

Traffic Fatality Claims Life Of Arizona Man

Groom Department of Public Safety Officer, Greg Eatmon says Neil Addison Tracy, 21 years of age, died Thursday afternoon as a result of a traffic accident.

The fatality accident was the first in the Groom area since July 4 weekend.

Tracy was traveling east on I-40, 14.5 miles west of Groom when the 1983 Ford Ranger pickup he was driving hit the back of a centerstripping Texas Highway Department truck flipping onto its side trapping Tracy inside the truck.

DPS Eatmon said that Tracy was destined for Spartan College in Tulsa, Oklahoma where he was a freshman. He was from Phoenix, Arizona where his mother resides.

The 4-H program began in Texas in 1908 in Jack County with the Boy's Corn Club organized to teach corn production practices to adults by teaching children. The 4-H heritage continued with Tomato Clubs for girls organized in Milan County in 1912, and the first Beef Calf Club organized in Coleman County in 1910. These rural clubs for boys and girls were the forerunner of 4-H in Texas.

Today's 4-H program, a youth development program of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, is both rural and urban and empha-

sizes using projects and learning experiences to teach boys and girls not only subject matter knowledge and skills, but also important lessons in relationships,

leadership and citizenship. Any youth can become a member of 4-H when he or she reaches nine years of age or has entered the third grade. A youth's last year in 4-H is the calendar year he or she reaches their nineteenth birthday. Adults volunteers are the

cornerstone of the 4-H program. They organize and conduct educational experiences in community and family settings.

Youth in 1989 have a wider variety of projects to choose from than ever before. Besides the basic animal projects - beef, swine, sheep and horse and the fashion and cooking projects 4-H members may choose to study aerospace and rocketry; bicycles; citizenship; consumer decision making; entomology; field crops; vegetable or landhoriculture; leaderscape ship; photography; poultry; public speaking; rabbits; range science; shooting; sports; wildlife and wood-
