

The Texas Panhandle had 336 bids on 81,169 acres that are likely to be accepted if the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service takes a bid of \$40.00 and under, said David Webster, SCS agronomist in Amarillo.

The final figures have not been confirmed in Washington, the state ASCS office reported. Also, state ASCS officials said there was no word as of yet on whether there would be another CRP sign-up.

Webster said the \$40.00 bid has been the cut off point in past sign-ups. He said in counties where the 25 percent limit will be reached a lower dollar figure might be accepted or the county ASCA committee can petition the state to have a larger amount of acreage accepted.

Under the CRP program,

farmers enrolling qualified land must keep the land out of production for at least 10 years and must plant a cover of grass or trees. During this period, they will receive an annual "rental" payment from the government plus half the cost of establishing the ground cover.

Large numbers were seen this sign-up by producers in Ochiltree, Wheeler and Randall counties. Ochiltree submitted 41 bids for 11,457 acres that will fall at or below the \$40 mark. Wheeler County had 42 contracts submitted on 5,958 acres and Randall County submitted 40 contracts on 9,458 acres.

Deaf Smith County had fewer contracts submitted, but for a larger amount of acreage. There were 31 contracts on 9,554 acres that fell at or below the \$40 mark, Webster said.

Other counties and the acreage bid include Dallam, 1,890; Sherman, 6,100; Hansford, 7,924; Hartley, 6,090; Moore, 3,998; Hutchinson, 456; Hemphill, 5,611; Oldham, 1,663; Potter, 2,107; Carson, 5,100 and

Gray, 3,864.

Six counties had previously filled their 25 percent of cropland allowed under the CRP program, including Lipscomb, Roberts, Oldham, Armstrong, Donley and Collingsworth.

Webster said a single bid was taken in Oldham County this sign-up because a majority of the land was in Deaf Smith County, but the man's base was in Oldham County.

Dallam and Wheeler counties received enough bids this sign-up to put them over the 25 percent limitation. Hemphill County lacks about 200 to 300 acres filling up and Deaf Smith County needs about 2,000 more after the ninth sign-up to meet the limit, Webster said.

Webster reported that 3,499 of the 3,662 contracts signed prior to the latest period have been seeded, planting 949,027 acres to grass in the northernmost 20 counties of the Texas Panhandle.

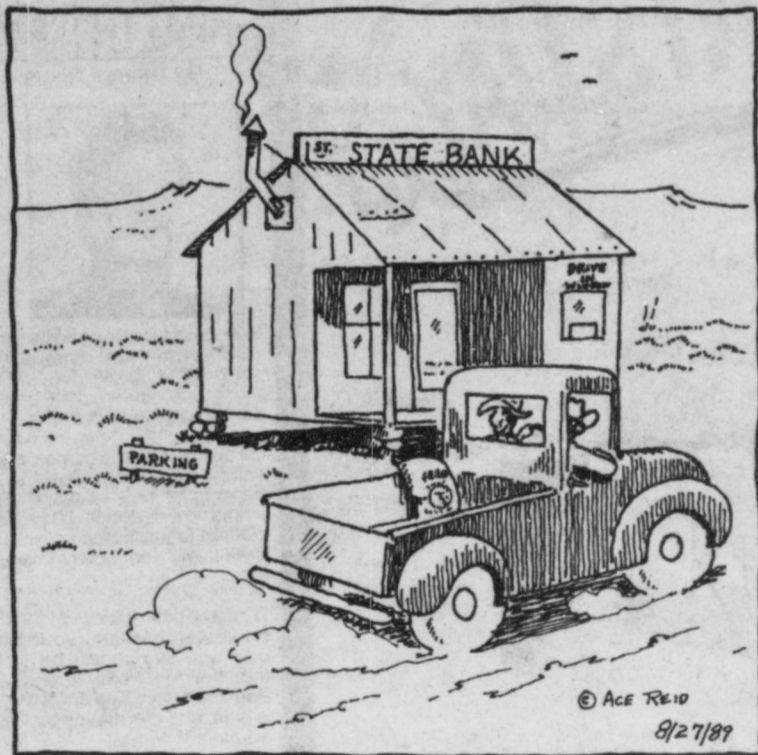

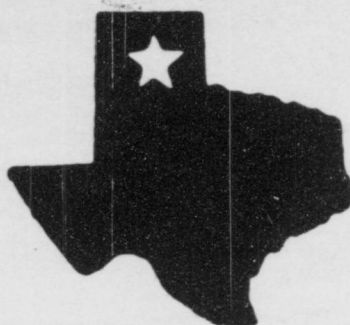

Demand Full Service

Beginning September 1, service stations that offer full-service refueling must pump gasoline and diesel for disabled drivers, upon request, at the self-service price. Stations that have only self-service pumps are not affected by the new law, passed during this year's regular legislative session.

To receive refueling service at the self-service price, a driver must display a disabled persons insignia, validation sticker, identification card or license plates

issued by the highways department.

The new law allows Class C misdemeanor charges to be filed against station manager who does not establish a policy providing refueling service for the disabled driver. Similar charges can be filed against an individual employee who is acting against station policy and refuses to provide this service when requested.

The law will be enforced by the attorney general or a local prosecuting attorney.

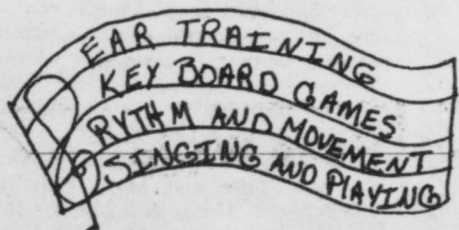

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Letter To Citizens

In 1989, the Texas Six Man Coaches Association sponsored four regional invitational meets and a state invitation meet at Comanche. These meets were met by a great deal of enthusiasm by the athletes, coaches and fans. The meets gave the students in our small schools an opportunity to participate against schools their own size.

These meets will not be able to be held in the same time frame, if the U.I.L. policy committee acts on the

recommendation of the athletic committee. This recommendation by the athletic committee was based on information provided by individuals who believed that the track meets were a hinderance to the U.I.L. literary participation.

In 1988, there was a conflict with some of the schools who has UIL literary regional meets in Abilene. To our knowledge. These were the only schools with a conflict. These school's athletes who had a conflict with U.I.L. literary were allowed to submit their performances from their UIL District meets for

qualification to the state invitational meet. The Texas Six Man Coaches Association is in total support of U.I.L. literary participation and has passed a resolution stating this and feels that the students in our schools can participate in both activities.

The Texas Six Man Coaches Association feels that there are several alternatives which could remedy conflicts, rather than force the meets to be held on the first or second weeks of track competition for some schools.

The Texas Six Man Coaches Association is asking for your help and support to

convince the U.I.L. Council to allow the six man schools to continue to pursue these meets for our athletes. The U.I.L. Council meets October 14, 1989 and if we receive enough signatures of support, we hope to convince the council to turn down the athletic committee's recommendation, which we feel was reached in error.

If you can support the continuance of these meets, please take the time and sign a list of support which Gary Britten of your community has. This is a matter which is of great importance to the student athlete in the small school.

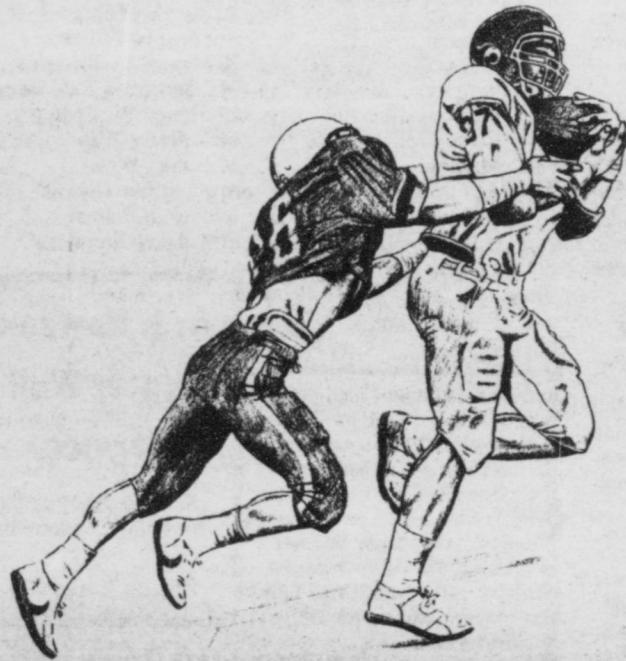
