Order on Social Security Tax

Employers must deposit security tax on wages of employees if the tax is not paid at the end of any month in 1967.

James Mallett, farm manager at Texas A and M University, said the tax must be paid with a federal reserve note at a commercial bank to receive the de-

posits must be made by the 15th of the month after the security tax is due to the IRS, Mallett said. If security taxes do not get paid at the end of a month they may be accumulated and then they must be deposited by the 15th of the following month.

Farmers may find they have to pay the \$100 at the end of several months during the year, while small farms are required to meet the bill only once or twice a year.

60. Federal Depository must be used to make these payments. They must be validated by a check and filed with the social security tax return before, Jan. 31 of the following year.

Other types of businesses are required to make quarterly payments of both security and income tax withholdings. Farmers are not required to withhold income tax on employees' wages.

Prairie Chickens Fade in Panhandle

Fading remnants of once numerous lesser prairie chickens in the northeast corner of the Texas Panhandle are being counted on ancestral breeding grounds now, reports Richard DeArment, Panhandle project leader for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Each year DeArment silently approaches two established lesser prairie chicken booming grounds in Wheeler and Hemphill Counties in the dim light of early morning to count the number of the rare chickens assembled there. These are study areas and used for population trend data.

These surveys began as early as 1942 but were curtailed during the war years and resumed again in 1950. Since that time there has not been a break in records.

Employers must deposit social security tax on wages of employees if the tax is not paid at the end of any month in 1967.

James Mallett, farm management consultant at Texas A and M University, says the tax must be paid with a federal reserve note at a commercial bank to receive the deduction.

Payments must be made by the 15th of the month after the month of the security taxes due. If the employer fails to do so, the tax will be assessed at the end of the month and will be accompanied by a penalty of one percent of the amount due.

Federal Depository banks must make these payments by the 15th of the month and file with the social security tax return before Jan. 31 of the following year.

Types of businesses are required to make quarterly payments of both social security and income tax. Farmers are not required to withhold income tax on their employees' wages.

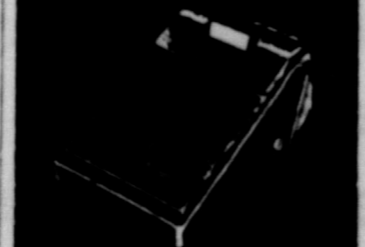

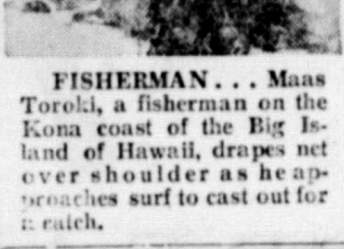

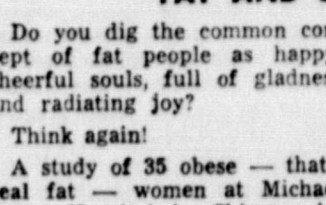

Some real strength is about to be seen in the finished cattle market. About all we have had is bad news since Jan. 1, 1967. Today (Tuesday, May 9), the live beef cattle futures market has jumped the second day in a row in response to a substantial improvement in the cash market over the country.

The 32-state report that showed three per cent more cattle on feed created some pessimistic reaction. The most encouraging thing as you see it was the fact that 35 per cent more cattle were reported in the weight category weighing over 1,100 lbs. Slaughter has been heavy during April and up to this date. This means we should begin to clean out all the heavy cattle.

The corn belt boys are beginning to clear their fed cattle in preparation for field work. One observer whom I talked with today seems to think the futures market will make a substantial advance. He remarked, "The price of replacement feed lot cattle is so high that hedgers will not be on the selling end to depress the market back unless a substantial rise is made."

In other words, it is next to impossible to hedge a profit in a feeding operation based on the going price for feeder cattle at the present time and the live beef cattle futures market. We believe you will see some very unstable price conditions that will develop over the next several months on all agricultural commodities.

You are going to see wheat prices run up and down the ladder like you haven't seen it since the later 1920's. Feed grains are in for the same thing. The futures market on live beef cattle will help hold cattle on a more stable course but we are in for some surprises and more shocks within the next 18 months.

It all boils down to the fact that we are crossing into another era in agriculture in the U. S. We are moving from an era of over supply to one of shortages. At the present we still have the capacity to over produce. However, because of the high employment rate and the big population increase, big surpluses soon diminish.

We personally think wheat is in for a substantial price rise. When the county is in, all think the 1967 wheat crop will be so much below average. You will see wheat jump the limit for several days in a row. The Santa Fe report shows a potential of only three-fourths that forecast by the government. Hold on to your hat—the next 18 months will be exciting.

Cadet-Warden Deadline May 17

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department announced that the deadline for applying for the new cadet-warden force is May 17.

The period from May 15 thru May 17 was designated for processing young men seeking to qualify for the 50 positions created to beef up the summer water patrol.

The applicants will be interviewed and tested at the department's five regional offices at La Porte, Rockport, Waco, Tyler and San Angelo.

Those tentatively accepted will be screened further by written examination plus the standard tests as to character, habits and previous employment.

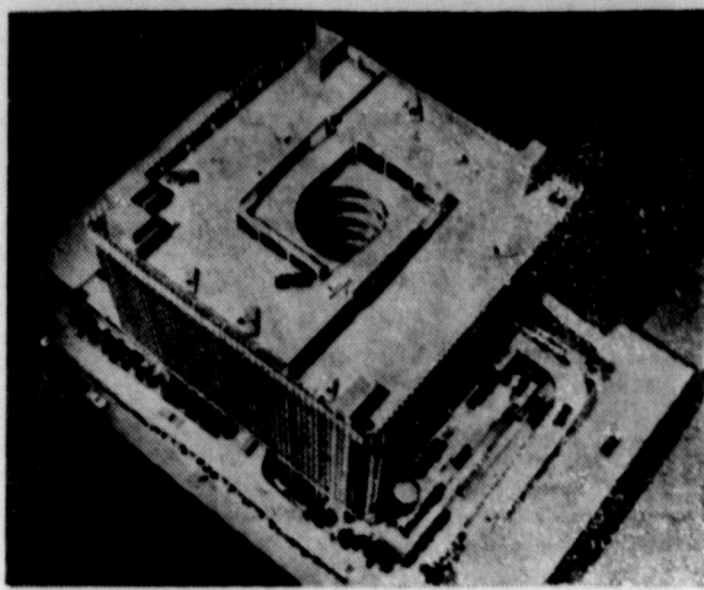
Successful cadet candidates must agree to accept employment as a game warden trainee with beginning appointment effective September, immediately after the summer cadet program has been terminated.

This requirement, according to the department, precludes applications by such as college students seeking summer jobs.

The cadets will be used on mobile teams assigned to Texas waterways that now are patrolled by the department under the new water safety law.

They will be used primarily in a boat maintenance-operation capacity and serve on location under a regularly commissioned state game warden.

The pay will be \$397 per month from June 1 through Aug. 31
