## ISSUE

No. 1: Legislative Salaries - The constitutional amendment to limit the salary of the lieutenant governor and the speaker of the House of Representatives to not more than one-half of the governor's salary and to limit the salary of a menber of the Legislature to not more than one-fourth the governor's salary.
No. 2: Water Development Bonds - The constitutional amandment to authorize the issuance of an additional $\$ 500$ million of Texas water development bonds for water supply, water quality and flood control purposes.
No. 3: State Finahcing of Products and Businesses - The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the recovery and further development of the authorizing the Legislature to provide lor the recovery and
state's economy, with goals of increasing job opportunities and other benefits for Texas residents, through state financing of the development and production of Texas products and businesses.
No. 4: Tax Exemption for Veterans' Organizations - The constitutional amendment to $\square \square$ authorize the Legis
ad valorem taxation
No. 5: "Freeport" Tax Exemption - The constitutional amendment promoting aconomic growth, job creation, and fair tax treatment for Texans who export goods to other states and nations by restoring and allowing, on a local option basis, an ad valorem tax exemption for certain personal property that is in Texas only temporarily for the purpose of assembling, storing, manufacturing, processing, or fabricating.
No. 6: 4-Year Terms for Hospital District Boards - Authorizing the members of a hospital district governing board to serve four-year terms.

No. 7: Oathe of Office - The constitutional amendment to recuire that a member of the Legislature, the secretary of state and an elected or appointed officer, betore assuming office, sign a written oath stating that the member, the secrelary of state or officer did not engage in bribery to obtain the office.
No. 8: Bonds for Prisone and Other State Facilities - The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds for projects relating to facilities of corrections institutions, youth corrections institutions, and inental health and mental retardation institutions and for the expansion of statewide law onforcement facilities.
No. 9: Combining Criminal Justice Agencies - The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to organizeand combine various slate agencies that perform criminal justice functions.
No. 10: Informing Juries About Good Conduct Time and Farole - The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to require or permit ocurts to inform juries about the effect of good conduct time and eligibility for parole or ma Idatory supervision on the period of incarceration served by a delendant convicted of a ciminal offense.
No. 11: Legisiative Per Diem - The constitutional amendment to set the amount of per diem received by a member of the Legislature at the amount allowed for federal income tax purposes as a deduction for living expenses incurred by a state legislator in connection with official business.
No. 12: Guarantee for School Facility Conatruction Bonde - The constitutional amendment to provide for using the Permanent School Fund and its income to guarantee bonds issued by the state for the purpose of aiding school districts.

No. 13: Crime Victime' Righte - The constitutional amendment providing a bill of rights for crime victims.

No. 14: Fort Bend County District Attorney - The constitutional amendment requiring a district attorney serving in Fort Bend County to be elected and serve a term in the manner provided by general law for criminal district attorneys.

No. 15: Charitable Raffles by Non-profit Organizations - The constitutional $\square$
amendment authorizing the Legislature to permit and regulate raflies conducted by $\square$ certain non-profit organizations for charitable purposes.

No. 16: Creation of Hospital Districts by Voters - The constitutional amendment $\square$
granting to the people the right to decide whether to cre ate and maintain hospital disticis to people the right to decide whether to create and maintain hospital位

No. 17: State Assistance to Firefighting Organizations - The constitutional $\square \square$ amendment authorizing the state to provide scholarships, grants, loans and other financial assistance to local fire departments and other public firefighting organizations to purchase firefighting equipment, to aid in providing necess ary equipment and facilties to comply with federal and state law, and to educate and train their members.

No. 18: Agricultural Water Conservation Bonde Time IImit - The constitutional amendment to eliminate cprtain time limitations relating o the issuance of Texas agricultural water conservation bonds.

No. 19: Authorizing Local Government Investmente - The constitutional amendment to authorize local governments to invest their funds as provided by law.

No. 20: Abolishing County Surveyor in Certain Counties - The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county surveyor in Cass, Ector, Garza, Smith, Bexar, Harris and Webb counties.

No. 21: College Savinge Bonde - The constitutional amandment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds as college savings bonds to provide educational loans to students and to encourage the public to save for a college education.

Proposition 1: Property Tax Relief - The adoption of an additional one-half of one percent local sales and use tax within the city (of Amarillo) to be used to reduce the property tax rate.

Proposition 2: Sales Tax for Economic Development - The adoption of an addrional one-half of one percent local sales and use tax within the city (of Amarillo) to be used to provide funds for industrial development.
