## DPS Armed With Video Camera

In addition to his gun and badge DPS officer Gary

Davis has a new piece of equipment that should make his job much easier and less frustrating. His patrol car has recently been equipped with a cam corder, wireless microphone and a 5-inch black and white television. The recording units cost about \$1600. and are paid for with seized drug money.

These units are designed for protection of the officer, and the private citizen. When an officer stops a car he switches this on and puts on the wireless microphone. What ever happens is recorded. The unit is on a swivel base so that if necessary it would record out the back rather than the front of the car.

Davis states that in the Houston area there have been a marked increase in DWI convictions. As soon as a defense lawyer sees the filmed proof, they are suggesting to their clients that they plead guilty. Davis has had his unit for about one month. During that time he has made four DWI arrests. He was able to document their field sobriety test. These cases have not come to trial yet to determine if the film will

make a difference.

Officer Davis has also found that people tend to be less abusive in their language when they realize they are being taped. Officers will also be able to prove false reports of abuse or brutality. There is no

way of guessing just how many tax dollars this new equipment will save, but DPS officers are expecting that it will.

## School District To Vote August 10 On Amendments

School Superintendents and representatives from five school districts attended the first meeting of the Armstrong, Carson and Randall Education District meeting Tuesday morning in Canyon. This new governmental body was created by the legislature primarily for the purpose to assess and collect taxes to be used by Claude, Groom, White Deer, Panhandle, and Canyon school districts. These schools have been assigned to a single county district.

Members of this board are Robert Counts and Superintendent Ronnie Tichelman of Panhandle, R. T. Laurie and Superintendent Larry Johnston of White Deer, Jim Murphy and Dr. Bill King of Canyon, Mike Ollinger and Superintendent Jerry Hawthorne of Claude, Denny Babcock and Superintendent Ken Sweatt of Groom. Elected as chairperson of the group was Jim Murphy and Denny Babcock as Vice Chairperson. Elected Recording Secretary was Robert Counts.

August 10 was the date set for an election that will include two amendments on the state level and three amendments pertaining to the local level.

The County Education District called the election but each school district will conduct their own.

Dr. King presented an overview to the group explaining the responsibilities and functions of the CED. The CED has the authority to hire personnel or enter into agreements with other agencies with the idea to prevent duplication of services.

Voters will be asked to

decide for or against in the August 10 election of five amendments pertaining to the CED.

No. 1 "The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education

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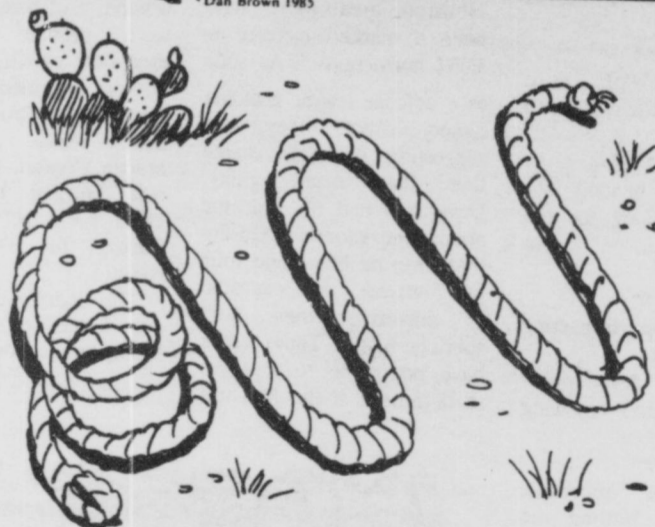
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**CATTLE BRAND ...**

### Jim Babcock

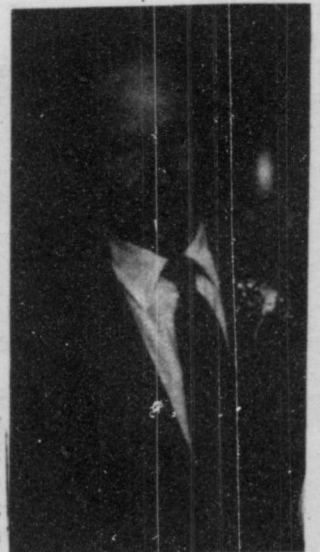
Jim Babcock, 80, died Tuesday, June 25, 1991.

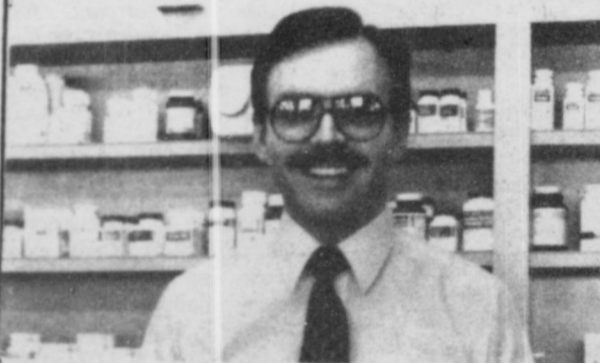
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**LOW-INCOME HOUSEHOLDS MAY BE ELIGIBLE FOR ENERGY ASSISTANCE**

Some low-income Texans may be eligible for help in paying cooling bills this summer through the Home Energy Assistance Program, according to the Texas Department of Human Services.

The one-time payment is available to many low-income households. Applications for energy assistance were mailed to households that received food stamps, Aid to Families with Dependent Children, or Supplemental Security Income in May. Other low-income individuals may request an application by calling the toll-free number 1-800-252-8060 during the enrollment period of July 1 through July 31.

Eligibility is limited by gross income and resources. Aid is available for a one-person household having less than \$628.49 gross income per month. The gross income limits are \$842.49 for households of

two persons, \$1,056.49 for three, \$1,270.49 for four, \$1,484.49 for five, and \$1,698.49 for six.

Households are eligible if the cost for cooling is included in the rent payment or if the household pays a portion of its home energy costs.

Energy assistance checks are sent directly to the people who are eligible for assistance. However, the checks are made payable to the energy provider.

People receiving one of these energy assistance checks should mail it or take it in person to the energy provider business office with their regular energy bill. The check can be cashed only by the energy provider. If the HEAP check is more than the energy bill, the additional amount will be credited to the person's account for the next month's bill. If the energy bill is higher than the check, the person is responsible for paying the difference.

**CATTLE FEEDING CAPITAL OF THE WORLD**

For the second year in a row, feedlots within the area served by Southwestern Public Service Company during 1990 fed a record number of cattle, according to SPS's annual Fed Cattle Survey.

Feedlots in the SPS service area fed 5,570,203 head of cattle, a 1.9% increase over the 1989 total of 5,468,350.

The survey also showed that the one-time total capacity of area feedlots in 1990 was 2,887,275, up from the one-time total capacity in 1988 of 2,758,662 head.

Krupnick said information from the Fed Cattle Survey is used across the country by ag-related industries. "It helps highlight this area's agriculture and food-processing industries," Krupnick said. "We have a good agriculture story to tell and this is just one chapter of it."

The Fed Cattle Survey is also showing growth in the total number of feedlots in the area, from 117 in 1989 to 120 in 1990.

The report also includes a chart on the ten-year history of fed cattle and the

one-time capacity of surveyed feed lots, as well as information on the number of feedlots with 5,000 head capacity or more, and a county breakdown of lot capacity and numbers fed.

Copies of the report and survey are available at SPS offices across the company's

which covers 52,000 square miles. The region includes the Texas and Oklahoma panhandles, the Texas South Plains, eastern and southeastern New Mexico and southwestern Kansas.

While most numbers in the survey were up, the number of cattle slaughtered last year in the area decreased slightly. The 13 beef-packing plants in the SPS service area slaughtered 4,661,163 cattle, down from 4,694,852 in 1989. At the same time, however, capacity at the plants increased in 1990 to 5,095,520.

"There are several packing plants located just outside our service area," Krupnick said. "That accounts for the difference between the number of cattle slaughtered and the number fed."

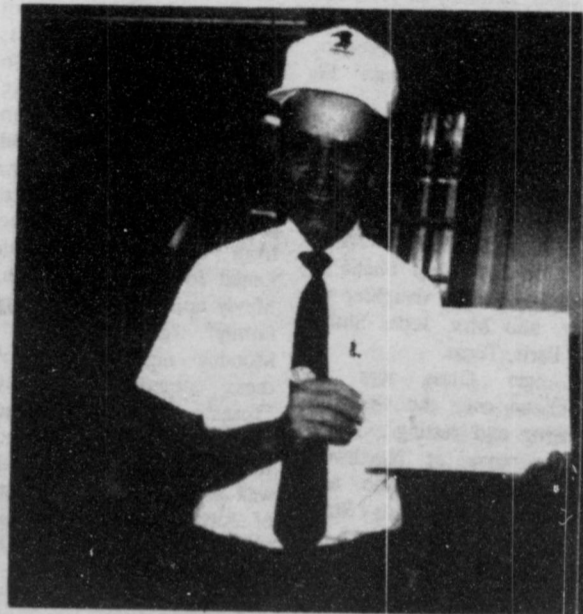

**Weight Loss Surprises Researchers**

WASHINGTON—A nutrition organization was hopeful that a nutritionally complete "hi-tech" food tablet would help ease world hunger problems, until a study revealed that one of the ingredients could cause significant weight loss.

Researchers in Europe found that an ingredient in the aptly named product Food Source One actually caused people to lose weight, even though specifically instructed not to alter normal eating patterns, according to one study published in the prestigious *British Journal of Nutrition*. Researchers in an earlier study had speculated that the weight loss was due to a decrease in the intestinal absorption of calories.

While the development of Food Source One, a project of National Dietary Research, would not be used to successfully fulfill its original goal, the discovery has

been a windfall for overweight people. A Daytona Beach, Florida woman fighting a weight battle for 12 years used the product on the recommendation of her physician and lost 30 pounds. She stated, "Not only have I lost 30 pounds but my cholesterol has dropped from 232 to 143. I have two closets full of clothes which have not fit me in two years that I can now wear." In a separate report, a telephone interview revealed that a Wilmington, North Carolina pharmacist lost 14 pounds in 15 days on the product and was never hungry.

Researchers in Europe found that an ingredient in the aptly named product Food Source One actually caused people to lose weight, even though specifically instructed not to alter normal eating patterns, according to one study published in the prestigious *British Journal of Nutrition*. Researchers in an earlier study had speculated that the weight loss was due to a decrease in the intestinal absorption of calories.

While the development of Food Source One, a project of National Dietary Research, would not be used to successfully fulfill its original goal, the discovery has

In a separate report, a telephone interview revealed that a Wilmington, North Carolina pharmacist lost 14 pounds in 15 days on the product and was never hungry.

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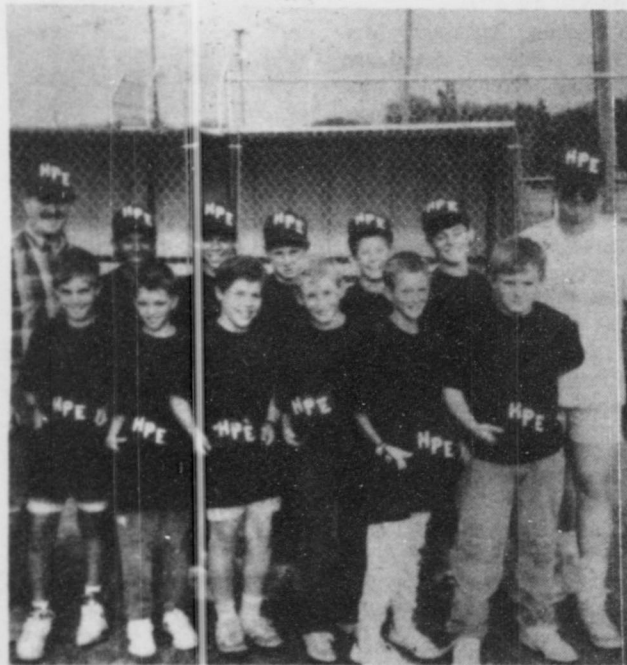

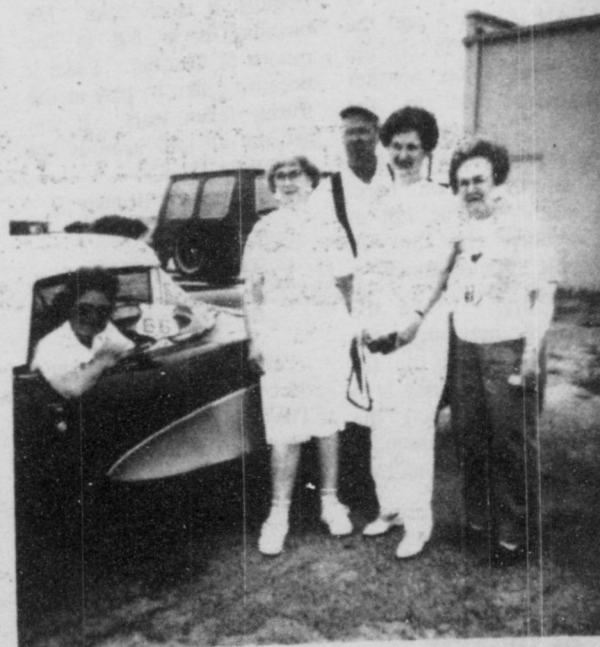
## Corvette Caravan Visits Texas Exhibit

He worked as a pharmacist in retail business and in hospitals before going to medical school. While attending medical school at the Universidad de Nuevo Leon in Monterrey, he served as a pharmacology laboratory instructor of medical students.
