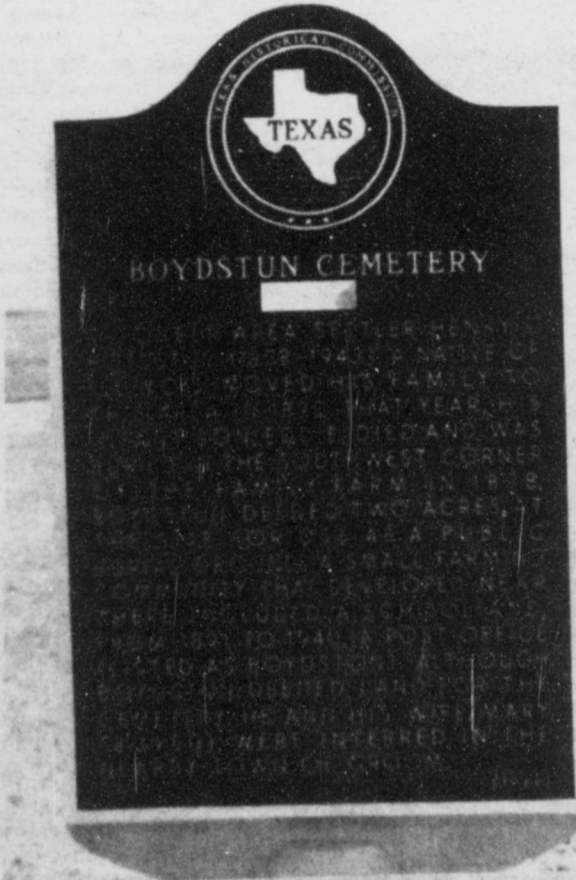
Historical Marker Dedicated

A crowd of approximately eighty people were in attendance for the unveiling ceremony held Sunday, April 16, at 1:00 p.m. at the historical marker site.

Speakers included; Roy Kiser - master of ceremonies Judge Billie Cristol of Donley County and Dr. Zell Sorelle - Chairman of the Donley County, Texas Historical Commission.

Bethel Robinson unveiled the historical marker, recently placed on HWY 70, near Old Jericho. The marker was placed in memory of "Mr. and Mrs. Henry Boydston" who in the year of 1889 settled on their homestead and the Boydston Community in time followed.

Marlys Melton representing the great grandchildren of the Boydston's placed honorary wreaths in the cemetery. In 1890 the Boydston couple were saddened by the loss of an infant son, with the help of three sympathetic cowboys, Mr. and Mrs. Boydston buried the infant in the southwest corner of his farm. Later he deeded two



acres to Donley County for cemetery purposes. It became a community burial ground.

Prior to the services several family members gathered

for lunch in the fellowship hall at the Groom Church of Christ.

Concluding the events was a reception at the Groom Community Center.

has researched and studied the effects of media on youth and adults for many years. She also works with the Southwest Regional Center for Drug Free School and Communities at the University of Oklahoma.

Ms. Soice will discuss media pressures, influences, and techniques in advertising for alcohol, tobacco, and drugs. She will share how to decipher the conflicting messages of advertisements so that we can take responsibility for what we are seeing and learning from media and advertising. And, she will discuss how to teach children to decipher these messages.

All members of the Groom Community and the surrounding communities are invited to attend this free program. The program is

Groom School Athletic Budget Cut By 8%

School department budgets were the primary focus of attention at last week's regular monthly meeting of the Groom School Board as teachers, parents and students turned out to show support for their particular department as the knives were sharp and ready to cut.

The athletic and band department's budget both received an approximate eight percent cut by the board. The athletic department's budget was under the eye of board members as the new budget was cut to \$19,000.00. Last year's athletic budget totaled \$21,700.00. Board members explicitly deleted the \$500.00 request for coaches' clothing.

The large show of public support at the meeting was from band students and parents concerned with the band program. Approximately 40 plus students have pre-registered for band next fall. The show of support evidently helped the band program as Director Steve Thomas received his salary increment increase of \$3,000.00, amending the 1989-90 contracted salary from \$18,680.00 to \$21,680.00. Thomas will operate the band from a budget totaling \$7,860.00.

Other department budgets being set included science at \$3200.00 and journalism at \$2,400.00. The Library budget of \$15,467.00 will remain the same as last years.

President Howard Britten called the meeting into executive session at 9:20 p.m. and reconvened in open session at 11:20 p.m. The board approved the employment of Julie Friemel at the salary of \$6,790.00, Frances Payton at \$8,120.00, Ellie Peeples at \$8,360.00, Susan Sweatt at \$8,530.00. All of the above are Assistant I employees and their salaries were set in accordance with the pay schedule adopted April 12, 1988 for a 183-day school year. Educational Assistant III's include; Juanita Brown at \$10,300 and Nila Burgin at \$7,640.00 See School Board, Page 12.

Food personnel were offered employment at the following salaries for a 175-day school year; Nancy Patterson, Manager, \$7,533.75 (equivalent to seven hours daily at \$6.15 hourly); Betty Rae Brown, Cook, \$5,744.38 (equivalent to 6.5 hours daily at \$5.05 hourly); Laveda Wood, cook, \$5,573.38 (equivalent to 6.5 hours daily at \$4.90 hourly.)

The board voted to continue to operate summer programs for remedial reading and mathematics.

Grandview - Hopkins I.S.D. transfer students; Susan Babcock, Karen Babcock, Stanley Seth Ritter and Renee Anthony were accepted. Sharolyn Chandler was

accepted as a transfer student from Alanreed.

The school district having advertised for sale a parcel of land being one and one-half city lots south of the school district property at 111 Ware Street, and the sole sealed bid received being from the First Baptist Church of Groom in the amount of \$1,500.00. The bid was accepted.

The board voted to discontinue retainer fees to the school attorney and to avail the district of the Texas Association of School Board's legal department in matters of advice. The only nay vote was from Board member Dennis Babcock.

The Groom Tigerettes suffered a setback when five-event threat Karen Bohr suffered a thigh injury. She won the 100, then fell to the track in pain with a stretched muscle.

"I either stretched it too far or got a cramp or something," Bohr said after the race. "I hope it's not over for the day. I've still got to run the 200."

As it turns out, it was over although she had already won the 100 and the long jump and placed second in the triple jump.

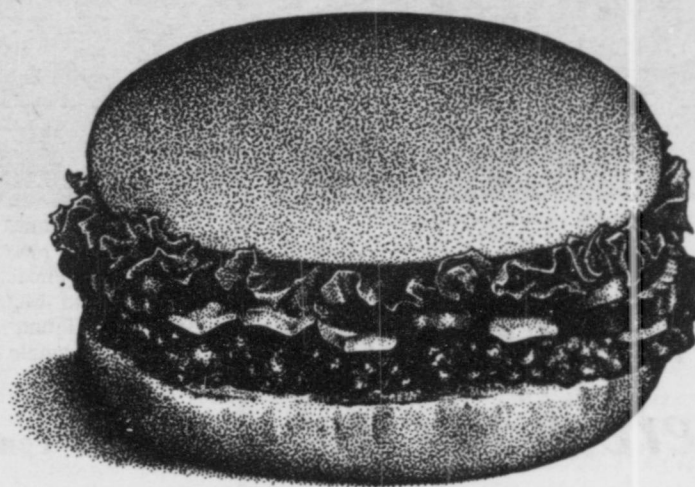

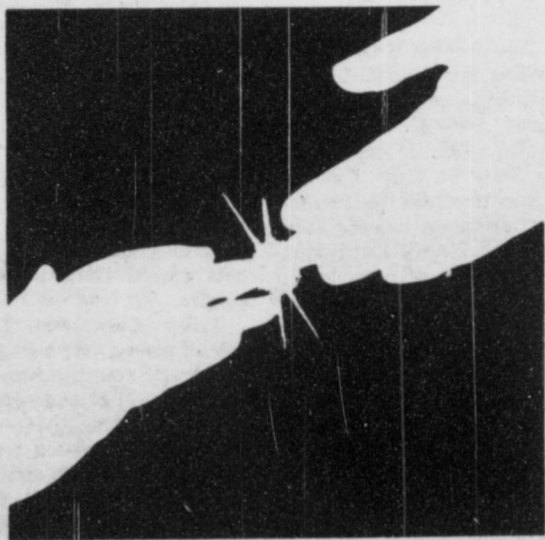

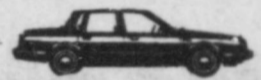

State Comptroller Bob Bullock recently reported that statewide sales tax rebates for the first four months of 1989 are up 13.4 percent over last year's tax allocations for the same period.

"The economy is in good shape, which is being reflected in our state and local sales tax collections," Bullock said.

Gray County received a net payment this period of \$85,612.62, of that amount Lefors received \$637.47, McLean \$1,345.63 and Pampa \$83,629.52.

McLean's economy shows a rise of 6.60 percent. Last year at this time a payment of \$1,262.34 was made. In 1989 check to date totaled \$6,868.81 and checks total \$6,871.83 thus far this year. These totals of the year show a decrease in funds by .04 percent.
