## Retirement Closes 37 Years, Teaching

One of McLean's most outstanding teachers, Mrs. Vera Featherston Back, brings to a close a teaching career of 37 years, upon her retirement this year.

Born in Aspermont, Mrs. Back lived in Stoneville and Kent counties many years. She is an honor graduate of Hardin-Simmons University with a major in English and minor in history.

She began teaching in the year 1913 at Back school, north of McLean. She taught there one year and began teaching in the McLean schools in 1926-27, and taught in McLean until the year 1963-67.

Upon finishing 19 years teaching in McLean, Mrs. Back taught three years at Enterprise school in Collinsworth County. She taught in Plainview school, Wheeler County, 1941 through 1943.

In October, 1943, she started teaching at Amarillo Air Force Base and continued there until September, 1946. The Backs then moved back to McLean and she started teaching again for the McLean school system until 1951-52.

She entered the insurance business in McLean for a period of four years and returned to teaching in the 1956-57 school year and has taught until her retirement this year.

Proclamation and recessional were played by Mrs. L. H. Earhman, with the invocation being given by Rev. S. T. Greenwood and benediction by Rev. Leo McMahan.

The address was given to the students by Rev. R. BEAZLEY with special music being given by the seventh and eighth grade classes. A piano solo was played by D'Aun Phillips.

Mrs. Mike Johnson registered the guests as they arrived.

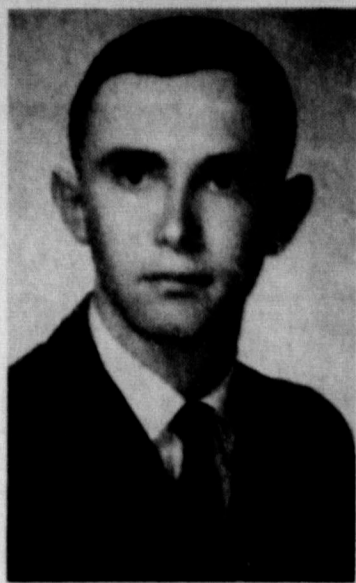

Highways to the great outdoors aren't all on the ground. Thousands of highways in the sky connect the country's weekend or vacation playgrounds.

These highways are being traveled more and more by thousands of people who have discovered the fun and convenience of do-it-yourself flying.

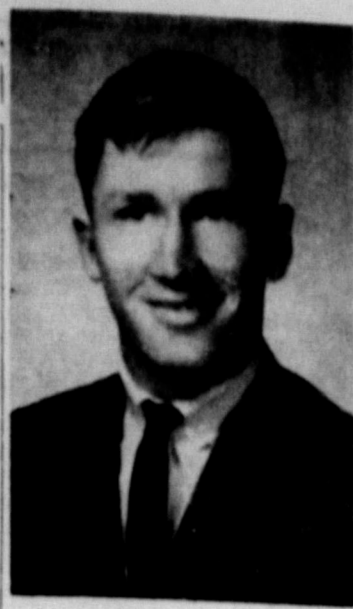

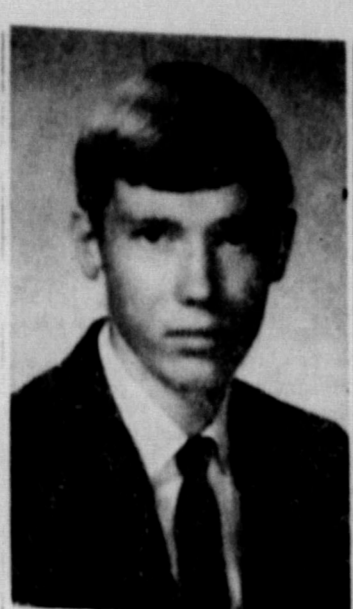

Abe Lewis, Harvey Waters and W. C. Couls have completed land leveling projects. Wiley Reynolds has completed a pond on his place just north of Pampa.

O. R. Blankenship, who farms west of McLean, has completed a system of parallel terraces. This type of terraces is much easier to farm since they have even number of rows between terraces.

Kent Philpott, J. T. Trew, Ealcin Bros., Floyd Franklin and Walter Ollinger have completed underground irrigation pipelines.

Leldon Hudson, who farms east of Groom, is in the process of making a topography map. This map will be used to design a system of parallel terraces.

Meadow management is very important if we are to maintain a high yield of good quality forage. Continuous close mowing and grazing year after year will kill or stunt the vigor of the important meadow grasses such as eastern gramagrass, Indiangrass, switchgrass and blue stems. Under this poor management the better grasses will be replaced by short inferior grasses such as dropseeds, saltgrass and gramagrasses.

Meadows should have regular periods of summer deferment every three or four years to maintain and increase the vigor of the better grasses.

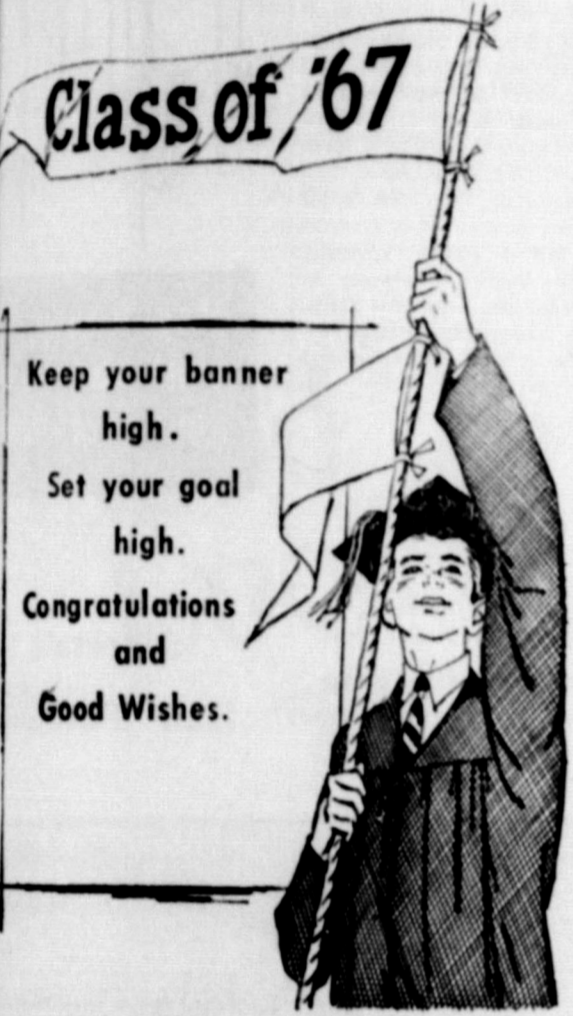

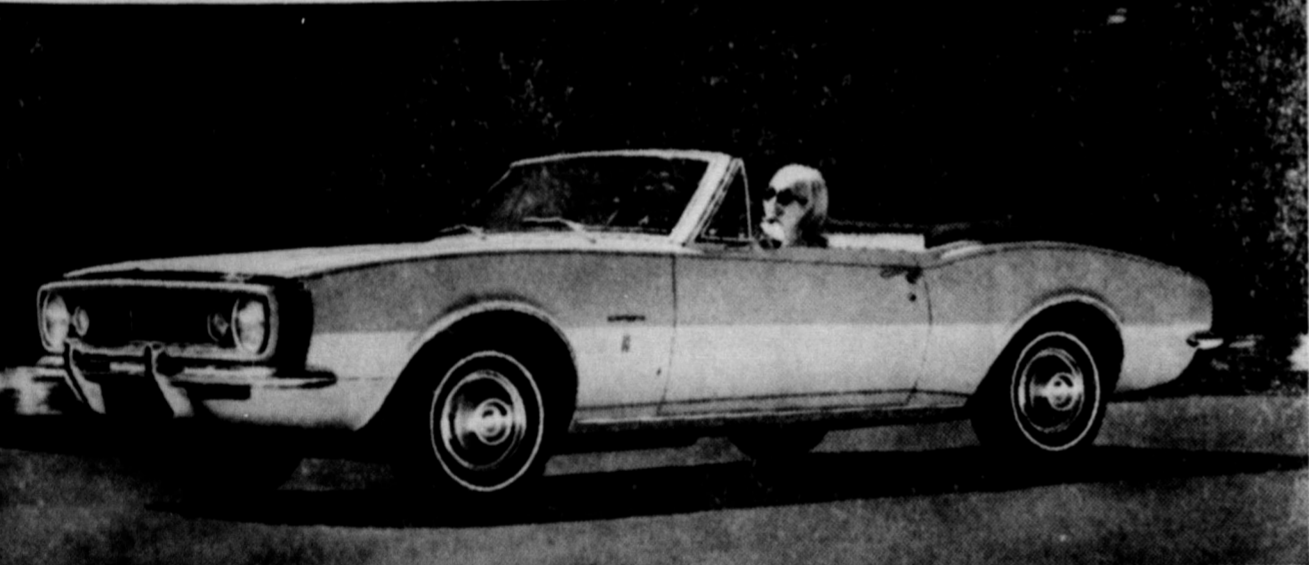

## Sidelights from a History Notebook

When the Alaskan territory was opened by the gold rush of '98, steamships provided the only communication between Alaska and the United States. Under an act of Congress of May 26, 1900, the signal corps built 1,740 miles of telegraph line in two years and laid a cable in the sea from Sitka to Seattle, giving instant communication with remote areas.

One of the most famous of the Bloomer girls was Amelia Bloomer. Born May 27, 1818, she became a great campaigner for temperance and women's suffrage. In 1870, in Des Moines, she helped organize the Iowa Equal Suffrage Association. As editor of the Lily, first women's rights magazine, she campaigned for reformed dress — "a skirt that stopped just below the knees and full Turkish trousers ending in ruffles at the tops of her high shoes." Her campaign created a national furor. New York City papers named the costume "bloomers" or give me death!

### Angus Tour to Be Held in Oklahoma

Cattlemen interested in studying 12 outstanding herds of commercial beef cows will attend the 1967 "Challenge of the Future" Angus tour to be held in Oklahoma's famed Blue Stem of the Osage. The event will be held on June 22-23-24. Last year's tour, in the heart of West Texas, drew more than 500 cattlemen from 21 states. The purpose of the tour is to show breeders of registered Angus their challenge, opportunity and obligation to produce more bulls which will satisfy the demands of progressive commercial cattlemen. This year's tour will be sponsored by the American and Oklahoma Angus Associations in cooperation with the Oklahoma Cattlemen's Association. 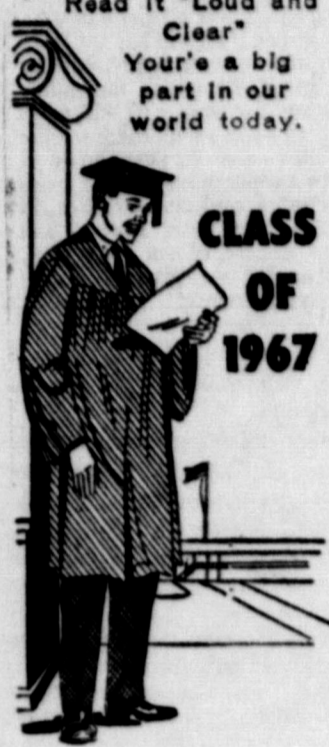

## EDITORIAL

LIQUOR BY THE DRINK. HORSE RACE GAMBLING

The governor of the State of Texas, the Texas Senate, and the Texas House of Representatives are supposed to represent the people of Texas. Elementary. Yes, but sometimes these duly-elected representatives need to be reminded.

Occasionally our representatives in Austin decide that they know better what is good for us than we do. Specifically some of these representatives believe that legalized liquor-by-the-drink and horse-race-gambling would be good for us. The people have responded to the proposed liquor-by-the-drink bill by writing to their elected lawmakers expressing their wishes. These letters ran as high as 10 to 1 against liquor-by-the-drink.

In 1935 when prohibition was repealed in Texas, a provision was put into the Texas Constitution to forever prohibit the open saloon. The people of Texas accepted repeal and local option on that condition. They still do not wish to have open saloons — even under another name. And the people have well-expressed that wish to their elected representatives.

Beside their letters opposing horse race gambling, the people of the state of Texas have voted at the polls against legalized pari-mutuel gambling. This should be sufficient evidence that they do not want it.

Despite the clearly revealed will of the vast majority of the people, many of our elected representatives favor both these bills.

We suggest that the men elected by the people and sent to Austin step back and take another look at their positions, and truly represent the will of the people. Regardless of their own personal moral convictions (or lack of them), these representatives are there to represent the people, and should enact no permissive legislation against the wishes of the electorate.

## Apparel Is Main College Cost

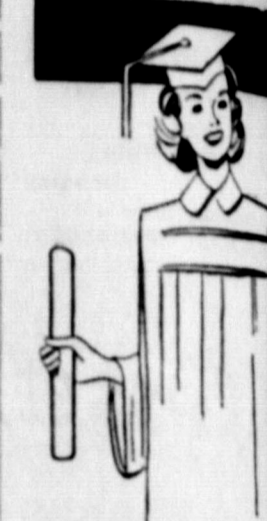
Although tuition and living costs have increased this year at many colleges, much of the total college expense can be found in a girl's closet.

According to Reba Boyles, extension clothing specialist at Texas A and M University, wardrobe costs for women were estimated by a survey to range from \$200 to \$500. Incoming freshmen generally bought more than the returning upperclassmen, according to the Fairchild News Service study.

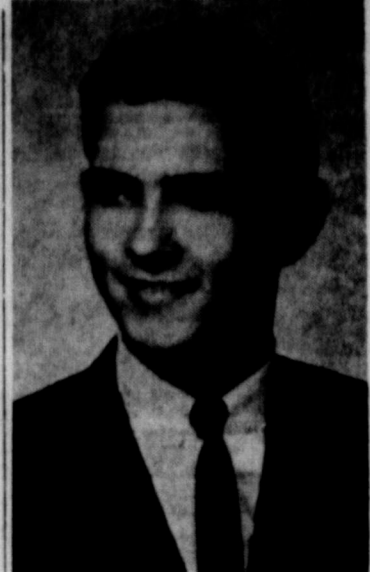

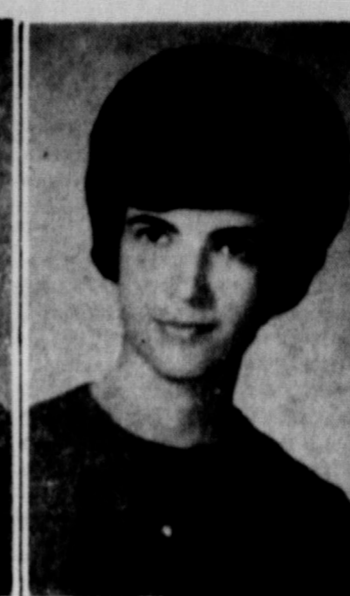

**TIPS ON EARLY SEASON FISHING**

Early spring offers both trials and triumphs for the fisherman. Though fish are perfectly willing to accommodate the aims of anglers, getting the two together sometimes proves difficult.

Adverse water conditions often defeat fishermen this time of year, note the fishing authorities at Mercury outdoors. High winds, changing temperatures and muddy water caused by heavy spring run-offs all cause frequently encountered problems.

Winds that often discourage anglers can actually have beneficial effects on fishing. They may hasten warming in some areas and kick up such a fuss on windward shores that bottom-burrowing creatures are dislodged or exposed to ravenous game fish. Exercise boating caution, of course, but remember the wind can be a friend.

Rising temperatures set off a roving instinct in winter-chilled fish, particularly among the younger and more adventurous of the breed. And they may be found just about anywhere in the upper levels of a lake. Trolling is the recommended way to locate the wanderers.

Muddy waters can be overcome by using baits and lures that appeal to the fish's senses of smell and hearing. In some species these senses are more developed than in others, but it's generally agreed both play an important part in feeding habits.

Artificial users do best with underwater lures that have a lively action. Adding spinners to a plastic worm rig, for instance, creates vibrations that alert fish to a possible meal even when they are nearly blinded. Retrieve this lure faster than normal to make a connection.

**News of Social Security**

Medicare beneficiaries who signed up for medical insurance protection can now obtain an information kit to help them keep a record of their doctor bills so they will know when they reach their yearly \$50 deductible.

The kit includes a record-keeping folder and two leaflets which tell how to request payments for medicare claims. The folder has pockets for holding doctor bills and space to write the date and amount of each bill.

Those who wish to obtain the

kit can get one from the Amarillo social security office at 1006 S. Adams, telephone DR 6-5151. Also, people who need help in completing a medical insurance claim are invited to get help from the social security office.

**Public Health Grant For Immunization**

Approval of a \$315,650 Public Health Service grant to Texas for a state-wide immunization project, has been announced by Dr. J. E. Peavy, state health commissioner.

The funds will be used to wage immunization campaigns in cooperation with local health departments and medical societies against measles, polio, diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough, Dr. Peavy said.

The project will last until April 30, 1968. An additional year has been tentatively funded with \$225,000 for a continuation of the project, Dr. Peavy added, and a supplemental budget of \$35,775 for polio vaccine for use this year has also been requested.

Texas has an estimated 1,550,000 pre-school children, with 40 per cent of these, or 620,000, believed susceptible to measles, and at least 30 per cent, or 465,000, are susceptible to polio.

There are no state laws requiring immunizations for entry into elementary school, such requirements being matters of local school board action. Most school systems do recommend and many require diphtheria and smallpox immunizations prior to school entry. In many areas polio and measles inoculations are also recommended.

**Music Camp at Baylor in June**

Applications are still being accepted for Baylor University's 10th annual summer music camp for high school students, June 3-11.

More than 300 students are expected for the nine-day music camp, said Bernard A. Smith, camp director and Baylor associate professor of music.

Musicians having completed the ninth, tenth, eleventh or twelfth grades are eligible to receive tuition-free instruction from about 25 university faculty members and students, Bernard said.

Total cost of the workshop, including room and board in campus residence halls, recreational facilities and health insurance, will be \$35. Students will be allowed free use of music, equipment and facilities.

Day students who will not need housing facilities will be charged only \$5 plus meal expenses.

The camp will include band, orchestra, chorus, piano and organ workshops with special classes in theory, composition, conducting and music appreciation.

Membership in each workshop will be determined by tryouts on the first Saturday afternoon of camp.

Piano and organ workshops will be open to advanced students. From this group, selected students will be given the opportunity to play chamber music with string and wind instrument players from the camp band and orchestra.

Music appreciation will be a group activity involving all campers in a series of lectures on a variety of music subjects by Baylor faculty members.

Students wishing to apply for the camp should send a \$5 deposit to Bernard A. Smith, camp director, School of Music, Baylor University, Waco.

**Saturday Driver Most Dangerous**

The Sunday driver has long been the target of jokes, but according to a survey by the Travelers Insurance Companies, the Saturday shopper may be more of a menace.

More fatal accidents occur on Saturdays (21.6%) than on any other day. Sunday takes "second honors" (18%).

A spokesman said drivers should pay attention to traffic—not store windows. "A moment's distraction can cause a lifetime of agony," he added.

More than 52,500 deaths and 4,400,000 injuries were caused by highway accidents last year. Of these, more than 11,000 deaths and 809,000 injuries occurred on Saturdays. Tuesdays recorded the lowest number of deaths and injuries.

Passenger cars were involved in nearly 80 per cent of all fatal accidents and almost 90 per cent of all non-fatal accidents.

Commercial vehicles, driven many more miles per year than passenger cars, were involved proportionately in twice as many fatal accidents as non-fatal accidents. Motorcycles, which constitute less than two per cent of all registered vehicles, were involved in more than two per cent of all highway fatalities last year.
