State Capital NEWS

Legislators wound up the 60th session in Austin on Friday, despite a hectic flurry of last-minute assignments, and behind a far-reaching record of achievement in many areas.

One can deny that there were some notable failures. But the accomplishments were impressive.

There is a random look at some of the session's highlights:

BUDGET—Lawmakers agreed to a \$2,400,000,000 in spending for 1968, without passing a bill. They will come back next year to budget for 1969. The bill provides for substantial increases in all areas of state government, including education, health, general administration and welfare.

SCHOOL TEACHERS—After receiving a \$68,000,000 salary increase program and being offered \$5,500,000 by the Senate, teachers finally got \$51,000,000.

STATE EMPLOYEES—These men came up with their most substantial salary benefits in years. Raises averaged about 7 per cent and ranged up to 10 per cent and more in some areas.

MEDICAID—Title 19 hospital and medical aid to the poor—most dramatic step in the welfare since launching social security—was implemented for Texas by passage of a special act and appropriation of nearly \$25,000,000.

EDUCATION—Money was available for 2,300,000 public school pupils and a 26 per cent increase in higher education spending. Junior college appropriations were increased from \$13,600,000 to \$24,300,000.

PROPERTY TAXES—Cities got authority they sought to limit their property taxes by levying one per cent on taxes on vote of their voters after next August.

LABOR—Although defeated on minimum wage legislation and women's compensation law reform, labor came to terms with management on a compromise industrial safety act and an increase in unemployment compensation benefits from a maximum of \$37 to \$45 a week.

CONSUMER CREDIT—State's new consumer credit code regulates spending at all levels. It goes up to 240 per cent on small loans sterner controls, but the bill passed big margins.

TRAFFIC SAFETY—Major bill of Gov. John Connally's recommended highway safety program was approved. It introduced a new drivers' license and an auto inspection bill and establishment of a traffic program to be administered by the motorist.

OPEN MEETINGS—Another legislative first, an act requires open meetings of governmental agencies at all times. It was signed into law by the governor, who termed it "a first step forward to provide a means whereby the public can become more informed on governmental and public affairs."

REAPPORTIONMENT—Legislators agreed on both congressional and state House of Representatives redistricting. However, they could not get together on judicial reapportionment.

WATER—Texas Water Development Board received \$1,200,000 more for its operations and completion of a statewide master plan. Texas Water Rights Commission got a boost of \$484,000 to aid in ministering the new water rights adjudication act which also is a product of the 60th session.

POLLUTION—Strengthened Water Pollution Control Board got \$13,100,000 for its 1968 operations. An air pollution control measure also became law.

SUNDAY CLOSING—Lawmakers tightened Sunday closing laws by repealing the "emergency purchase" provisions of the old law.

Key recommendations of Governor Connally which failed to clear the Legislature were proposals for sweeping revision of the state constitution by a 400-member convention and legalization of sale of liquor by the drink.

Bill to legalize parimutuel wagering on horse races never came to a showdown vote, but a referendum on the issue was approved for inclusion on next May's Democratic and Republican primary election ballots.

CONNALLY VETOS—Most of the bills passed by Legislature are signed into law. But once in a while the governor vetoes a measure. One he vetoed would have allowed cigarette distributors to make payment for cigarette stamps purchased from the state within 15 days after the purchase rather than when the purchase is made.

Connally said he vetoed the bill because although it would have required the distributors buying on credit to put up a bond, "this surety bond does not change the constitutionality of pledging the state's credit."

In addition, the governor said the state comptroller has informed him that "the general revenue fund in the treasury would lose approximately \$5,500,000 during this current fiscal year because of the delay in payments for cigarette stamps."

LEGISLATORS' PAY—Both houses approved—and the people will get a chance to vote on—the proposed constitutional amendment which would raise the salaries of legislators from the current \$4,800 to a maximum of \$8,400.

Measure, authored by Rep. Alonzo Jamison of Denton, will be placed on the ballot in the next general election to let the voters decide whether they want to raise the salaries of their representatives and senators.

EDUCATION FUNDS DISTRIBUTED—Governor Connally has approved an expenditure of more than \$1,080,000 requested by the Texas Education Agency under Title III of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act for educational planning in a variety of fields.

Some \$67,500 will go to schools in Edinburg, Corpus Christi, Victoria, Orange, Kilgore, Mount Pleasant, Wichita Falls, Dallas, Waco, Abilene, San Angelo, Lubbock, Midland, El Paso and San Antonio. Bryan and A and M school districts each will receive \$22,500.

Money can go for salaries, consultant fees and travel. Grants soon will be transferred to the board of directors for the Education Service Center in each geographic region of the state.

COURTS SPEAK—Supreme Court will hear arguments on the right of cities to tax buses used in interstate commerce. Case arose from Fort Worth's taxing 77 Greyhound buses.

Third Court of Civil Appeals refused to subscribe to "doctrine of recent origin" which would increase by \$100,000 damages awarded the heirs of four men killed in a Colorado plane crash. Heirs had sued Mustang Aviation, Inc., of Dallas.

Rites Held for S. R. Jones, Former McLean Resident

Funeral services were held Sunday in First Presbyterian Church in McLean for Rev. Samuel Raymond Jones, 76, of Lubbock. Dr. Raymond Hurn, superintendent of the West Texas District of the Church of the Nazarene at Lubbock, officiated.

Burial was in Hillcrest Cemetery under direction of Lamb Funeral Home.

Rev. Jones died Thursday, May 25, in a Lubbock nursing home after a 3-month illness. He moved to McLean in 1906 from Cartersville, Ill., and lived here until moving to Lubbock.

He organized the Church of the Nazarene in McLean in 1911, and had held pastorates in the church for more than 50 years in Western Oklahoma and the Texas Panhandle. The first sermon he preached was in the Osage Nation near Hominy, Okla., in 1907.

Survivors are a daughter, Mrs. Travis Stokes of Lubbock; a son, Leslie Jones of Amarillo; a sister, Mrs. George McGonigal of Cartersville, Ill.; two grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Gray Countians Purchase Bonds

April sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds amounting to \$31,636 in Gray County were reported today by George B. Cree Jr., chairman of the Gray County Savings Bonds Committee. This is 36 per cent of the county's goal of \$100,000.

Total purchases of E and H Savings Bonds in Texas for the month of April amounted to \$1,381,202. The January-April sales for the state totaled \$56,389,486 which is an increase of 8 per cent over the same period of 1966.

Nationally, cash sales of E and H bonds for the first four months of 1967 amounted to \$1,770 million, 4 per cent above sales during 1966. Sales of E bonds alone for the first four months were \$1,640 million, an increase of 6.3 per cent over 1966's \$1,543 million.

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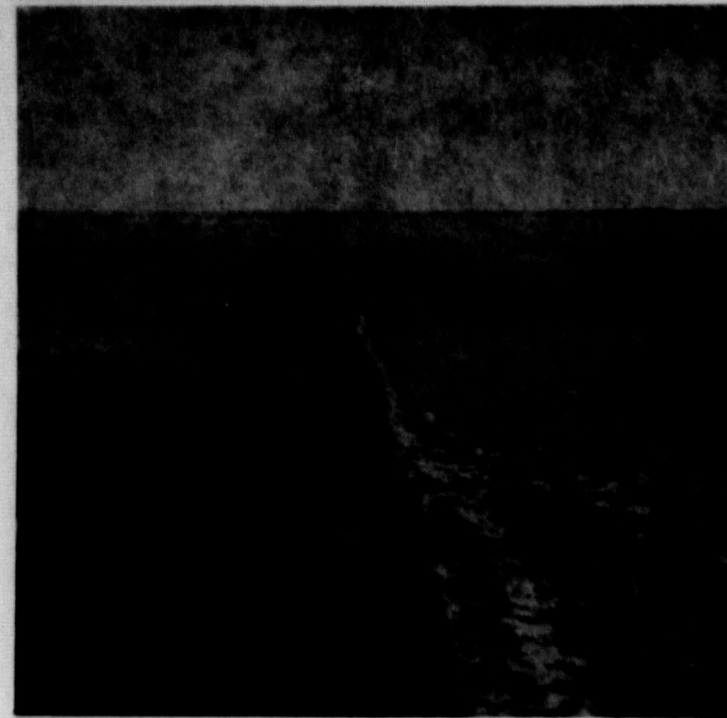

DEFERRED GRAZING
Many ranchers think of deferred grazing as a loss of grazing. Research and experience show that deferred grazing increases the amount of grass produced.

One experiment carried out on a blue grama and buffalo grass pasture showed that the ungrazed range produced 1,800 pounds of grass per acre. Grass clipped every three weeks produced 1,100 pounds of grass per acre. Grass clipped every four weeks produced 1,390 pounds. Grass clipped every two weeks produced 575 pounds of grass per acre.

The reason that ungrazed grass produces more is that 95 per cent of the weight of grass plants comes from the carbon, hydrogen, oxygen and water taken by the plant from the air. These elements are taken in through the leaves. The more leaves you have the more elements are taken in. Minerals from the soil make up about 5 per cent of the weight of the plant. Deferred grazing allows the low vigor plants to increase in size and build a strong root system.
