### Northerns Tested In Two Lakes

Two northern Panhandle lakes were experimentally stocked with 280,000 northern pike fry, according to Leo Lewis, regional fisheries chief for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The young fish, obtained from the Cedar Bluff National Fish Hatchery near Ellis, Kans., were released in the Greenbelt reservoir near Clarendon and Buffalo Lake near Canyon.

They were selected for the experiments because forage species, principally shad, are a constant problem. The precocious northerns greedily will help control undesirable species and also provide excellent fishing sport.

### Gray County S.C.D. NEWS

Each year during May the Soil and Water Conservation Districts in America celebrate Soil Stewardship Week. The dates for 1967 are April 30-May 7.

Many of us when we hear the term stewardship immediately think of men in the ministry as those who are qualified to speak on the subject. Many of us also take the attitude that we are not affected by stewardship of our resources, but this is not true. Most of us would like to pass responsibility on to a few, not recognizing we all have an interest, a stake or a share in the stewardship or conservation and development of these resources.

Good food and clothing are important to all mankind—however, many countries do not enjoy the wonderful food supply we here in the United States often overlook as a blessing. Neither are many nations well dressed. Good stewards will help keep us well fed and well dressed. They will keep the soil where it is so that they do not contribute to the silt that fills the lakes we depend on for our water supply—and incidentally, silt is also a pollutant. Good stewards not only are developing and conserving for future generations but will make more money with less expense today than those who do not. Ask your bankers or other loaning agencies which is the better loan risk—the conservationist or non-conservationist.

Conservation and stewardship will and are doing much toward keeping our country beautiful. It is responsible for the bountiful supply of wildlife, lovely woodlands and clear clean streams for better and more enjoyable recreation.

These things we all have an interest in and a share of the responsibility lies with each of us.

The economy of our state and nation is greatly affected by stewardship. In Texas, agriculture is second only to oil as the biggest industry. Although only about 8% of our people are actually farmers or ranchers, over 40% of our people are employed to handle agricultural products. Processing and distribution employs many people.

Our agriculture in America uses more steel, rubber, petroleum and chemical products than any other industry—add these few examples to many more and then ask yourself, whoever you are, or whatever you do, if you do not have a share of the responsibility for stewardship of our resources. Let us remember Jeremiah 9:12, 13:

...for what the land perisheth and is burned up like a wilderness, that none possesseth through? And the Lord saith, Because they have forsaken my law which I set before them...

### Second Victim of Rabies at Dozier

(From Wellington Leader)  
A cat in the Dozier community has been found to have rabies (the second animal in that area to be diagnosed with the disease) Dr. Carter Holcomb, county health officer, has reported.

As a result, Clifford Oldham, 8, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Oldham, is receiving rabies vaccine.

A second youth, Kim Janes, 14, is also taking the rabies shots as a precautionary measure after he was bitten by a stray cat that ran off after biting him. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Janes.

Dr. Holcomb said the cat, a pet of the Oldham family, apparently had been around skunks.

"I do not want to cause alarm, but people certainly should be extremely cautious around wild animals, especially skunks," Dr. Holcomb declared. He advised that household pets be vaccinated for rabies.

The Oldham cat became sick and died and the head was sent to the Department of Health for examination. Dr. Holcomb was notified of the results.

A few weeks ago a calf, also in the Dozier community, was found to have rabies.

Dr. Holcomb said he also had two reports from the Little community of skunks acting in a peculiar manner, attacking dogs without provocation.

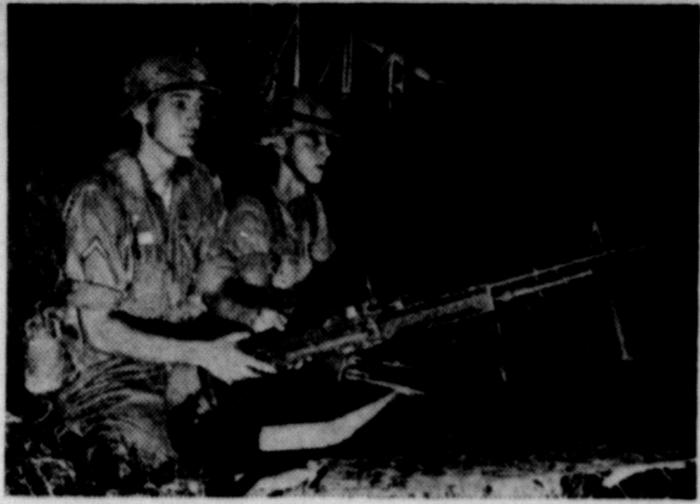

**Tasty Tricks**  
When you fill salt shakers do it over the pan in which vegetables cook so there's no need to wipe spills.

Many people object to the taste of onion when the onion is chopped fine. However, if onion is grated, it will spread through meat loaves, salad mixtures or sandwich fillings easily, with no objectionable flavor.

Cook rice or noodles in chicken or beef bouillon for better than average flavor.

Like to use herbs and spices, but hate to fish them out of stew or soup? Place them in a metal tea ball, then hook the chain of the tea ball over the side of the pot.

If you like fresh, soft toast, use fresh bread. If you like crisp toast, use day-old bread.

Like brown, tasty gravy? Place some flour in a small foil pan and let it brown in the oven while roast cooks. Use this for thickening the gravy.

### Helen's Favorite: Cereal Macaroons (Makes 30)

- 1 can sweetened condensed milk
- 5 tablespoons brown sugar
- 3 cups corn or wheat flakes
- 1/2 cup nutmeats, chopped Maraschino cherries

Cook milk and brown sugar over low heat until thickened, stirring constantly. Remove from heat; stir in cereal flakes, nutmeats. Drop from teaspoon onto greased cookie sheet. Top with bits of cherry. Bake in a moderate (325° F.) oven 15 minutes.
