## Water Recharge Project

## Possible For Groom Area

discuss the possible location of a water recharge project of a water recharge project

What's at stake in our area is the quality and quantity of water contained in the Ogallala Aquifer. The Ogallala, reaching north to South Dakota and south to Odessa, underlies parts of eight states in the central region of the United States. "The Ogallala provides the vast majority of freshwater that is consumed on a day-to-day basis," said Dr. Urban, director of the Water Resource Center at Texas Tech. "It is our most precious commodity. If we either deplete it or ruin it, we have nothing.'
The aquifer provides drinking water, water for cities and industries, oil and gas production and the irri gation of about 6 million acres of Texas farmland. To protect and conserve Legislature in 1949 authoriz ed the creation of groundwater conservation districts, and today there are 23 such single and multicount entities.
Urban said that in the 1950s people believed the Ogallala contained an un-

limited supply of water Taking advantage of cheap pumping costs, farmers applied water far in excess of what was neecied to grow corn, sorghum, wheat and cotton
The number of Ogallala wells shot up from 26,000 in 1950 to more than 170,000 by the early 1980. 170,000 by the early 1980 s The creation of the groundwater conservation districts to monitor water usage, regulate spacing and production of wells, develop plans for water use and prevention of contamination and waste recharging groundwater suppliers and carry out research has helped greatly in slowing the decline in the water level in the aquifer.
After years of a dropping water table, the aquifer beneath the area now shows little decline. We are not necessarily stabilizing, but we're close to it.
The project proposed for the Groom area is a five year project designed to demons-

The interaction of such a recharge activity and use of the playa lake environment by wildlife will also be documented. The project is one of several recharge demon stration projects authorized under Public Law 98-434, The High Plains States Demonstration Program Act of 1983. The law specified cost sharing arrangement with the Federal Govern ment furnishing 80 percent f the cost and the remain ing 20 percent borne by local interest. Much of the local funding for this project will be in kind" funding consisting of use of playa lakes, University faculty time, Dis rict personnel time, etc. Monies to use in matching have been requested from the Texas Water Develop ment Board, and some monies will be furnished by the participating Under ground Water Conservation District

## DPS 1988 Statewide Report

The following report wili be a weekly series on the DPS activities in 1988.
The first is on the various divisions of the Traffic Law Enforcement Division Traffic Law Enforcement (TLE) operations include Highway Patrol, License and Weight, Drivers License, Vehicle Inspection, Safety Education and Communi cations services. Administratively, the division is divided into six geographical regions with regional head quarters at Garland Houston, Corpus Christi Midland, Lubbock and Waco. The TLE Division is commanded by a chief a DPS headquarters in Austin. Each region is commanded by a major who is responsible to the chief.
During 1988, TLE officers filed $1,766,891$ traffic cases. Included in this figure were 42,554 DWI arrests and 6148 DWLS cases. Troopers apprehended 11,642 persons apprehended criminal violations, including 6388 narcotics violations. TLE Troopers also issued 869,079 written warnings for minor traffic warnings
violations.
Statewide traffic accident statistics show a slight decrease of 0.8 percent under the 1987 figures. Fatal accidents figures. highways increased 11.7 percent from 1501 fatal accidents in 1987 to 1676 in 1988. The continuing problem of alcohol involve ment in fatal accidents was indicated by the 1363 fatalities related to alcohol
or drugs - 40
the fatalities. During routine traffic stops, troopers in the TLE Division were responsible for seizing $\mathbf{2 6 , 6 2 6}$ pounds of marijuana, 1468 pounds of cocaine, and approximately 20 pounds of other felony class narcotics, while seizing

The Richardson Region $\mathbf{X}$ Education Service Center formed the cooperative in the early eighties to form a bank of objectives that individual schools could use as a framework for designing their own curricula.
Now districts statewide have adopted the program. The program also includes methods of assessing mastery of the objectives by students to help teachers plan the pace of thei instruction.

Governor Bill Clements in an Clements, an effort to assure a in the 1990 census, has assembled a conimittee of state agency chiefs who will engender increased census awareness among state employees and agency clients.
A comprehensive census count is crucial to Texas in the 1990s, the governor said, in ensuring the state gets its
allotted share of federal funds. Also at stake is proper representation in the U.S. House of Representatives.
An accurate census count in Texas could net the state and local governments as much as $\$ 900$ million more in federal funds during the next 10 years, according to the Texas State Data Center.
In addition, Texas could

informational materials will be distributed to targeted state agencies, including local offices of the Department of Human Services and the Texas Employment Commission, health department clinics and Department of Public Safety driver's license stations.
