He then left the country for a two-week vacation trip without arranging for another physician to care for the patient. As a result, she suffered partial paralyss of



Convention Of Christian Churches **Met In Austin**

"When nationalism becomes a part of our concept of the church, then it endangers the universal nature of the church."

This belief was expressed in Austin recenty at the closing session of the Austin regional assembly of the International Convention of Christian Churches (Disciples of Christ) by Dr. Robert G. Nelson of Indianapolis, Ind., executive secretary of the Department of Africa and Jamaica of the United Christian Missionary Society.

"It is not the church in Congo, or Mexico or Nepal about which we are first of all concerned," Dr. Nelson told several hundred assembled delegates. "It is the Church of Jesus Christ in the world. The church In Okinawa is us, if we are truly part of the body of Christ."

The former missionary to Jamica said it is inevitable that the church will relate itself to certain cultural facets of its own heritage and pointed out that nationalism "is not synonymous with indigenization as we look at the church's total mis-

Dr. Nelson explained that the word indigenous means that a church is related to its own environment.

"The end objective of mission is not the planting and nurturing of churches to bring them to self support and self government, but to bring the saving power of God into the lives of men," he said.


