Audit Shows City In Good Shape

In a regular meeting of the Groom City Council, David Cory, CPA presented the 1986-87 audit to the City Council, and stated the city was in good financial condition except the water works showed a loss. Jerry Thornton moved to accept the audit and Ronny Fields seconded.

The Budget for 1988-89 was reviewed. All salaries for two water works employees will be drawn on the waterworks fund. Ronny Fields moved to increase the water rate charge twenty five cents from 1.00 to 1.25 after the first two thousand gallons. Thornton seconded.

Jimmy Britten moved to adopt the budget. Ronny Fields seconded the motion and all members voted ayes.

Ronny Fields moved to order tax rate for 1989 set a fifty cents per \$100.00 valuation general fund, and ten cents interest and sinking fund. Total of sixty cents per \$100 valuation. Jerry Thornton seconded the motion and passed with all ayes.

Jimmy Britten moved to table fencing until an estimate could be received from a local contractor.

Jimmy Britten moved to adopt an update service credit retirement ordinance. Jerry Thornton seconded the motion and passed with all ayes.

Travis Homer, Rocky Crump Not Seriously Injured In Accident

Groom youths were spared serious injury, both walking away from an early morning accident Sunday, leaving their vehicle totaled and upside down. The late model Mazda Sports Coupe rolled two and a half times before coming to rest in the creek bed 60 feet below the bridge east of Groom on FM 2300.

Groom Ambulance was called to the scene.

Travis Homer walked to the residence of Leonard Koetting for help arriving about 2:00 a.m. Rocky Crump was brought to town by Troy Treadwell. Both Homer and Crump were transported to Northwest Texas Hospital by the Groom Ambulance. Homer was transferred to St.

Anthony's for surgery on a compound fracture to his foot. Crump was treated for lacerations and burns from battery acid and released.

DPS officer Gary Davis investigated the accident and stated "The vehicle left the roadway on the left side and swerving to correct, hit the east end of the bridge guard rail and left the embankment rolling over two and a half times before

coming to rest." He estimated the vehicle was traveling at 75 mph at the time of the accident. Neither occupant was wearing a seat belt." Crump was driving at the time of the accident which remains under investigation.

Davis worked two other

wrecks Sunday, the first at 1:10 a.m. four and a half miles east of Goodnight on US 287. A juvenile was issued a ticket for speeding, failure to drive in a single lane. The pair in the car abandoned the vehicle and spent the night in Claude.

The driver, possessing an instructional permit, ran off the road crossed the center median sliding broadside across the highway and rolling over once on the north side. No injuries were reported.

The third accident occurred Sunday at 4:30 a.m. when a female driver lost control of a U-Haul trailer she was towing causing it to overturn and block one lane of eastbound traffic on I-40. She was not injured.

Appraisal Board Approves Budget

Members of the Carson County Appraisal District board met last Wednesday in Panhandle to accept the 1989 budget. The \$197,635.00 budget total is a 4 percent decrease from a

year ago.

The district, established in 1983, began with an operating budget of \$157,030. The next year the budget was increased 16 percent and the following

year 14.9 percent with a budget of \$211,187.00. A slight increase of 1.5 percent funded the district in 1986 and the past three years the budget has been reduced

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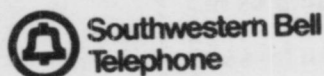
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School Board Sets Tax Rate At .98

The Board of Trustees of Groom Independent School District met in regular session on August 9, 1988 at the school administration offices at 8:00 p.m.

The following members were present: Howard Britten, Dennis Babcock, Don Lyles, C.D. Fields, Janice Weinheimer, and Gary Friemel. Absent was Bill England.

Also attending were Rex Peeples, Kenneth Sweatt, Joyce Hutsell, Jack Coiner and Mack Dill of Borger-Asbestos Maintenance Service, and Coaches James Branch, Jay Lamb, and Tim Gilliland.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved with the following clarification: following the motion made by Mr. Babcock and seconded by Mr. Fields on July 12, to amend the dress code, the sentence: "The motion carried" should be deleted and the following stated: The motion prevailed by the following vote: Voting aye: Howard Britten, Dennis Babcock, Don Lyles, C.D. Fields, Bill England, Janice Weinheimer, and Gary Friemel; Voting Nay: none and abstaining: none.

Kenneth Sweatt, designated asbestos person

for the district, and Jack Coiner and Mack Dill conducted a question-and-answer session with the board, discussing possible asbestos problems and possible alternatives and costs in the control of any problems. Mr. Babcock moved and Mr. Friemel seconded to authorize the employment of Martin Dies and Bracewell and Patterson through the approval of the agreement. The board also

voted to send to the firm of Martin Dies an initial deposit amounting to .08 per square foot of estimated asbestos area, or \$344.00. The motion carried.

Athletic Director Jim Branch, accompanied by Coaches Lamb and Gilliland, reviewed the prospects for the athletic program for the coming year. He also outlined his program for the training of athletes in the dangers of drug, alcohol, and tobacco use.

Mr. Fields moved and Mr. Lyles seconded to appoint Steve Hutsell district Math chairman, to coordinate math programs in Grades K-12. The motion carried.

Mr. Babcock moved and Mr. Fields seconded to employ Jim Burton as maintenance supervisor at a

salary of \$19,000.00 per year plus individual hospitalization. The motion carried.

Mrs. Weinheimer moved and Mr. Babcock seconded to set the rates for the 1988-89 child nutrition meals as follows: Student K-6 - breakfast-.50, lunch-1.00, students 7-12-breakfast-.50, lunch-1.10, reduced price student K-12-breakfast-.30, lunch-.40, extra milk-.20. The motion carried.

The board approved the employment of the firm of Billy M. Baker, C.P.A., Borger, Texas, to conduct the independent audit of the districts 1987-1988 records.

Mr. Babcock moved and Mr. Friemel seconded to grant Superintendent Peeples authority to consult with the City of Groom and the County of Carson concerning the property (three lots on Collier Street) owned by the entities and to initiate proceedings for the disposition of the lots. The motion carried.

The board approved to purchase milk products for the 1988-1989 food service department from Plains Creamery; and there being no bids received for the purchase of gasoline products, to authorize Superintendent Peeples to negotiate for the best possible price at the time delivery is required. The motion carried.

Mr. Fields moved and Mr. Lyles seconded to adopt a Maintenance and Operation Budget in the amount of \$1,103,656; and the final bonded indebtedness of the district having been paid in January, 1988, with a balance currently owing to

the General Fund on that final payment amounting to \$3,428.00 to be paid from future collections of delinquent taxes to the Interest and Sinking Fund for payment to the General Fund. The motion carried.

Church Helps Russian Christians Celebrate 1,000th Anniversary

Readers who take an interest in international matters may know that this year marks the 1,000th anniversary of the coming of Christianity to Russia. Despite 71 years of rule from an anti-religious government, the faith continues to thrive in what is now the Soviet Union. In fact, it is estimated that as many as 70 million people, or 25% of the population, still adhere to the Christian faith. Those numbers include 50 million members of the Russian Orthodox Church, 10 million Roman Catholics, 4 million Protestants, mainly Baptists and Pentecostals, and 6 million other believers of various denominations.

Although repression still exists, the Communist government has relaxed some of its restrictive measures and is allowing various celebrations this year to mark the anniversary. The faith arrived in Russia in 988 A.D. when Prince Vladimir of Rus converted and ordered his subjects to do likewise.

To help Soviet Christians celebrate, Suzanne Nagel, a member of New York's Trinity Episcopal Church, came up with an idea whereby America's Christian children would send "Birthday cards" to Russian Christian children congratulating them during this special year. She called her cam-

paign "The Crayon Brigade."

Nagel presented her idea to Kathy Todd, coordinator of the National Council of Churches Ecumenical Travel Seminar Program, who was planning a program that would take as many as 1,000 Americans to the Soviet Union at various times during the year to help in the celebration. Todd liked Nagel's idea and agreed that some of the groups would hand-deliver the birthday cards. However, the idea was expanded to include not only children, but also American adults who would make and send greeting cards to their Russian counterparts.

In 1986, the Council of Bishops of the Methodist Church published a document in which they pointed out that the Methodists have a "basic faith in common with the Christian community that, in spite of communist restrictions, still exists in the Soviet Union." They also urged Methodists everywhere "to pray regularly for our Christian sisters and brothers in the Soviet Union, to study Russian religious life and thought, and to support ecumenical exchanges with Soviet churches."

Several weeks ago, Reverend Mark Wilson, of the McLean United Methodist Church, told his congrega-

tion of the bishops' request and encouraged church members to take part in the birthday card campaign as a means of fulfilling that request. Church School Superintendent Bob Black was asked to serve as coordinator for the project. As a result, a guidesheet was prepared explaining the program and offering suggestions for the preparation of the cards. Many Sunday school classes were invited to set aside time specifically for the purpose of working on the cards. Other members of the congregation at large were invited to work on the cards at their convenience. Many exercised their creative talents, taking cards home and working on them during leisure hours. Cards were handpainted, drawn, knitted and decorated with pictures of church members, representations of the state of Texas, and in at least one instance, a member wrote a song and included it in his card. Some of the greetings were even written in the Russian language. Church member Molly McDowell was responsible for researching Russian phrases appropriate for use in the cards.

For those who were unable to make their own, local artist Cherine Beaver designed a standard card which people could sign

DPS Investigates Two Accidents

According to DPS Officer John Holland, two accidents have occurred in the McLean area since Friday. The first happened Friday night about 10 miles west of Alanreed. Voters Approve Annexation To Conservation District

As of Monday night, when the votes were canvassed, all of Gray County is now officially part of the Panhandle Water Conservation District No. 3. Although the election was actually conducted on Saturday, the results were not official until they were approved by the district's Board of Directors on Monday. Two elections were held Saturday, one asking residents of the southeastern portion of Gray County, including McLean and Alanreed, whether or not they wanted to become part of the district and the second asking current members of the district whether or not they approved of the annexation. In both elections, the votes was unanimous in favor of annexation.

District Manager Gary Walker was very pleased with the outcome. "We are here to serve people and help them with their water problems, and we welcome the southeastern portion of Gray County into our district."

Walker's organization can offer many benefits to local residents, especially those living in the rural areas. "If someone has a concern about the quality of their well water on their farm, for example," he said, "we can come out and test it for nitrates, sulphates, ammonia, iron, flourides, alkalinity, hardness, PH and specific conductance which measures the amount of electricity the water will carry and is an indication of how many total dissolved solids are in the water." This service is free to district members.

Walker can also conduct bacteria sampling programs to help a water owner determine whether or not his or her water contains any harmful bacteria. This is especially useful to persons who have open wells where bacteria can easily get into the water supply.

"These services," Walker said, "will probably apply more to rural residents than

to city dwellers because by law, Texas cities must check their water twice a month so there really is no need for us to check it. We are mostly concerned with rural water."

Water owners can call the district office in White Deer and request that their water be tested. "However," Walker said, "for everyone's convenience, we will try to arrange to come to McLean at specific intervals and everyone who wants their water to be tested can contact me on that day. The days and times when I plan to be in your area will be well publicized so people will know how to get in touch with me."

Area residents will be pleased to learn that there are other benefits to joining the district. "Periodically," Walker said, "I come out and measure the water level in about 30-40 state owned water wells in the district. This allows me to determine whether or not levels are rising or declining and I, in turn, can let local district members know the status of their water supply."

If a farmer or rancher's water does become depleted, the district can provide instructions on how to take advantage of a depletion allowance on fed

Now that McLean and Alanreed are part of the district, the area will be under the direction of the district's Board of Directors. They are: President-John Spearman, who lives near Pampa; Vice-president-Bill Parvins, who lives near Panhandle; Secretary-Raymond Blodgett of White Deer; G.M. Walls of Pampa; and Frank Sims, who lives east of Panhandle. All are farmers and ranchers.

The board is required to meet at least quarterly but usually meets more often than that. The next session will probably be in October. At that time, the board will probably decide which members or members will represent the McLean and Alanreed areas.

Reverend Wilson then asked those present to each silently offer a prayer for the project and as they did so, guest Laura Barrett of Waco played the piano and sang a composition by Bill Stubbs entitled "A Song For the World." Mrs. Barrett is the sister of Mrs. Bill Stubbs.

The congregation was then invited to view the cards which had been arranged at the front of the sanctuary for display.

It is the hope of the church that the greeting cards will be one way to build friendship between the United States and the Soviet Union, thereby establishing a peaceful relationship and eliminating many of the problems which plague the relations between the two nations for many years, particularly the nightmare of a potential nuclear holocaust. It is also hoped that this gesture will be a sign to Soviet Christians that they are part of an international community which remembers them as members of the body of Christ.

In conjunction with the project, Reverend Wilson sent a letter, which will be taken by one of the travel groups, requesting that a "sister church" in the Soviet Union be assigned to communicate and interact with the McLean church on an on-going basis. Whether or not this will occur will not be known for some time, but at least many McLean Christians will know that they

have played a role in helping the Russians celebrate this important occasion and, hopefully, bringing the two nations a little closer together.

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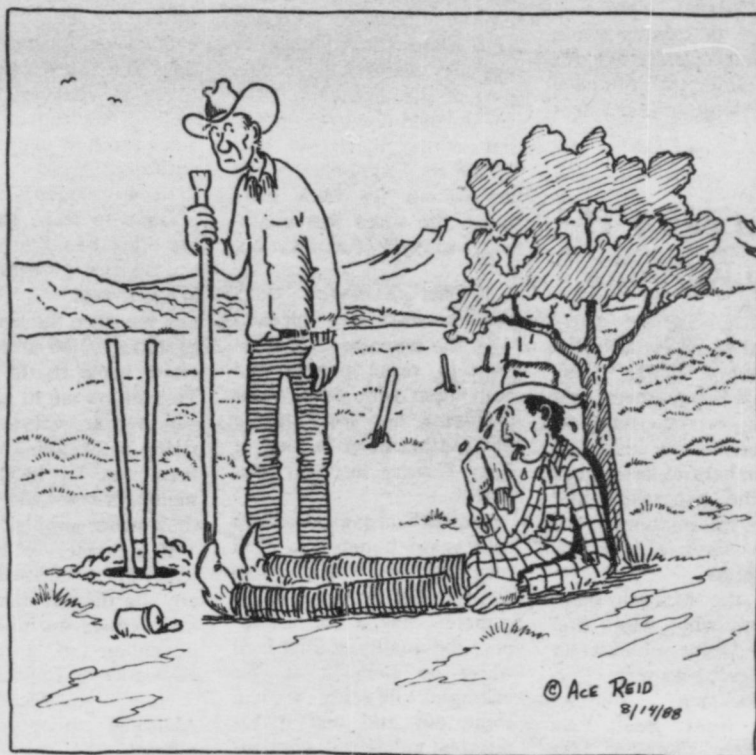

McLean Sales Tax Still Down

The State Comptroller's Office said recently that payments to cities and counties that collect local sales tax increased again this month. Checks totaling \$113.5 million were sent to 1,043 cities that collect local sales tax at either one or one and one-half percent.

For the second month in a row, the check sent to the City of McLean decreased compared to the check sent during the same reporting period in 1987. This month's check was \$2,093.66 compared to \$2,269.47 for the same period last year, a decline of 7.75 percent.

However, year-to-date payments to McLean stand at \$13,525.09, compared to year-to-date payments in 1987 of \$12,435.53, an increase of 8.76 percent.

County-wide, the total amount refunded to taxing entities during this reporting period came to \$148,399.25 compared to \$130,013.93 for the same period last year, an increase of 14.14 percent. Year-to-date county-wide payments came to \$903,272.36 compared to \$814,829.90 for last year, an increase of 10.85 percent.

August checks represent taxes collected by monthly and quarterly filers in June and reported to the Comptroller's Office by July 20.

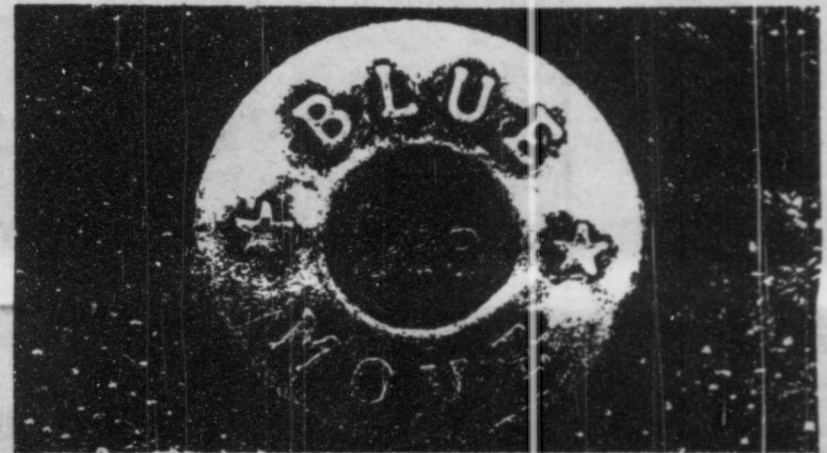

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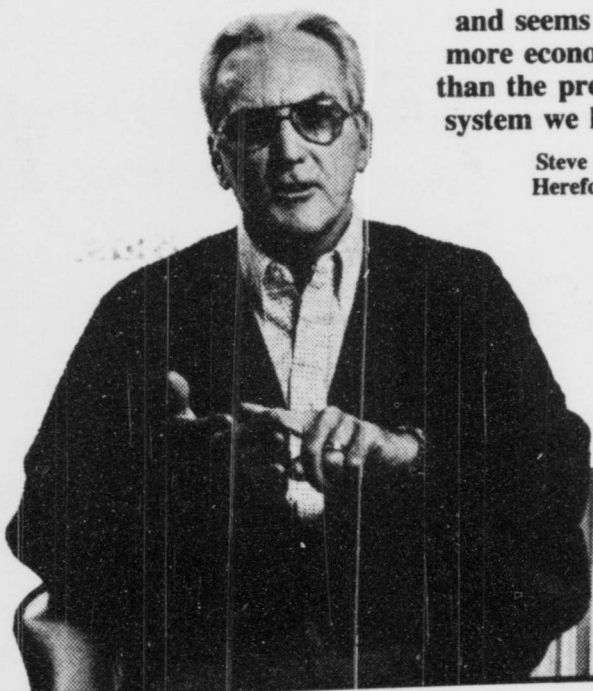
