925 People Cast Votes

In Gray County, 925 people voted in the Democratic primary runoff and 194 people voted in the Republican primary runoff, an eight percent voter turnout for the county.

Richards, presently state treasurer, defeated Attorney General Jim Mattox in the Tuesday primary runoff race. In Gray County, voters gave Mattox the edge with a 466 to 439 vote.

Nikki Van Hightower defeated Tom Bowden statewide to gain the place on the ballot for the Democrats in the November 6, general election.

In Gray County, Hightower received 454 votes and Bowden 405.

Voter in the Democratic primary runoff in the five area counties in the Justice of the Supreme Court Place 2 race went for the most part

with the statewide outcome. Bob Gammage defeated Sears statewide by a 537, 537-382, 123 vote to gain the Democratic place. In Gray, the vote was 650-218.

In the Criminal Appeals Court place 1 race, Frank Maloney received 448,538 votes to Morris L. Overstreet's 445,878. In Gray County Overstreet received 526 votes and Maloney received 325.

Wes Gilbreath defeated Grady Yarbrough for the Republican Party's candidate for the Land Commissioner. In Gray County, Gilbreath received 137 votes and Yarbrough 49.

Rick Perry easily defeated Richard McIver to get the GOP's nod for the agriculture commissioner. In Gray County, Perry received 154 votes and McIver 37.

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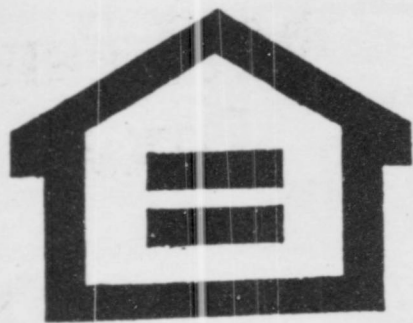

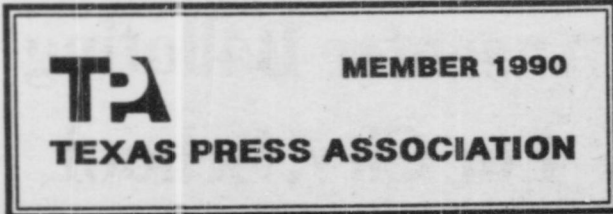

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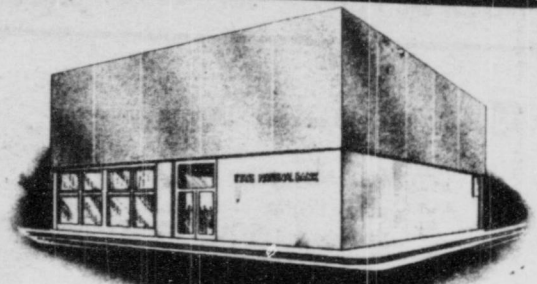


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Groom Tracksters Place First At Lefors Meet

"The people of our county did an excellent job of this in 1986, and have strongly supported the educational activities we have conducted the past four years to address the concerns they identified," said Nusser.

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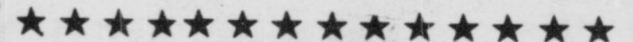
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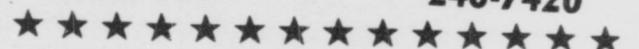

Run-Off Election Results

Texas recorded its highest primary runoff election turnout since 1972 on Tuesday, April 17 when more than 1.2 million people cast ballots in the Democratic and Republican party runoffs.

The runoff turnout is the highest since 1972 when more than 2 million Texans went to the polls to nominate candidates for governor and other offices.

On Tuesday, Texas voters at the statewide level nominated Democratic Party candidates for governor, treasurer, The Texas Supreme Court and Texas Court of Criminal Appeals and Republican Party candidates for land commissioner and agriculture commissioner.

In Carson County, Democrats voted in favor of Mattox for Governor with a total of 655 votes. Richards received 421 votes.

In the race for Treasurer Bowden received 481 votes and Hightower preceded with 517. For Supreme Court, Place 2, Gammage won in the county with 691 votes and Sears fell behind with 280. Overstreet placed the highest in Carson County with 672 votes for Criminal Appeals Court,

Place 1 over Maloney with 326 votes.

McIver only received eight votes in Carson County for Agriculture Commissioner from County Republicans. Perry carried the race with 55. For Land Commissioner 47 votes were cast for Gilbreath and Yarbrough received 12.

Area totals from Gray, Carson, Hemphill, Roberts and Wheeler showed Mattox to be the Democratic choice with 1,863 votes and Richards with 1,325. Hightower was locals choice for Treasurer with 1,487 votes and Bowden with 1,465. Gammage was highly represented with 2,036 votes and Sears with only 871 for Supreme Court, Place 2. Overstreet was area Democrats choice with 1,911 votes and Maloney 1,029 for Criminal Appeals Court Place 1.

Area Republicans voted in favor of Perry with a total of 312 votes from Gray, Carson, Hemphill, Roberts and Wheeler for the race of Agriculture Commissioner. Gilbreath was the area's choice for the race of Land Commissioner with 274 votes and Yarbrough fell behind with 77 votes.

State Treasurer Ann Richards emerged victorious from the Muddy Democratic gubernatorial runoff, setting up a November election battles between Clayton Williams and Ann Richards.

Nikki Van Hightower defeated Tom Bowden statewide to gain the place on the ballot for the Democrats in the November 6 general election.

Bob Gammage defeated Sears statewide for the Supreme Court Place 2 seat.

Frank Maloney received the highest number of votes statewide for the position of Criminal Appeals Court place 1.

Wes Gilbreath defeated Gray Yarbrough for the Republican Party's candidate for the Land Commissioner.

Rick Perry easily defeated Richard McIver to get the GOP's nod for the agriculture commissioner.

Charles "Choc" Smith, the incumbent to the Precinct 2, Carson County Commissioner seat, scraped by his challenger, Richard Robinson, with a vote of 378 to 320 in the Democratic primary runoff.

Commissioners Adopted Resolution

Carson County Commissioners, in regular session Monday, April 9, adopted a resolution in respect to law enforcement officers and in particular to DPS Trooper Roland McGill.

The resolution says: Whereas, the Carson County Commissioners' Court would like to recognize the Law Enforcement personnel of Carson County and the State of Texas:

Whereas, in our everyday routine of work, play and leisure we take for granted many things of which we need to be appreciative;

Whereas, on April 3rd, 1990, Trooper Roland McGill, of the Texas Department of Public Safety, was seriously injured in an unfortunate traffic accident;

Whereas, at that point, family, friends and citizens faced the reality of this

tragic occurrence; Whereas, it is at times like these we realize how grateful and appreciative we should be for the work these individuals do on a 24-hour basis;

Now Therefore, let it be known that our prayers are with Trooper McGill and his family, and we wish him a speedy recovery.

The next time you meet an Officer of the Law, express your appreciation.

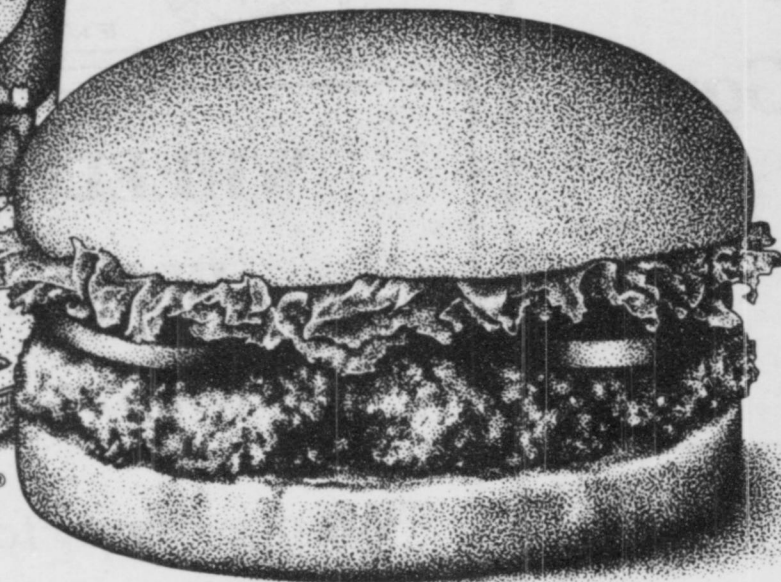

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
