McLean Hosts Harrold For Homecoming

McLean Tigers Football team is beginning to make its name known statewide in six-man play.

This past week The Globe News selected McLean Tigers as the team of the week.

A year ago, when the Tigers won their 1988 season opener, they broke a 40 game losing streak. Two weeks ago the Tigers traveled to Afton and took on seventh rank Rule, they were out to prove that last year's season wasn't a fluke. McLean won 52-32, keeping their record 2-0 after starting their winning season against Groom.

Friday night the Tigers traveled to Miami and breezed through the game for a final victory of 48-12.

Both teams were 2-0 going into the game.

Tre Hess led the Tigers with 146 yards on 14 carries and scored twice. Hess also completed a 29 yard scoring pass to Dennis Hill.

McLean held a 26-6 half-time advantage.

McLean collected 439 yards in total offense while holding Miami to 193.

The Tigers had 18 first downs compared to seven for the Warriors.

Coach Miller commended player Tuffy Sanders for his exceptional playing and his numerous tackles.

Harold will travel to McLean for the 7:30 Homecoming game this Friday night.

Due to upsets in six-man football action changes occurred in the lower half of the state ranking published by Lubbock Avalanche Journal.

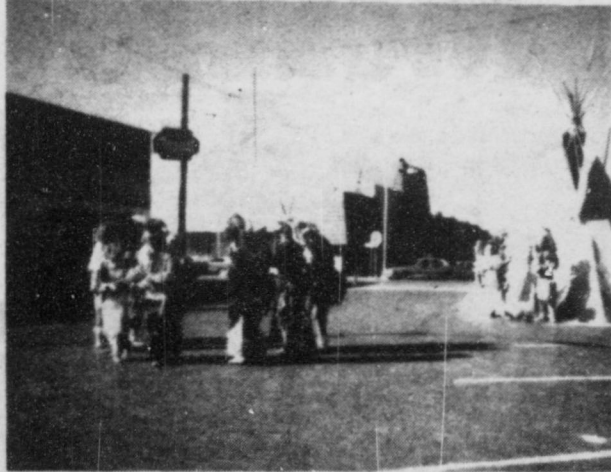

SPINAL SCREENING SCHEDULE

[Grades 5, 6, 7, 8, 9]

The Legislature passed a law in 1985 that required all sixth and ninth grade students to be screened for spinal deformities. Early detection of abnormal spinal curvature can prevent serious health problems. This is a problem that may begin during the early adolescents years (from 10-14 years of age), with an estimated 1 in 10 adolescents have some degree of abnormal curvature. Curves that are detected early may only require periodic observation by a specialist. Moderate curves may require the wearing of a brace, which is usually supervised by an orthopedic specialist. In most cases, the need for major surgery for this deformity can be eliminated through early detection. Students who have a rapid period of growth after ninth grade can be referred by parents to the school nurse. Spinal screening for McLean ISD school children has been scheduled for October 8, 1989.

Children will be screened for two types of spinal deformities: Scoliosis and Kyphosis. Scoliosis is a condition in which the spine is twisted, causing misalignment of the upper body, as well as complications of the heart and lungs. Kyphosis is a type of spinal deformity in which the upper spine shows a pronounced curve. The condition is also referred to as "round back" and can be corrected if detected early. This year we will check all students in 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9 grades.

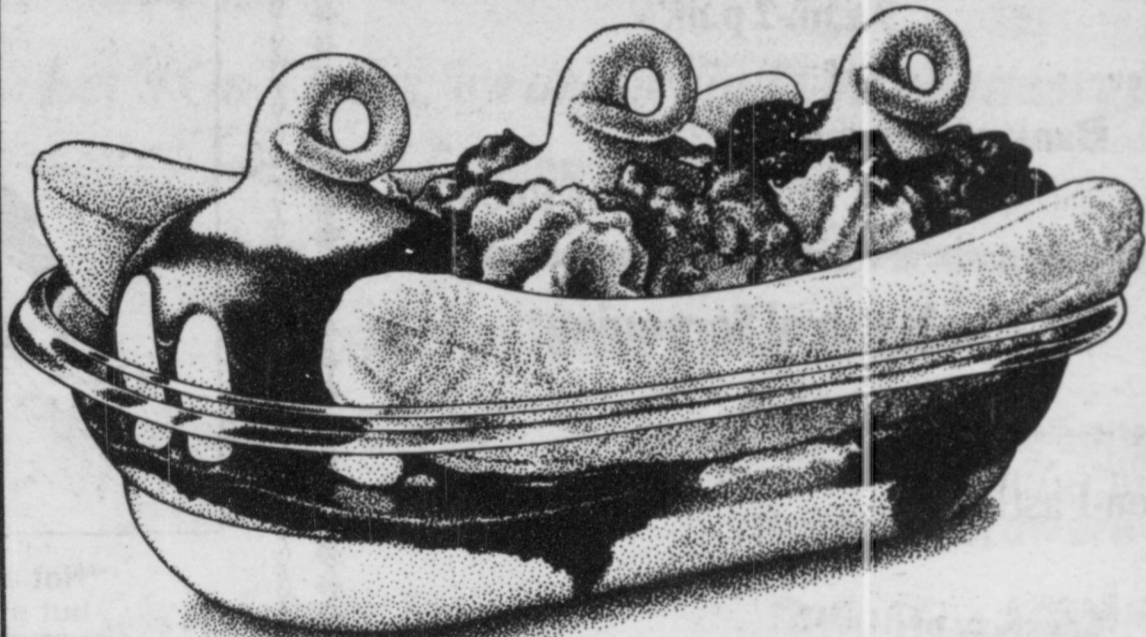

McClellan Creek Soil, Water Conservation District Sets

Election For Director

An election for a director to serve in Zone 5 on the McClellan Creek Soil and Water Conservation Board is scheduled for October 2, 1989 at RGM AG & Grain Elevator in Groom, Texas announced Aubrey Russell, chairman of the board. The election will be held at 10:00 a.m.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director's election, a person must own agricultural land within the district where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district and the voter must be 18 years old.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of soil and water conservation district must own land in the zone he represents, be 18 years of age and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district. Soil and water conservation district directors serve four-year terms of office.

Zone 5 of the district

includes the Groom area. The boundary on the north is Farm Road 293 and the west boundary is Farm Road 2880. County lines are the east and south boundaries.

Current members of the board of directors of the McClellan Creek SWCD are Aubrey Russell, Chairman, Bob Pool, Vice-Chairman, Ed Dittberner, Secretary, C.W. Herndon, member and Bill Murray, member.

The purpose of McClellan Creek SWCD, with headquarters in Panhandle, is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters.

The district board of directors coordinates efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purpose. All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.
