The 1990 area tax rates have been released. Groom
rates are fifth from the top. Just looking at the figures does not really tell the whole story. Although tax rate appears to be very high, the property values are not. For instance, a home here valued at $\$ 50,000.00$ would be valued at $\$ 100,000.00$ in Amarillo. On the other hand a home valued at $\$ 50,000.00$ in at $\$ 40,000,00$ in Alanreed. Between the highest and lowest tax rates in the area the dollar difference is $\$ 779.00$ on a $\$ 50,000.00$ home. What is really hard to tell is what kind of property is considered to have a value of $\$ 50,000.00$. The difference between what this kind of money will buy in Groom and Amarillo are great. One can talk about fair market value all day, but in reality many small towns have little market to compare. Our taxation rate appears to be higher than cities like Borger and Amarillo on paper.
