DPS Predicts 34 To Die On Highways

The traffic death count for the Labor Day weekend could go as high as 34 persons, the Department of Public Safety has estimated.

"This may scare you, but you need to know that as many as 34 people could die in traffic accidents in Texas this Labor Day weekend," DPS Director Col. Joe Milner said.

In 1988, 30 persons died in traffic accidents during the 78-hour Labor Day period. Two critically-injured persons died later, for a total of 32 fatalities. This year's Labor Day period also is 78 hours, beginning at 6 p.m. Friday, September 1 and continuing through mid-night, Monday, September

"The Department of Public Safety will be doing everything it can to ensure you have a safe holiday, but we need your help," Col. Milner said. "Please, don't drink and drive, stay within

the speed limit, and wear your safety belt."

Last year 21 persons died in DWI or speed-related accidents during the Labor Day period. That amounts to 66 percent of all the deaths. Also last year, of the 23 persons killed as occupants of cars, trucks or buses, 18--or 78 percent--had not been wearing safety belts.

"We believe saftey awareness does make a difference," Col. Milner said. "So far, no traffic fatality has been reported anywhere in Texas for June 13. If this holds up, it will be the first time since 1977 we have had a day with no traffic deaths in Texas. Let's make it happen again this Labor

During the Labor Day period, all available DPS Troopers will be patrolling the state's roadways. Periodic reports on the number of traffic fatalities will be issued to remind motorists of the need for safe driving.

State law permits the Commissioner' Court to raise taxes without publishing public notices to the effect as long as the effective tax rate is not raised over 1.03 percent. The 1990 proposal was held below that

and he did not feel they supported the increase. When Britten was asked the same question he stated he agreed with Lockridge.

Following the public hear-ing Commissioners' Court approved a five percent salary increase for all elected officials, except commissioners which remained the same as first proposed.

The county tax rate was set at .103 above the effective rate of 1989. The figures break down to .2174-General Fund, .0336-Lateral Raod Fund, .0507-Special Road Fund and a total of .3017.

The court was notified that the amount to purchase without a bid has been changed from \$5,000. to \$15,000.00. The purchase must be of public record.

Approval was voiced con-

cerning the installation of a communication line for Precinct 4, east of White Deer. A used belly dump trailer was approved for purchase for Precinct 1.

A discussion was held concerning the sharing of equipment between precincts.

Commissioner Smith reported the completion of four miles of road rebuilding in Precinct 2, with the addition of a waterway to drain the road rightaway.

Judge Roselius informed the Court that the water district did not want to inspect the private sewer disposals in rural areas. The inspection will have to revert back to the state, which could result in higher inspection rates for residents.

The court will select two members to serve on the app aisal board at their September 11 meeting.



"I like the small communities, the farming communities." Steele said he was not looking for a job when approached by officials from Grandview-Hopkins, but that the people and the atmosphere of the tiny community were too much to

"This job had the criteria I wanted," Steele explained.
"They are the type of people I've always been around. The facilities out there are nice and the quietness is nice. I'm ready to sit back and take advantage of the knowledge I have and put it into effect out there.

Steele said working with only elementary aged children is easy for him, since they are roughly the same age as his grandchildren.

'We have a family of five and all of them are educators, he said. Not all of them are necessarily teaching right now but they have degrees in education. I hear and see what they need in their own kids and I can remember what we needed from our kids."

"We had a faculty meeting and what I told my teachers is that we have a lot of responsibility in the guidelines of these kids. The parents are working or busy. We know the teacher has them a lot more over nine months than the parents do.

One little girl tried to give me all her little silver rings, I wouldn't take them and she began to cry, so I took one which I wear now.

We were amazed by the fact they knew the concept of peace between the nations and they were only 8 to 9 years old.

While in Warsaw, the American tourist were able to see President George Bush speech to the Poles. They also got to meet Dan Rather.

We boarded a train for Russia from Warsau in the evening, it was dark as we crossed the Soviet border. It was cold and misty, the train stopped and we had to get out then we noticed the barbed wire fence with the combed sand. It was combed so fine you couldn't see any footprints in it. There was also a pit underneath the

track. There was a Soviet soldier standing in the pit with a machine gun on his hip, he looked to see of anyone was riding underneath the train.
